

OFF THE TRESTLEWORK.

A Freight Train Wrecked Near the American River.

Four Cars Damaged—Two Leave the Trestle and Fall to the Ground—No One Injured.

About 9:30 o'clock last night four boys—George M. Mott, Jr., Edwin Pope, Alfred Talbot and George E. Treloar—came to the Brown-Union office and reported that a half-hour or so prior thereto a freight train was wrecked in the old bed of the American River, near the Sacramento end of the long trestle beyond the old Tivoli Gardens.

The boys said they were swimming in Tivoli Lake, and, hearing a crash, dressed and ran up to the high trestle, where they saw several freight cars piled up below.

They did not stop long enough to ascertain whether or not anybody had been hurt.

Assistant Superintendent Jones at once called on Phil Douglas' wrecking crew and train and hastened to the scene of the accident, a Brown-Union reporter going along.

At an early hour this morning the party had not returned from the scene of the wreck, but a telegram was received from the depot, and the details of the accident learned.

Nobody, fortunately, was injured. Four cars, in about the center of the trestle, jumped the track at the west end of the trestle approach to the bridge.

Two of the cars left the trestle entirely and plunged into the marshy ground below. A third car was found crosswise on the track, and the fourth simply left the track and remained uninjured on the ties.

The train was what was known as a "freight extra," or, under the old rules, would have been a "freight special." It was bound for Seattle.
