NOT APATHETIC, BUT THINKING CAMPAIGNS.

There is much talk of this being an apathetic campaign—it is a mistake. It is not a hurrah campaign, and we are of those who believe such are gone to remain. The Boston Transcript puts it well when it says: "When are campaigns that really are national educational processes, and the present is one of them. There is little 'hurrahing' and less shouting. The streets of our cities are not made bright as of old with the glare of torches. The brass bands get only a very few engagements, and the drum corps have hard work to drum up business. Yet, despite the absence of these accustomed demonstrations of political earnestness, the campaign is in earnest. The rallies whenever a man who has anything to say is called to speak are crowded. People talk over what is said on their way to their homes, and in their homes."

The truth is this is a newspaper and magazine-reading age. The press has taken the place of the banner and the torch, and reading is substituted for parade. The press has not wholly eliminated the stump, nor will it ever do so, but the orator after all finds his largest audience in the masses who read the reports of his speeches. Not very many years ago the stump-speaker cared little what the press reported of his speeches; to-day the correct report is his first care. Were Clay living to-day he could not afford to despise the press reports as of old, for he would realize, as do the statesmen of the hour, that for one who reads an official document with a full report of legislators' speeches, ten thousand read the abridged reports of it daily and weekly press. The reviews and magazines also have some forums of debate, and the growth of these vehicles of expression testifies to the fact that the people do read the reports of debates that take place in them. A concise age; the long speech tires hence of to-day, whereas fifty years ago men took "a half day off" from the stump orators of a campaign arrived in a town, and gave up many hours to listening to joint debates that now would not hold an audience more than two hours. Colfax and Walker frequently debated an entire afternoon in the towns of Indiana, and the politicians of the West were, but thirty years ago, accustomed to hold audiences for a half-day in political debates. Now, the busy man, the weary man, listens an hour under protest, and for excuse declares that he will get the speech he is urged to listen to in his morning paper with greater satisfaction.

We doubt if people think upon political issues any more deeply than they did in the forties; but this is true, more people think upon governmental propositions, and more people, thanks to the press, are informed upon them. All the more reason exists then to-day for intelligence underlying citizenship, and for the educational test being applied to the voter. No government can rest firmly upon a substratum of ignorance. As the hurrah and parade have declined and reading has advanced, the illiterate class becomes more dangerous and the reading class more potential and safer. Let us then discourage the first by educational qualifications for the exercise of the franchise, and thus stimulate men to become of the latter class.

THE REASON WHY.

The Republican ticket from the top to the bottom deserves the support of every member of the party. There is not the slightest reason in the world why any Republican should go off into side shows this year. For none of the opposition parties which crowd the ballot can present as good, tried or capable a list of men for public office as the Sacramento Republicans present. One line of opposition is in the form of a composite, scrambled or pick-up ticket; it is neither flesh, nor good red hering; it lacks all essential elements of independence and revolt; it claims non-partisanship because, forsooth, it is made up of the candidates of political partisans. Was ever a more absurd claim preferred? The opposition in another direction represents a trade, a bargain and sale transaction, whereby the Democracy is to get the chestnuts and the People's party the burnt puns. It is a combination that ought to make the gorge of sincere Democrats rise; a dicker that should disgust devoted believers in the movement that gave birth to the People's party. Let citizens of Sacramento stand clear of these side-bar affairs and vote the ticket of a party that does not shirk responsibility and that can be held to accountability.

EXPOSE THE FRAUDS.

It is alleged that there has been illegal registration, and much registering in a manner that is vague and indefinite. Specimen cases are cited by those examining the registers. If these are substantial let the frauds all be brought to light; let every illegal registration, if there be any, be brought out into the glare of day. The County Clerk will clear the register wherever the law authorizes him. In cases where he cannot do so, let the false registrations be noted and reported to the election boards, and let the officers see to it that dummies and stuffers are not only rejected, but sent to their just punishment if they offer to vote. The people want a clean election; no community can afford to tolerate any other kind. It should be a fair, open-handed, clean fight Tuesday. Frauds attempted upon the ballot-box are blows upon the citadel of human freedom; if stuffers can negative honest votes then self-government is a failure.

A GRANGE SPEAKS.

Pomona Grange, P. of H., of this county, has registered in emphatic terms that the attempt to break down the State school book system is infamous. It appeals to the Legislature to discontinue all attempts to procure abandonment of the system and urges the lawmakers to perfect it and sustain it. The Grange expresses its confidence in the system, the officials carrying it out and declares that the experiment thus far is satisfactory and economic. This is the judgment of all people who have given it critical examination and are not under the spell of the book-ring and its accomplices—certain teachers' institutes. Because some dilettante educators, and some interested agents have found fault with a few of the books, has not blinded the Grange to the fact that not one-tenth part as harsh criticism has been made of the State books as was indulged in by book-ring men against the series of textbooks they wished to oust in favor of their own publications. Yet these very books that they tore to pieces they are now, under union of interests, pronouncing models of excellence.

A MODEL OFFICER.

On the 19th of October, referring to the re-nominees on the Republican ticket, we spoke of District Attorney F. D. Ryan as being one of the best and most successful prosecuting officers the county has ever had. That was not putting it strongly, for Mr. Ryan is on all sides conceded to have had no superior in this county as a representative of "The People," in all litigation in which their sovereign name is used in maintenance of law and the administration of justice. Mr. Ryan is quite the ideal District Attorney. He is young, vigorous, level-headed, clear of judgment, and inflexible in the discharge of duty. He has ability of a superior order, is of fine address at the bar, and prosecutes offenders against the law with energy and an eye single to his duty. He has had great success and he has deserved it; his re-nomination was but a just recognition of merit, ability, faithfulness and entire legal capacity.

PULLED DOWN.

Mr. Patterson, the Democratic nominee for Senator, was pulled down in the interest of the trade between the People's party and the Democracy. Mr. Patterson will not, does not deny it. He was sold out and had no part in the transaction. Even his protest was of no avail. Mr. Patterson is too honorable a man to have concocted such a scheme, and bitterly feels the humiliation to which he has been subjected. He is to young yet, however, and will live to see the wheel of time bring about its sweet revenge.

SOME WILDCAT. A Handsome Specimen of the Bobtail "Felis Catus." C. N. Lash, who recently returned from the San Joaquin Valley, brought with him a beautiful animal of the wildcat species which he procured at Raymond, Mariposa County. The creature was caught when a kitten only a few days' old, and although now but nine months' old it is twice the size of an ordinary domestic cat. It is as docile as an ordinary cat, except when being fed, and it has all the ugliness and ferocity of the wildcat nature asserts itself, and it will tolerate no attempts at familiarity. When fully grown the cat will be at least 50 per cent larger than it now is, and would be an ugly customer to tackle. Like the domestic cat, it has a born antipathy to dogs, the presence of one near its cage arousing it to fury. It would be a fine acquisition to some menagerie.

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


