A REBUKED CITY.

The San Jose officials made asses of themselves in passing and enforcing an ordinance forbidding the Salvation Army, the Florence Mission and other similar bodies the right to preach, sing and pray on the business streets.

These processions for political, religious and social demonstration resulted in the express purpose of keeping unity of feeling and enthusiasm, and frequently to produce some effect on the public mind by the spectacle of union and numbers.

The court was unquestionably right when it declared that the attempt made under the ordinance was an abridgment of the common right of the people.

It was in repression of the right to assemble and to address the people. It was in violation of the right to parade the streets so long as order is observed and the public tranquility not invaded.

The court proceeded to warm the ears of the city of San Jose in a way that must have made the cheeks of honest Americans flame. It plainly and firmly denounced the ordinance as putting San Jose on record as condemning even a Sunday-school marching with banners in the streets.

It pointed out that the "law" was not aimed at street fakers, windy political orators, lodges and societies with torches and bands—all these could possess the streets at will, but religious bodies must not move through the precious highways of higher moral San Jose.

Doubtless if ever that pretentious city gets the Legislature in a way that would smile upon a dime Legislature moving through the streets on the road to the unmentionable quarter, but by such a "law" as this silly ordinance it would prohibit a decent body of citizens worshipping Almighty God upon the public streets.

The decision of the court is one of the most stinging rebukes to intolerance ever administered. It points out how un-American and dangerous such doctrines as the ordinance inculcates, are. If one party in power may prohibit one class of assemblages, still another party may stop their rivals from assembling in public. Even in Chicago, the anarchists and socialists are not, and cannot be, forbidden the right to march in the streets.

They can be held accountable only for infraction of the laws of peace applying to all people.

Now that San Jose has been rebuked in its own household for intolerance, un-Americanism and ignorance of the constitutional rights of its citizens, we may expect a little less fuss and feathers about the supreme model that city is supposed to constitute. Certainly no other city in Christendom has been made such an ass of as San Jose by its delectable Commission Council.

OBEDIENT ORDERS.

Discipline is an admirable thing. As a rule it is to be regarded as inflexible. To obey orders though it breaks the owners is a necessity in most large enterprises, since it is necessary that authority be reposed in headship which can be held responsible. But we may seriously consider whether it was not carrying the law of authority to the extreme when the officers of Admiral Tryon's fleet saw that

to obey him meant death and destruction.

It is in testimony now, and conceded to be undeniable, that this careful and experienced commander, at the very moment when his judgment should have been of greatest value, issued an order impossible of execution without collision between some two or more of the great iron ships of his fleet. One of the subordinate commanders did hesitate, as was his duty under the rule to "avoid collisions," and signaled back to Admiral Tryon that there must be some mistake, that the ships could not turn in the space allotted to them; but the imperative order came back to execute the movement, and it was done, though the commander of the Campden knew that it meant the destruction of his own or the other chief ship of the fleet.

Had Markham refused to carry out an order that was unwise, even insane of character, the devoted men of the Victoria who perished would in all probability today be alive. But suppose the subordinate Admiral had disobeyed, he would have been court-martialed and probably have been disgraced. He might have shown clearly that to obey was innocent and meant death to hundreds of innocent beings, still as it was his duty to obey he would have been punished for disobedience. But he could afford to suffer that others might live; he could have better sacrificed himself than do that which he says he knew must result in a collision that he had every reason to believe would be disastrous.

It must forever remain a mystery why Admiral Tryon made the order that he did. With his brilliant record as an officer, his very long experience, his knowledge of the fact that the ships he was commanding were reckless in their force when under ordinary speed, it is inexplicable that he should have commanded a movement that by the slightest accident to steering gear would have brought on a collision, even if there had been room in plenty in which to swing the ships about.

There is but one verdict at which in charity to the dead we can arrive—Tryon must have been insane, momentarily demented. For it is in testimony that the aid at his side warned him that there was not room sufficient in which to execute the movement he had ordered, but his reply was "Let her go." Certainly the man was insane—it is impossible to credit him with sanity in the act, so long as we credit him also with ability to command, under normal conditions, and that of that there was no question.

THE NEED FOR IT.

Says the Maxwell Mercury: Apropos to the Good Road Convention to meet at Sacramento on September 7th, we remark that we are in favor of good roads and have seen some of the best on the continent, but they were not made by a convention.

That is the old, old song. Why, neighbor, a convention was necessary to found the Republic; it took a convention to put California into the Union; a convention was at the bottom of all the liberties you enjoy; a convention put on foot the reform that gives to all men equal rights before the law; a convention framed the Declaration of Independence. Of course a convention will not build roads. But it will bring men of ideas together to consult as to what a good road is. As it now is the question "what is a good road?" would be answered in about as many ways as we have counties.

In a convention only can there be exchange of ideas, comparison of data, and the communication of intelligence in a compact form concerning the advances made in what is now recognized as a science—road building. Are you not aware, neighbor, that in the matter of road construction there have been made in recent years exceeding great advances? We wish to consult about them, to ascertain how far they are applicable to California conditions. We wish to learn what are the obstructions in the way of good road building in this State. It is desirable to create public opinion of the right brand concerning the influence good road agitation will exercise in upbuilding this State, and augmenting its prosperity.

The convention is the popular tribunal that tries public sentiment. It is by convening that we can best consult with one another in order to secure harmony of action. Of course, we repeat, the convention will build no roads. But the simple fact that such a convention convenes in will do an immense work for California in Eastern estimation. The counties might, 'tis true, build good roads as it is, without any convention to discuss methods and economies in that direction. But they do not do it, and for the simple reason that nine out of ten of all our counties are away behind science, discovery and accomplishment in other States and Territories. The truth is, that the people interested in roads need to consult, and not once but several times in convention.

THE SEWER COMMISSION. The experiences at Govan prove that the subsoil of a city may be polluted by noxious gases. In that place, in the use of compressed air to tunnel under streets, the subsoil gases were forced upward and occasioned much sickness. The cesspool system, no matter in what soil used, tends to poison the earth and charge it with these disease-breeding gases. The sooner a city abandons the cesspool system, therefore, the better, for the more the city grows the worse the evil becomes.

The year is slipping away and Sacramento has as yet no report from its sewer commission as to what ought to be done here. The commission is acting only semi-officially and is without compensation. The gentlemen composing it are public-spirited, and give their time and talents to the work of investigation freely. But in the light of the experiences of other cities we submit that it ought not to take months to report in favor of some system adapted to this city. We believe the chemical deposition plan to be best and more economical for Sacramento; but we are not tied to it. What the Rec-

ORD-UNION, in the name of the people asks for, is rapidity of action and an early definite report.

We ought to know very soon what we can do or should do, to give us a system that will enable us to abandon the cesspools, and cease poisoning the soil. If it is at all possible the commission should report before the summer closes, that the preliminary steps may be taken for introducing a new system. It may become necessary when the commission reports to submit some questions to the popular vote at the fall election. But such questions should be suggested early enough to enable the people to thoroughly digest and debate them prior to the election day.

The San Francisco Chronicle has entered the lists against the "Ladies' Entrance Saloons," and publishes an article which we reprint, and that will prove a revelation to a good many people. The charge is made direct that the "Ladies' Entrance Saloons" are greatly worse than the dives, and that intemperance among the women of San Francisco is increasing so alarmingly that it can no longer be ignored. The article from the Chronicle includes the statement of a leading San Francisco physician, to which we invite special attention.

COMMANDER CAMPBELL of the Army and Navy Union administered a fitting public rebuke to Governor Alfteld at the patriotic Sunday exercises at the World's Fair. He probably put it rather strong when he said that the Governor stood ready to substitute the red flag of the anarchist for the stars and stripes. But clearly the anarchists themselves look upon the Governor's act as a triumph for their flag, and they do not hesitate to say so in the open.
