

MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS.

Prospect That the City May Do Its Own Street Sprinkling.

What the Mayor Has Discovered in Regard to Clunie's Occupation of Levee Street.

The most important matter that engaged the attention of the City Trustees at their session yesterday was a suggestion made by Street Commissioner Green concerning the question of street sprinkling. Mr. Green's proposition is in line with the suggestion made by the RECORD-UNION yesterday—to have the city purchase and own its own wagons and have its sprinkling done just as such times as may be necessary and in a manner satisfactory to the city and the people who are taxed for the service.

Mr. Green said he thought that it would be well at this time to consider the subject of street sprinkling for the coming year. As it is now, the contractors sometimes had twenty-five teams in use in the summer, and the work was often not half done. Fifteen such wagons as the one the city now owns would do the work more uniformly and better, and the crossings would not be flooded, as is now the case. One sprinkler could attend to sixteen blocks. New wagons, he said, would cost about \$8,000, as an order of this magnitude would secure a discount, and several firms were manufacturing good sprinklers. Good roads could also be secured, probably.

STREETS AND SEWERS.

A petition was received from property owners on O street, between Eleventh and Twelfth, asking for the improvement of the block by grading and graveing. The matter was referred to the Street Commissioner.

A remonstrance from the majority of property owners against improving Sixth street, between O and R, was received, and on motion of Trustee Conklin all improvement on that street was ordered discontinued on that frontage.

The Street Commissioner was directed to allow the alley between B and C, Eleventh and Twelfth streets, to be graded.

The majority of property owners on the block between L and M, Seventeenth and Nineteenth streets, presented a remonstrance against putting a sewer in the alley, and the work was ordered discontinued.

Street Commissioner Green reported unfavorably on putting a sewer in the alley between E and F, Eighth and Ninth streets, saying that unless the alley was graded the sewer pipe would lie on the surface.

A remonstrance from a majority of property owners on Ninth street, between O and R, against the grading there, was received, and the work ordered discontinued.

George E. Pierson, George H. Fisher, Julia Kehoe and Mrs. Yale favored the work if the whole street was graded from O to Y streets, but not otherwise.

OFFICIAL REPORTS.

The Chief of Police presented his report as follows for the February: Number of arrests, 165; on routes to State Prison, 9; held to answer, 6; discharged, 113; remaining in prison, 10; meals furnished, 1,342.

The Harbor-master reported 55 steamer trips and \$122 50 dues collected.

The Chief Engineer reported 26,000,000 gallons of water pumped during the week.

Poundmaster McNulty reported 14 horses, 5 cows and 143 dogs impounded during the month of February. Of these, there remain three horses to be rounded, eight dogs were reimpounded and 135 killed. Fees received, \$25.

R. H. Singler, Superintendent of the Cemeteries, reported the number of deaths in the city as 38; stillborn 1; brought here for interment, 17; interments in City Cemetery, 32; New Helvetia, 7; St. Joseph's, 13; New Mission, 3; sent to Los Angeles, 1; received from out of town, 825 25; for permits, 82; vault dues, \$42 50.

TOO MUCH WATER.

A. D. Christiansen asked the board for relief from water in the alley between G and H, Twelfth and Thirteenth streets. He stated that he had a good tenant on account of the water. It had been a nuisance to him during the five years he had owned the property, and he hoped the board would be able to do something to correct the evil.

The matter was referred to the Street Commissioner.

THE CITY VS. CLUNIE.

The Mayor presented the following report: "I have consulted with the City Attorney in relation to the report from McKune & George concerning the city's interest in block 1, Brannan's Addition, and the streets adjacent. It appears that the deed which T. J. Clunie gave to his heirs, or assigns back to him, from his grant, extends to low water. Many of the improvements were made before Clunie came into possession of this property. The report and advice from the City Attorney suggest prompt action to gain possession of this property so long held by different parties and latterly by General Clunie.

"I recommend that McKune & George be retained to assist the City Attorney in the immediate prosecution of this important case."

A discussion of the matter ended in a resolution being adopted instructing the City Attorney to consult with McKune & George as to the best manner in which to inaugurate and prosecute proceedings and to report to the board next Monday.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

R. Watkins, Superintendent of Fire Alarms, presented his report, which states that the system consists of about thirty-six miles of No. 9 galvanized iron wire, with all the necessary insulating iron wire across trolley wires, all of which is on poles. It is divided into six circuits, one going to five box circuits. During the past year new boxes have been placed: No. 17 at Tenth and U streets and No. 71 at the Buffalo Brewery. New poles have been put in and some changes made in the circuits to avoid troubles and heavy current wires. He recommends a box at Tenth and E streets. The expense for the year, less supplies and tools on hand, was \$1,084 61.

NEW ELECTION OFFICERS.

The following changes were made in election officers: William Fawcett, vice W. A. Anderson, resigned; H. E. Anderson, in the first precinct of the First District; A. L. Frost in the fifth precinct of the Third District, vice C. H. Holmes, resigned; Ed Hook, vice W. H. Luther, resigned, in the third precinct of the Third District.

The Supervisors Do Not Favor More County Officials.

Applicants for Positions as Road Overseers—Highway Wanted in Oak Park.

The Board of Supervisors began their monthly meeting yesterday morning, all the members being present.

S. P. Higginan gave a deed of right of way for a road near Hicksville, which was accepted.

Charles H. Buel presented a petition for appointment as Roadmaster of District No. 14, Louis Herbert a like petition for District No. 21, Henry Hebb one for No. 17, N. D. Hack for No. 12, Philip Wise for No. 15, C. P. Bartholomew for No. 10.

A communication and application from J. H. Atkins, offering to fill the position of License Collector at \$100 per month, was received, and representing to the board that in the interests of economy it was their duty to appoint him and save \$25 per month.

The communication was placed on file, but no action was taken thereon.

Supervisor Curtis reported that he had had the approaches to the Folsom bridge fixed, and that the expense of procuring wagons and loading them for the test amounted to \$42 40.

ASSORTED WOES.

Monday's Muster of Police Court Unfortunates.

Potato Thief Clancy Gets Forty Days—Maloney's Case Settled Amicably—Vags and Drunks.

In the Police Court yesterday morning it was a veritable case of Blue Monday. Lee Him, a Chinaman, arrested for burglary, had his case set for Thursday next.

John Clancy, who pleaded guilty to petty larceny, in having stolen a sack of potatoes, was sentenced to a fine of \$40 or twenty days in jail. He explained that he only wanted a few of the potatoes, but the sacks were all full and he tried to get off with one sackful.

J. J. Maloney, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, had the complaint against him dismissed, the complaining witness acknowledging satisfaction.

Annie Watson, charged with vagrancy, had the case against her continued for one week.

Dan O'Neil, a drunk, seemed to have naturally recovered and was discharged.
