BUSINESS FAILURES.

One of the Largest Financial Operators in Sioux City Assigns.

SIoux City (Ia.), April 25.—D. T. Hodges, the largest financial operator here, filed an assignment for the benefit of his creditors this afternoon. There are no preferences. E. Hubbard is assignee.

The failure is attributed to the bad state of the money market and inability to sustain the Pacific Short Line and Sioux City and Northern railroad an individual credit. None of the local bankers or merchants are involved, but the Union Trust Company, through which much paper has been issued, will suffer.

Soon after Hodges' assignment, the Union Loan and Trust Company closed its doors as a measure to protect the interest of both creditors and depositors, owing to indorsements on customers' paper.

Hodges' liabilities include assets, stocks and bonds, including his California estate, is \$1,823,000.

AN OLD FIRM EMBARRASSED.

CHICAGO, April 25.—Gilles Bros., one of the oldest and largest wholesale and retail jewelry houses in the city, are financially embarrassed. Confession of judgment was entered against them, this afternoon, for over \$85,000.

HEAVY BANK FAILURE.

LONDON, April 25.—The suspension is announced of the London (chartered) Bank of Australia, capital, £1,000,000; reserve, £230,000. It has branches in London, Victoria, New South Wales and Queensland.

RECEIVER APPLIED FOR.

CHICAGO, April 25.—A bill asking for a receiver for the Lehigh Coal and Iron Company was filed in the United States Court to-day by James B. Hurl, receiver.

The bill is stated by the attorneys, who filed it at St. Paul, Milwaukee, Duluth, West Superior and Madison, Wis., in all of which cities the company has extensive interests. The assets are \$1,750,000 and the liabilities \$1,250,000. The complaint sets out that defendant is largely involved by promissory notes, direct and contingent. Its present liabilities for bills payable are \$280,835; contingent liabilities, \$235,577. The holders of these notes are coal companies and firms that are now insolvent. At Milwaukee, last night, L. R. Doty of Chicago was appointed receiver for the company.
