PRESIDENT HARRISON'S CAPACITY.

The Cleveland Leader well says that President Harrison has exhibited a broad and powerful grasp of mind, the ability to seize hold of questions and the firmness to maintain positions.

These recitations by the Leader are well-known matters of fact. They are recalled not to detract from the credit due to any officer of the Government, but rather to prevent the withdrawal of credit from President Harrison that is justly due to him.

In President Harrison the country has, then, an Executive of exceedingly broad grasp; one capable of handling any public question relating to his office or the several departments; a man who makes himself familiar with details of duty, and who has the capacity and courage to take hold of any work in which the arm of Government is to be exercised.

As we the other day pointed out, the inevitable logic of the story, if all claimed for it is accepted, is that freight rates should be so low that the St. Louis printers would, with their less cost for materials and labor, their greater volume of business and smaller margin of profit, be brought into competition with California printers to the exclusion of the latter from business.

HERETOFORE there has been attempted some concealment of lottery advertising in this State; some attempt has been made to escape the law by devices that might prevent conviction. Now, however, a leading San Francisco journal has thrown off all disguise, put away all devices to whip the devil around the stump, and boldly advertises a great lottery scheme precisely as it is advertised in Louisiana papers, where there is no legal prohibition.

Just how a newspaper claiming to be an exponent of public opinion, a conservator of morals and the defender of law and orderly procedure, can reconcile its professions to such open defiance of a plain provision of the criminal code passes comprehension. However, it is not more puzzling than the effort to understand why officials are blind to the violation of the law, and why it is that neither police, prosecuting officers or Grand Juries ever become aware of such flagrant disregard of the statute.

EX-POSTMASTER-GENERAL JAMES expresses the opinion that if Mr. Cleveland is nominated the campaign will be one of cleanliness and not of personalities. That ought to be the wish of all lovers of free institutions for every campaign. The contest that is waged with personalities for weaponry is one unworthy a self-governing people.

THE Louisville Courier-Journal is a Democratic leader of no uncertain character, and the utterances of which carry with them weight second to none. That influential and courageous journal does not hesitate to say, "Beyond any question President Harrison is the strongest candidate the Republicans could have put in the field."


