VETERANS OF THE WAR.

Last Day's Session of the Twenty-Sixth Encampment.

MUCH IMPORTANT BUSINESS DISPOSED OF.

General A. G. Weissert of Milwaukee Elected Commander-in-Chief by Acclamation-R. H. Warfield of California Chosen Senior Vice-Commander-Recommendation Adopted Requesting the Teachers in All Schools to Set Aside One Day in Each Year for Inculcating Lessons of Patriotism.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.-The first business day of the Twenty-Sixth Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic was devoted to the report of the committee to determine the question of seniority of departments, affecting Illinois and Wisconsin, neither of which are in possession of a charter.

The report of the committee on the Adjutant-General's report recommended the adoption of the suggestion for a per capita fund for Grand Encampment purposes, to be limited to two and a half cents.

The Committee on Rules reported on a number of topics, and their recommendations were adopted.

The question of abolishing life memberships in the National Encampment came up, the Department of Ohio recommending that the National and State Commanders be given seats as honorary members, without a vote.

Junior Vice-Commander Clarkson of Omaha, on behalf of the entire membership of the G. A. R., presented a portrait of himself.

Past Commander Rea of Minnesota, from the Committee on the Commander's Address, reported that the committee heartily commended the patriotic sentiments and spirit of devotion eloquently expressed in the address.

Terrible Deed of a Man Who Was Crazy by Fever.

KILLS HIS CHILD AND BATHES HIS FACE IN HER BLOOD.
