

WORLD'S FAIR PREPARATIONS.

The County Exhibit as it Will Appear at the State Fair.

Complaint about the Exhibitors' Admission Tickets—Decorators—More Jars Needed.

The Sacramento County World's Fair Association held a meeting at the Hall of Records yesterday forenoon, George C. McMullen presiding.

Exhibit Manager Krull made a report to the association regarding his work, which elated the members. He said he had been all over the county, and people were preparing fruits, vegetables and cereals everywhere.

It seems that Smith's uncle, an Oakland undertaker, compromised the case against him by paying for the clothing. G. Politz and two other sufferers from the raids of the young men appeared in the Police Court and sustained the motion of Deputy District Attorney Buckley for a dismissal of the case.

Judge Cravens thought the young men had been led astray by a third party, who has not been proclaimed, and decided to give them the benefit of a chance to reform.

Manager Krull was opposed to the orange and black idea. This was to be the fourth anniversary of the discovery of America, he said, and he thought the stars and stripes should predominate.

There was quite a discussion over the proposed decorations and many valuable suggestions were offered. It was finally decided, however, to leave this entire matter to the ladies of the association.

Mrs. Plummer and Mrs. Lynch were added to the Decorating Committee. Mrs. Kerr mixed the meeting up considerably by asking for the names of the members and officers of the various committees of the association.

It appeared that there had been several meetings of these committees, which had been reported as being unproductive. The lady wanted to know what had been done at these meetings, and it required the combined efforts of the Chairman, Secretary and several others to make matters clear.

Another lady then caused a second long lecture by announcing that people out in her neighborhood had declined to purchase at the State Fair because season tickets had been done away with. True, she said, an exhibitor could have a ticket for \$5, but his wife would not be admitted on it.

Manager Krull also complained bitterly of this action of the State Agricultural Directors. He said, had gone before the directors to see if a change could not be made, but they gave him no satisfaction.

In fact they gave him to understand that if Sacramento did not like their regulations the fair would be taken to some other city.

Supervisor Greer upheld the action of the directors. He said the season ticket privileges had been abused to such an extent that they had to be done away with. Whole families, and even neighborhoods, would go to the fair on one ticket, and it was no wonder that the State Fair had not been successful.
