tion bill which led him to investigate it. Seeking out to explain the bill and its present position. The gentleman said: "Assembly Bill No. 141 was taken up on Wednesday and read a second time in the Assembly. This is the bill by which Section 37 of the Wright Act is to be amended so that the Board of Directors of irrigation districts may levy special assessments without submitting the property of the same to a vote of the people, as is necessary as the law now stands. Under this bill, the only restrictions upon the unbridled will of directors are removed, and under the guise of improvements and repairs, districts can be impoverished, and by the power of directors in the matter of employing labor or other employes, districts can be colonized and the power of a corrupt board can be perpetuated. "But dangerous as was the bill as it first introduced, it was mildness itself compared to its present formidable proportions, admitting, it does, of such special and public plunder. On second reading the bill was amended by providing that the directors are to have power to exchange water rights for other water rights or for water agreements or certificates, irrespective of the fact whether the company giving such contract or covenant has any water, or, in fact, any property whatever. No restrictions are made upon the board in any way, guarding the district against either the corruption or want of judgment of the directors, and they are simply empowered to exchange all of the lands of the district for the covenant of a water company which may not be worth the paper it is written upon. "These directors have too much power as the law now reads, and to this give them unlimited power, to enable them to manage the current business of the district but at will to squander all of the funds for a bare agreement of some wild water company, and to give power that should be vested in any public officer, much less than in a board which in many instances is wanting in business experience."

PROCEEDINGS IN DETAIL.

WILSON'S USURY BILL IS FINALLY DEFEATED.

Grinding Out Laws Under the Urgency Resolution—Charges for Mileage, Etc.

The Senate convened at 10 A. M., Lieutenant-Governor Redick presiding. Roll-call, prayer and reading of the journal as usual. Senator Voorheis called up his motion to reconsider the vote whereby Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 5, relative to trial by jury, was defeated. The Senate refused to reconsider the vote. Senator Campbell moved to reconsider the vote whereby Senate Joint Resolution No. 25, relative to the cession of Goat Island by the United States to the State of California for railroad depot uses, was adopted. The motion was lost.

Then Senator Hart moved to reconsider the vote whereby Wilson's "usury" bill was passed and the motion prevailed. The bill was then defeated, after which Wilson made a bitter speech against those who voted to pass the bill.

The urgency file was then taken up and the following bills were passed finally: Senate Bill No. 758, making an appropriation to pay the deficiency in the appropriation for per diem and mileage of Lieutenant-Governor and Senators for the forty-fourth fiscal year.

Senate Bill No. 754, making an appropriation to pay the deficiency in the appropriation for the maintenance of the State of California for the forty-fourth fiscal year.

Senate Bill No. 249, making an appropriation for the construction of a sewer along the waterfront of the city of San Diego.

Senate Bill No. 491, making an appropriation for the construction of a sewer along the waterfront of the city of San Diego.

Senate Bill No. 781, to appropriate money to aid in erecting a monument over the grave of Governor William Irwin, and to prescribe the duties of the Controller and Directors of State Burial grounds in relation thereto.

Senate Bill No. 782, to appropriate money to pay the claim of Jerome Deasy for justice, and bringing said A. P. Clark from Victoria, B. C., California, under extradition papers.

The following bills, also on the urgency file, were read the second time and ordered engrossed: Senate Bill No. 777, making an appropriation for the payment of R. J. Broughton, for conveyance of Anna Campbell an insane person, to the Napa Insane Asylum.

Senate Bill No. 532, to appropriate money to pay the claim of John M. Creed, for the construction of a sewer along Dwight way in front of the lands of the Deaf and Dumb Asylum of Berkeley, California, which work was performed under the supervision of the Senate and with George Schmidt, Superintendent of Streets of the town of Berkeley, his authority having been acquired under the general law of this State.

Senate Bill No. 780, to appropriate the surplus money in the Special Mendocino Asylum Fund in the State Treasury to the uses of the Mendocino State Insane Asylum.

The omnibus educational bill was withdrawn, and the Assembly omnibus, which was introduced by Senator Voorheis the substitute was declared a case of urgency, read three times and passed finally. The Senate omnibus is a substitute for Senate Bills Nos. 124, 512, 622 and 616, while the Assembly omnibus is a substitute for Assembly Bills Nos. 16, 37, 124, 137, 173, 187 and 730.

Senate Bill No. 580, to appropriate money to pay the claim of Patrick Begley, was read the second time and ordered engrossed.

Senate Bill No. 369, making an appropriation to pay the claim of J. L. Cooke and William W. Hays, was read the second time and ordered engrossed.

Senate Bill No. 596, to amend the Code of Civil Procedure by adding thereto three new sections, relating to the contesting of elections by a judicial recedent of the ballots cast.

Senate Bill No. 461, to amend the Political Code in relation to the conduct of elections in this State.

Senate Bill No. 537, making an appropriation for the payment of the salary of the Librarian of the Supreme Court for the remainder of the forty-fourth fiscal year.


Senate Bill No. 203, to provide for the erection of a residence for the Medical Superintendent of the State Insane Asylum at Stockton.

Senate Bill No. 148, to appropriate the sum of \$50,000 for the erection, completion and furnishing of buildings, laundry and bathhouse, and for improvements of the grounds, heating and cooking apparatus and water supply at the Veterans' Home.

Wilson called up his motion to reconsider the vote which was taken up in its lieu of George Dougherty was defeated.

Senate Bill No. 108—Senator Mahoney's measure to make common carriers of the telegraph companies—was defeated.

Ostrom's motion to reconsider the vote whereby Senate Bill No. 399, for the payment for private property taken for public use, was passed, was taken up as a special order. The Senate voted to reconsider, and then voted the bill down again.

Senate Bill No. 121, to amend an Act to establish a branch asylum for the insane at Ukiah, relating to the election, duties and compensation of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Directors of said asylum; also, the qualifications, duties and compensation of the Medical Superintendent of said asylum; and also, the appointment, duties and compensation of the Assistant Physician, and authorizing the Board of Directors, if in their judgment, to elect an additional Assistant Physician, and providing for his compensation, was taken up as a special order and read the first time and passed finally.

The substitute for Assembly Bill No. 396, to create the county of Santa Ynez, was read the second time and ordered engrossed.

Senator Orr opposed the proposition, and Senator Hart defended it. The roll call was taken, and the bill was defeated by the following vote: Ayes—Arms, Broderick, Campbell, Donnell, Evans, Felt, Goucher, Harp, McAllister, McGowan, Maloney, Mitchell, Orr, Ostrom, Ragsdale, Seawell, Shippee, Streeter, Whitcomb—20.

Several others spoke, and then the roll call was taken, and the bill was defeated by the following vote: Ayes—Arms, Broderick, Campbell, Donnell, Evans, Felt, Goucher, Harp, McAllister, McGowan, Maloney, Mitchell, Orr, Ostrom, Ragsdale, Seawell, Shippee, Streeter, Whitcomb—20.

A resolution was adopted suspending the rules so that Senator Gestoni might introduce concurrent resolution introducing the new charter adopted by the city of Napa yesterday.

Assembly Bill No. 239, to create Kings County, was taken up as a special order, read the first time and made a special order for this morning.

On motion of Voorheis the "omnibus" bill, which was taken up, was taken up, read the first time and placed at the head of the urgency file.

ASSEMBLY PROCEEDINGS. The Assembly refused the Senate Substitute Reassessment Bill.

The Assembly convened at the regular hour, Speaker Gould presiding. Roll called and quorum present. Prayer by the Chaplain.

Assembly Bill No. 66, to pay the claim of George Nelson, was read third time and finally passed.

Assembly Bill No. 191, relating to the appointment and number of Notaries Public in the several counties of the State, was finally passed.

Assembly Bill No. 63, to pay the claim of Dr. M. Gardner against the State, and making an appropriation of \$3,000 therefor, was read first time.

Senate Bill No. 607, to provide for furnishing assistants to the Governor of each city, or city and county, having 100,000 or more inhabitants, and providing the mode in which such assistants shall be appointed and designated, and establishing the compensation, and prescribing the duties of such assistants, was read first time.

Senate Bill No. 141, to retire teachers of the public schools on partial pay, was read first time.

The Assembly adopted the Senate concurrent resolution providing for the publication of 500 copies of the proceedings of the joint session of the Legislature concerning the Biame memorial exercises.

Senate Bill No. 328, relating to the exemption of State property from assessment by municipalities and county governments, was read first time.

Assembly Bill No. 449, to pay the claims of J. N. Cardozo, also the claim of Farmer & Hoxie, and the claim of D. M. Davidson, their heirs and assigns, for military services in defending the eastern frontier against the attacks of the Indians, was read first time.

Senate Bill No. 743, making an appropriation to pay the deficiency in the appropriation for the transportation of insane for the forty-fourth fiscal year, was read second time and ordered to a third reading.

Mr. Alford moved to strike out the enacting clause of Assembly Bill No. 465, as amended by the Senate. The bill relates to the preservation of game birds and animals, and providing punishment for the unlawful taking, killing and transportation thereof. Mr. Alford said he made the motion at the request of the author, Mr. Emerie.

Messrs. Drees and Kennedy opposed striking out the enacting clause. They argued that the bill, as amended, is satisfactory to all sportsmen and will protect the game as should be done.

The motion was voted down, and subsequently the Senate amendments were adopted.

Assembly Bill No. 677, appropriating money for the purchase of land for the Industrial Home of Mechanical Trades for the Adult Blind, was read second time.


Assembly Bill No. 759, to add a new section to the Code of Civil Procedure, relating to proceedings affecting the title of real estate, was given a third reading and finally passed.

Assembly Bill No. 74, the "omnibus" bill, which was taken up, was taken up, read a second time. Many amendments were adopted, and further consideration of the bill made a special order for this morning, and passed after the dispatch of Senate messages.

Senate Bill No. 128, authorizing the incurring of indebtedness and issuance of bonds by cities, towns and municipal corporations incorporated under the laws of this State, for the construction of the State Insane Asylum at Stockton, was read the second time and ordered to a third reading.

Senate Bill No. 148, to appropriate the sum of \$50,000 for the erection, completion and furnishing of buildings, laundry and bathhouse, and for improvements of the grounds, heating and cooking apparatus and water supply at the Veterans' Home, was read the second time and ordered to a third reading.
