
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

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PRECINCT MAP—ELECTION OF NOVEMBER 8, 1892.

The following diagram shows the boundaries of the Supervisor Districts within the city, together with the precinct boundaries. Each voter is required to announce the district and precinct in which he resides when he goes to the polls to vote, but may never take the precaution to inform himself on this point, which causes delay. By consulting this diagram each voter will readily learn the number of his district and precinct.



Letters and figures on the margin of the map indicate streets. The interior double lines separate Supervisor Districts. Single lines are boundaries of election precincts. All precinct lines are on the center of streets.

OBJECTED TO THE "LOOP."

The State Agricultural Society Opposes a Railway Franchise.

L. L. Lewis Withdraws His Request—Telephone Franchise Granted—The Gallatin-Livermore Bond.

The first matter taken up by the City Trustees at their regular meeting yesterday morning was the proposed ordinance granting to L. L. Lewis of the Central Electric Railway Company a franchise for a road on H street from Seventh to Twentieth and along Twentieth to G—making a "loop" line of the G-street franchise recently granted.

The proposition met with opposition—principally from the State Agricultural Society. Chairman Fred Cox and Secretary Edwin F. Smith of the society appeared before the board and the former made a speech against the "loop" line.

He objected particularly to that part of the road which it was proposed to run on Twentieth street, as hundreds of carriages and other vehicles had to use that street during State Fair time. The road, he thought would do more harm than good.

He did not even think that the G-street line should be allowed to come right up to Twentieth street, as it would block the entrance to the park.

MR. LEWIS WITHDRAWS. L. L. Lewis said that he had no desire to push the matter if there was any opposition to it. It was not exactly one of the company's schemes, but one of his own. He asked permission to withdraw it.

On motion of Mr. Conklin, the request to withdraw was granted.

The new sidewalk ordinance was, on motion of the Mayor, laid over for a week. It had been referred to City Attorney Hart and met with his approval.

When the proposed ordinance granting the Sunset Telephone Company permission to erect and maintain poles, wires, conductors, etc., in this city was taken up, Mayor Constock said he expected there would be a "kick" from the fire department, as the latter had wanted the desired exclusive rights through certain alleys, and was afraid the new franchise would rob the department of these rights.

The Mayor thought the matter should be laid over for further consideration. Mr. Conklin asked that the ordinance be read again, and after hearing his proposition he said he was ready to vote for it. Nothing would be gained by delay. The board reserved the right to correct any errors it might make at any time.

put on the brakes and protect the few that were left.

The board, however, decided that as the privileges granted the telephone company were not to be exclusive, and that the city would be thoroughly protected, the franchise should be granted. An order to that effect was made by a unanimous vote.

According to Chief Engineer Renwick's report 40,940,000 gallons of water were pumped for the week ending October 30th. The Holly pump was run 86 and the Stevens pump 113 hours.
