

OLD TUOLUMNE. The Mother of Statesmen Likely to Be Disfranchised. Her County Clerk Resigns the Office—What Deputy Attorney-General Layson Says.

When the decision of the Supreme Court in the Doberty vs. Austin case, affecting the employment of extra deputies, was made known, the County Clerk of Tuolumne County, Joseph Fitzgerald, tendered to the Board of Supervisors that he found his resignation.

In reply to a letter asking for information relative to the effect of his action, Deputy Attorney-General Layson yesterday sent the following: SACRAMENTO, July 21, 1892. Hon. Joseph Fitzgerald, Clerk of Tuolumne County—Dear Sir: Having sent your resignation as County Clerk to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of said county, to take effect August 1st, you desire to know whether or not you will be required to hold over till a successor is qualified.

First Deputy Attorney-General. In case Fitzgerald presents any complicated state of affairs will ensue, unless a successor qualifies at an early day. There will be no one to present himself for the office of preparing a Register, as required in all the counties of the State, and if the Register is not completed the county will be disfranchised, as it will have no qualified voters.

The Supervisors of Tuolumne have a complicated problem to solve, unless they can prevail upon Fitzgerald to resign the office of County Clerk for pure gold and trust to luck to be rewarded later on.

RIVERS AND HARBORS. Reports of Engineers for Improvements on the Pacific Coast. WASHINGTON, July 21.—Reports of the engineers in charge of the river and harbor improvements on the Pacific Coast have been received by the War Department. Respecting the Oakland harbor it is expected to apply the next appropriation to the further excavation of the tidal canal and the protection of its banks; also to complete the south jetty and dredge the channel to the center in the lower and upper parts of the harbor. The growth in the traffic in this harbor in twelve months has been 161 per cent. The balance of the appropriation available July 1st, when the fiscal year was \$2,419,300. It is estimated that \$641,000 will be needed to complete the project, and all that amount can be profitably expended during the coming year.

For Napa River improvements, the balance available is \$1,145. No further appropriation is recommended, but it may be needed for the removal of bar formations by dredging as they arise. The balance available for the Redwood Creek is \$2,249 08. No further appropriation is recommended, but the engineers say the channel will fill up with material brought down by the river, and the creek and will call for removal in time.

For San Luis Obispo harbor the balance available is \$99,000. The amount estimated as the amount needed to finish the work, \$120,000 of which can be profitably expended during the coming year. At Washington harbor the work to be extended beyond Deadman's Island, and an effort made to keep in repair and strengthen the works already in course of construction. The balance available is \$1,819 23, though \$1,000 is needed.

For San Diego harbor the balance available is \$2,000. To complete the work \$234,000 is needed, and \$200,000 can be profitably expended in the coming year. The channel will be improved when the city construction has been extended out sufficiently to cut off the movement of the sand over the Zuni shoals.

For the Sacramento and Feather Rivers the balance is \$12,100 and the amount needed is \$1,000,000. It is reported that \$420,000 can be profitably expended. For Petaluma Creek the balance is \$18,000. The amount needed is indeterminate, but \$164,750 can be profitably expended at once. For the Mokelumne River the balance available is \$22,288 and \$1,000 of which can be profitably used at once.
