

ROCKLIN'S MISFORTUNE.

Two or three large bones visible, almost totally consumed by the heat. A bone, evidently from one of the animals which had been half burned away, protruded from the mass of debris.

Half the Town Wiped Out by an Early Morning Fire.

The fire continued down the street, in spite of all efforts to check it. The saloon and livery stable belonging to the DeWitt Porter soon caught from the fire.

LOSS A HUNDRED THOUSAND.

The fine new building recently erected by Louis Jodoin, and used for a residence and barber shop, sank to the earth before the surging flames in less than twenty minutes.

Miss Alice Irish's Terrible Death in a Burning Hotel.

The boarding-house of Joe Disano, Rocklin, located at the corner of Broadway and the new building, occupied by S. P. Doane, local justice of the peace, Arthur G. the tailor, and Frank Pollini, a shoe dealer, the Clendinning family's boarding-house and dwelling, Mrs. Van Tree's boarding-house and dwelling, Longgan's candy store and Mrs. M. E. Stueder's boarding-house all went in their respective order.

WAS IT THE WORK OF A FIEND?

The above buildings were all on Front street which was burned over. In Clow's blacksmith shop, Peter Ertie's wagon shop, Mrs. Hoy's dwelling and Miss Alice Irish's dwelling.

Suspicious Conduct of the Hotel Cook, who Had Threatened the Deceased—His Arrest in This City Yesterday.

For the second time within eight years the town of Rocklin, Placer County, on the line of the Central Pacific Railroad, has been nearly wiped out by fire. The former conflagration left but one or two buildings in the place, while the one that occurred yesterday morning wiped out the north half of the town, including the chief business portion, and burned to death a young woman named Miss Alice Irish, formerly of Georgetown, El Dorado County, who was employed as waitress in the dining-room of the Davies Hotel.

SENSATIONAL DEVELOPMENTS.

The fire believed to have been an incendiary work. The following special dispatch to the RECORD-UNION last night, from C. E. Dunkell, borders on the sensational. Two arrests have been made, one of the prisoners, a Swedish cook, having been taken in custody here yesterday by Sheriff Conroy, he having slid out of Rocklin by the first train that passed after the fire broke out. Following is the dispatch:

DEVELOPMENTS AT THE INQUEST.

Rocklin, May 25.—The coroner's inquest held over the remains of Miss Alice Irish, who was burned to death in the fire here this morning, promises to bring out some facts regarding the origin of the conflagration which may have an interesting if not serious termination.
