THE DYNAMITE OUTRAGE AND LABOR.
The activity in San Francisco among the police authorities in the endeavor to ferret out the guilty in the dynamite outrage and massacre is very gratifying.

The Placer Herald thinks that the RECORD-UNION contradicts itself when it objects to employing prison labor on public highways, but favors convict labor within prison walls.

The Fresno Expositor approves the suggestion of the RECORD-UNION that as fast as tramps are landed at the winter quarters they seek, the County Jails, they are entitled to. But it would be far more creditable to them to set on foot methods for finding Sorenson, the fellow who left the sack of dynamite at the lodging-house only a few blocks distant from the scene of the explosion, and so short a time before that event.

in all the State were labor organizations in Sacramento.
For the sake of honest labor, for the sake of common humanity and for the sake of organized labor there will go up everywhere such protest of expression and action in condemnation of the outrage in San Francisco as will do honor to the courage and the cause of labor. Its enemies could wish for nothing better than silence on its part on this subject.

Unless we greatly mistake the spirit and the Americanism in the ranks of labor there will be manifest such temper concerning this massacre as will put at rest any insinuations that the honest toilers of the land have anything but abhorrence for the dynamiters and assassins. Whatever labor has to contend for it cannot afford to have even the meanness in the land think for an instant that it consorts with wretches who would employ such means against opponents as were used on Sunday in San Francisco.

This country is no place for the dynamiter; it ought to afford no room for the anarchist whose preaching and performance are not only absurd and murderous, but wholly antagonistic to the scheme of free government, and the institutions of the republic. We have not the slightest fear that the dynamite anarchist gang will ever obtain any considerable footing in this country. They claim a membership of 200,000, but it cannot be established. If they have a beggarly 500 of assassin preachers and believers, we are much mistaken. But against the further recruiting of even so small a number of Mafiaites from the slums of Europe, we ought from this time forward to put up the bars. Their kind is not wanted and cannot be tolerated.

Indeed, such is our faith in the spirit of Americanism and free institutions that we expect to early see the anarchist debarred from landing on our shores. Those here may preach at will. They should not be prevented the exercise of free speech within the law. It is the surest way to their extirpation to let them advocate the torch and the bomb; the ordinary criminal laws are equal to their cases when they overstep the bounds of privilege and liberty.

RUINED CAPITAL OF SIAM.
Ayuthia, Once a Magnificent City, Now Has No Vestige of a House.
The remains of the old capital of Siam, Ayuthia, which was taken and destroyed by the Burmese in 1767, are on the banks of the Menam, about 120 miles above Bangkok, says the New York Tribune.

That this was not the case was proved in 1768, when the Burmese, after a two years' siege, took the town and destroyed it. Deluges of rain, followed by blazing heat, have reduced a once large and magnificent city to a dismal, howling waste. The view from a remaining tower is dreary enough. Where once were canals crowded with shipping and streets teeming with a busy population can now be seen only clumps of green bamboo and wild shrubs, forming in many places an impenetrable jungle.

ORDINANCE NO. 319.
An Ordinance to Amend Section 16 of Chapter II of Ordinance No. 17, entitled "An Ordinance Consolidating and Codifying the Ordinances of the City of Sacramento," Passed June 27th, 1872, Relating to Licenses.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE City of Sacramento do ordain as follows: Section 16. Section 16 of Chapter II of Ordinance No. 17, entitled "An Ordinance Consolidating and Codifying the Ordinances of the City of Sacramento," passed June 27, 1872, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 16. The manager or lessee of any theater, company of singers, serenaders or minstrels, proprietors of any menagerie, panorama, or other exhibition, or performance, or other fee is charged, shall pay for the same fifteen dollars per month; for any less time, five dollars for each exhibition or performance, excepting when the net proceeds are given for any charitable purpose; provided, that all circuses shall pay a license of fifty dollars per day.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately. Passed September 4, 1893. B. U. STEINMAN, President of the Board of Trustees, J. D. YOUNG, Clerk. 819-104

ORDINANCE NO. 320.
An Ordinance Providing for Painting Posts and Poles in the Public Streets.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE City of Sacramento do ordain as follows: Section 1. All posts or poles for the support of or supporting telephone, telegraph or electric wires, or wires of any description now erected and being in, upon or along any of the streets of Sacramento City, or that may hereafter be erected, with the exception of those used for fire alarm system, which are already painted red, under the jurisdiction of the Board of Fire Commissioners, shall be by the person, company or contractor making the change, custody or control thereof, be within thirty days after the passage of this ordinance, painted with two or more coats of good and durable paint as follows: That portion extending from the surface of the ground or street to a line six feet above such surface shall be painted in black, and all the portion above shall be painted in white.

Section 2. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon a conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the City Prison not exceeding ten days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the Board of Trustees.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage. Passed September 15, 1893. B. U. STEINMAN, President of the Board of Trustees, J. D. YOUNG, Clerk. 819-104
