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Capitol Improvement.

Something Concerning the New Electric Light System.

The Secretary of State's Reasons for Substituting Electricity for Gas Illumination.

In his biennial report to the Governor, just printed, Secretary of State Waite says in relation to some of the improvements made by him as Superintendent of the State Capitol:

"The Capitol of the State, which cost more than \$2,000,000, has no means of ventilation, except through fire chimneys, doors and windows. It is a regret that its thick walls have not been provided with ventilating flues and sanitary engineers examine the building to learn what modern science and skill could do to remedy the defect.

When it is understood that a jet of hot air consumes as much oxygen as the lungs of seven men; when by actual observation it is found that the gas jets of the Capitol, though marked with the name of the inventor, come very near consuming seven feet instead, and when it is known that the Assembly chamber contains 227 gas burners, it is easy calculation to work out the effect upon the healthfulness of its breathing atmosphere.
