

RALLYING THEIR FORCES.

Legislators Training for the Senatorial Struggle.

Gossip Among Those Coming In—What is Said at the Bay—White is Ahead—General Notes.

Hardly more than a handful of Senators and Assemblymen have as yet arrived in the Capital City, but it is expected to-day's incoming trains will bring nearly the full complement.

THE SENATORSHIP. The principal fight before the next Legislature naturally is the selection of a United States Senator to succeed Senator Felton.

Thomas V. Cator, the People's party candidate for United States Senator, will be quartered at the Capital, and M. H. De Young, Republican, will make the Golden Eagle his campaigning resort.

White has the most supporters among the Democrats who have so far put in an appearance, and enthusiastically they proclaim he will be elected beyond a doubt.

Mr. De Young is still in the fight, although his chances are very slim, with members of the Legislature of his own party bitterly opposed to him.

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MINOR NOTES.

Hon. W. W. Foote is expected to arrive to-day. Marcus D. Boruck of San Francisco and Frank G. Brandon of Santa Clara are candidates for Secretary of the Senate.

George Peckham of Santa Cruz, Secretary of the Assembly, is expected to arrive to-day. Joseph Quire, ex-County Clerk of Placer County, also aspires for the Chief Clerkship.

Tom Rodgers, Sergeant-at-Arms of the last Senate, is after the position again, and seems to have no opposition.

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THE BRIGHTON MYSTERY.

The Officers are Now Satisfied That it Was a Murder. Two Tramps Who Tried to Sell a Watch at Folsom, Resembling the One Worn by Miss Ayers.

The host of detectives and officers who have been investigating the mysterious burning of the railroad station at Brighton, all agreed yesterday that Miss E. O. Ayers, the telegraph operator and railroad agent, was murdered before the station was fired.

The officers have numerous theories as to how the dastardly crime was committed, but the most plausible one is that some tramps who were seen hanging about the place during Wednesday are the guilty parties.

There were three of them, and they annoyed Miss Ayers when she ordered them away. They went a short distance but still lingered in the neighborhood.

It has been ascertained that on Thursday two rough looking individuals entered a saloon at Lathrop, and gave in payment a gold ring which is said to be an exact counterpart of one which Miss Ayers wore for many years.

On top of this comes the news that two men answering the description of those seen at Brighton tried to sell a lady's gold watch to a Chinaman in Folsom. This was late on Thursday, and the watch is said to resemble one that Miss Ayers wore.

Deputy Sheriff Fay was in Folsom yesterday, and brought down the report last evening that it had been learned that the two men who tried to sell the watch had slept over night in a cabin in the outskirts of the city, and when the officers examined the cabin they found evidence that the men had shaved themselves during the night and had cut their hair in order to disguise themselves.

The officers are on the trail of these two men and believe that they are the murderers. Superintendent J. L. Gillis of the Placerville Division is in constant communication with the railroad detectives and has instructed them to leave no stone unturned, nor to spare any expense in running down the brutal murderers.

He says he feels quite confident that they will succeed. It is true that the men have almost a day's start on the officers, but their camp fires have been discovered and found to be quite fresh, showing that the officers are gaining on them.

Mr. Gillis was seen by a Record-Union reporter late last night, but he said he had received nothing new from the officers, as they were all out in the hills trailing the two men suspected of having committed the crime.
