

THE AMERICAN PRIVILEGE.

It Will be Generally Exercised at the Polls To-Day.

Croakers Who Are Always Predicting Trouble—The "Records-Union's" Returns To-Night.

To-day the peaceful battle of the ballots will be fought at the polls, after a long and wearying campaign, if not a specially exciting one. The polls will open at 6:30 o'clock this morning, and close at 5 p. m.

As usual a few nervous persons have worked themselves into an untimely frenzy over an alleged prospect of "trouble" of some vague sort, but as usual they will doubtless be disappointed. Sheriff Stanley has, however, appointed a large number of special deputies to preserve order at the polls, but there is no likelihood that the police and United States Deputy Marshals and Supervisors will not be able to "handle the crowd."

THE GREAT REGISTER. So short was the time allowed for copying and placing the Great Register in the hands of the printer that several mistakes were made, the most important being the omission of one sheet of names. This mistake was discovered in time and the error rectified. Here and there single omissions have occurred, and a few names have been misspelled. A man named Lurie yesterday discovered that the "L" had been dropped from his name, making it read "Laurie." As the name appears in its proper place, however, among the names, it shows plainly that the omission was a typographical error.

Various persons have undertaken to advise voters how to fold their ballots. There is no specified manner in which ballots must be folded, except that it must be so that the number of the ballot shall appear on the outside thereof, and not displaying the marks on the face thereof. It is especially important that any person of ordinary intelligence will have no difficulty in properly marking his ballot, provided he keeps sober; hence that wise provision of law which requires that saloons shall not keep open nor dispense liquor on the day of election. Chief of Police Rodgers has very properly announced his intention of enforcing the law in this respect, and if he succeeds in doing so there will be no doubt of the election being a peaceable one. It is, however, worthy of note in this connection, that all the talk of "trouble" at the polls comes from a class of citizens who would feel very much injured if told that they are adopting other than peaceful methods.

NOT IN IT. Whisky Works the Disfranchisement of Several Citizens. John McGinty, Mike McCarthy, Frank King and Mike Murphy, all were arraigned in the Police Court yesterday for being drunk, and they were all penitent and sad, but they couldn't fix up satisfactory excuses. About the time they thought they had won the confidence and sympathy of Judge Stevens, he suddenly assumed a serious expression and gave them five days each in the City Jail, regardless of the fact that election day would come and go and they would not be on hand to vote with their accustomed ability. J. A. Johnston pleaded guilty to vagrancy and will receive his sentence on Wednesday. MORE STREET RAILWAYS.

The Folsom Company Asks for Still Another Franchise.

Poundmaster McNulty in More Trouble—The Dense Smoke Ordinance—Light Death Record.

The Sacramento Electric Power and Light Company, in whose hands the recent new street railway franchise virtually stands, asked the City Trustees yesterday for still more territory, and if all of the agreements are carried out Sacramento will soon be the most thoroughly equipped city, so far as street railways are concerned, on the coast. Attorney L. T. Hatfield, on behalf of the company, presented to the board a draft of a proposed ordinance granting a franchise to operate a street railway on the following streets: Commencing at the intersection of Seventh and L streets, running east on L to Eleventh and thence to K street; also, commencing at the intersection of Tenth and I streets, running south on Tenth to K, thence east on K to the city limits; also, commencing at the intersection of Sixth and I streets, running north on Sixth to H, thence east to Eighth, along Eighth to F, thence east to Twelfth and south on Twelfth to H; also, commencing at the intersection of Twentieth and I streets, running south on Twentieth to N; also, commencing at the intersection of Twenty-first and N streets, running south on Twenty-first to Y, thence on Y to the Lower Stockton road.

LEGAL RESTRICTIONS. After some further talk the matter was referred to the Street Commissioner for investigation.

REGULAR REPORTS. Superintendent of Cemeteries, there were only twenty-five deaths in the city during October. The monthly mortality death rate in the city within four years. Nine bodies were brought here for interment, and one was shipped to Oakland. The Superintendent collected for cemetery dues and for the sale of lots, \$34 90. Chief of Police Rodgers reported that 27 arrests were made in October. Seventeen hundred and ninety-nine arrests were furnished. His report shows that he only had forty cents on hand October 31st.

INCORPORATED. The Electric Power and Light Company Files Its Articles. The Sacramento Electric Power and Light Company filed its articles of incorporation yesterday. San Francisco is to be its chief place of business, but it will operate here. Capital stock, \$1,500,000. Directors—Albert Gallatin, A. J. Raiston, H. P. Livermore, Charles E. Livermore and Joshua Barker. The purposes for which it is formed are to contract for water and other power to be used by it, or to be furnished to other corporations, or individuals; to purchase, construct, lease, maintain and operate works and all necessary apparatus, apparatus and appliances for the produc-

tion and utilization of electric and other power for all purposes; to acquire and obtain franchises and rights to run railways, the cars of which shall be propelled by electricity or other motive power, and to construct, maintain and operate a street railway in Sacramento, over, along and upon certain streets, and other street railways in Sacramento and elsewhere, as franchises or rights to operate the same may be hereafter acquired.

COLORED REPUBLICANS. The Central Club's Meeting Last Night Was Well Attended. The Colored Central Republican Club held a mass meeting at the old Pavilion last night, which was addressed by a number of speakers, and was lively and enthusiastic. The meeting was called to order by Chairman C. F. Stratford, who spoke briefly of the object of the meeting and of the club. He was followed by Albert Grubbs, with an enthusiastic speech, which was well received. D. J. Fletcher, D. J. Starling and E. H. Taylor made short addresses, after which W. W. Tully, the speaker of the evening, was introduced.

DEAD HORSES DEPOSITED ON THE BANK OF THE AMERICAN RIVER. It was learned yesterday that a man had recently removed three dead horses to the bank of the American River. The carcasses were laid—so the man admits—within forty feet of the river bank, but there is no certainty they were not thrown over the bank. However, the matter is known to the City Health Officer, and steps should be taken to ascertain whether or not we are now drinking extract of horse.
