MERRITT ISLAND ASSESSMENTS.

Their Legality Upheld by the Supreme Court.

Which Affirms the Judgment in the Case of A. J. and Mary Silva of Yolo County.

The decision of the Supreme Court in the Yolo County case of Swamp Land District No. 150 vs. A. J. and Mary Silva (appellants) is of more than ordinary interest to people of the swamp land section of Sacramento and vicinity.

Plaintiff brought action to recover from the defendants the sum of \$633.11, the amount of an assessment levied against the land of the defendants lying within Reclamation District No. 150.

The Act of March 30, 1874 (Stats. 1873-74, p. 897), under which the plaintiff was organized as a reclamation district, provides that immediately after the passage of the Act the owners of land in Swamp Land District No. 150, consisting of what is known as Merritt Island, in Yolo County, may proceed to elect trustees...

Under this Act the land-owners organized the district by electing trustees and making a reclamation plan. A notice was given on the 7th day of April, 1874, that a meeting for the purposes stated would be held on the 18th day of April, and at that time the meeting was held...

This, says the Supreme Court, is all the Act required, so far as the organization of the district is concerned, and the points made by the appellant seeking to impeach the validity of the organization of the district cannot be considered.

It is claimed by appellants that the Act above referred to was clearly unconstitutional and gave the plaintiff no power to act, but no ground is shown upon which the claim is based.

It is claimed by the appellants that the assessment is invalid because the trustees in their statement to the Board of Supervisors did not specify the work which had already been done.

Unless the assessment is to be for work already done in whole or in part, there is no necessity for a statement as to what work has been done.

It is claimed by the appellant that the district "lost its corporate existence by reason of the assent of its functions to the political division of the county."

The opinion was written by Justice Patterson and concurred in by Justices Harrison and Garoutte.

The Supreme Court Explains the Powers of a Public Administrator. The Supreme Court has rendered its decision in the case of the Estate of Israel Sanborn, deceased, by J. R. Claves (appellant) vs. M. Peyton, affirming the judgment of the lower court of San Joaquin County.

Sanborn died, and Peyton filed in the Superior Court a petition in which it was averred that Sanborn left a will dated April 17, 1872, by which petitioner and one Severy were named as executors.

At the time of the hearing of the motion no one interested in the estate appeared to contest the probate of the will; but on February 3, 1892, J. R. Claves, who was Public Administrator of the county, filed in court a petition for let-

ters of administration of the estate of said Sanborn, in which he averred that he "has no knowledge whether said will was ever signed by Sanborn or any witnesses, and that to the best of his knowledge, information and belief the deceased died intestate."

The two petitions were heard together, and the court made an order admitting the will to probate and granting letters to the administrator, Peyton, and also an order denying the petition of the Public Administrator, Claves.

In sustaining the lower court the opinion says: "The probate of a will and the appointment of an administrator are contested only upon 'written grounds of opposition' filed by a 'person interested'—that is, interested in the estate, and not in the mere fact of an administration thereof."
