Weather Forecasts.
 Official forecast for the twenty-four hours ending at midnight October 9th: Northern California—Rain in the northern portion; fair, followed by rain in the southern; cool; southerly winds.

We do not recall in the history of the country an incident of all like that which is signified by the letter of United States District Judge Ross to United States Attorney-General Olney. Certainly the letter is a very plain and incisive response to the Attorney-General and will call out wide comment. It is likewise characterized by vigor, and may be said to be a defense by the judiciary of its position that the law which Mr. Olney says is crippled in execution for want of funds, is not in fact so hampered, but that its non-enforcement is due to the indecision and unfriendliness of the Department of Justice. While we have not thought that the charges of intent to subvert the law in the matter of Chinese deportation worthy of serious consideration, and do not for a moment believe that the President of the United States has at any time intended to usurp the function of the law or suspend the operation of any law, we concede that the view of the United States District Judge from his standpoint is strongly taken, and that there could be no more dangerous attack upon constitutional liberty than an attempt to suspend the vitality of a statute the people's representatives have enacted. But there is no evidence that the President has made any such attempt. There is a difference of opinion as to whether there is a fund directly applicable for the deportation of Chinese who are found by the courts to be unlawfully in the country. Congress is in session and it can with ease and in briefest time furnish means sufficient to completely set at rest that doubt. If it does not do so the dominant party, which has the control in Congress, certainly must bear the burden of complaint.

The practical joker will never learn; no amount of warning moves him; examples of the folly of his fun have no effect upon him. Three young men of Monterey resolved to play a joke upon a fourth. Three, including the victim, were to be commanded to halt by a supposed highwayman and a fight was to follow, but to avoid harm the gun of the victim was supplied with no shot or ball. When the "stand-up" took place, however, the victim, finding his gun useless because of a harmless cartridge, slipped a genuine one into his weapon, and firing upon his assailant, inflicted such wounds that the man died on Saturday. It is very doubtful if the killer can be held for any unlawful act. In fact, he acted in good faith, and believing that he was menaced by a road knight, fired upon him, just as any other man would have done. As for the unfortunate youth who was shot, there cannot be expended upon his memory much sympathy, for the reason that he engaged in a foolish and dangerous enterprise, took all the chances of the joke being transformed into a tragedy, and the result is that he is dead. But will this tragic affair teach a lesson to the practical jokers that they will regard? No; the same old disposition to involve some one in trouble, or fear, or danger, for the sake of fun, will crop out as usual in all the Monterey section. When, however, the practical joker kills or seriously wounds some unfortunate upon whom he plays his pranks, there ought to follow prosecution of the guilty, and the punishment should be such that fear would follow and serve as a deterrent, to some extent at least.

The action of the Diplomatic Corps in Rio must not be mistaken for foreign intervention. The Ministers have demanded of the Government protection for the lives and property of their people, not only from the shells of the rebels, but from the assaults of the Government soldiers, who, it is claimed, act the hoodlum and the rough in the streets and in house searches, resulting in disorder and criminal assaults. To this demand the Government has responded by dismantling the city forts, with the understanding that the rebels will not bombard the city any longer. As to intervention in the domestic broil in Brazil, there is no

reason to support it, and any attempt in that direction would be impertinence, as things now stand.
 A BREAK in the aqueduct supplying Hamburg with filtered water permitted water from the river Elbe to flow in. The result was that in a short time the cholera broke out virulently. The water was then tested and the microbes of cholera were easily detected. Only a few days ago the repairs on the viaduct were completed, and almost at once the cholera disappeared from the city. This sustains the water carriage theory, but it is not favorable to the doctrine that filtration does not remove disease microbes.

The further nominations by organized bodies for Trusteeships gives the people a broader field and a greater number from which to choose the membership of the new local legislature. In making such choice, the rule should be to select with a view of securing men who are capable, free from control, progressive, and more devoted to city than to party interests.

The Vigilant has won. But this is only one of five tests of speed that are to determine whether the America cup remains with us or goes back across the ocean. Let us restrain our enthusiasm awhile.

ORDINANCE No. 36.
 Granting to the Sacramento Electric Power and Light Company, a Corporation, the Right of Way and Privileges to Construct, Maintain and Operate One or More Systems for Generating and Transmitting Electric Energy for Electric Light, Power, Heat, and Such Other Purposes as Electricity May Now or Hereafter be Used for, from the Works and Canals of the Folsom Water Power Company, its Successors or Assigns.
 THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE County of Sacramento, State of California, do ordain as follows:
 Section 1. That I hereby grant to the Sacramento Electric Power and Light Company, a corporation, its successors or assigns, the right to use and occupy in the County of Sacramento, and in and upon the highways, roads, avenues, thoroughfares and public grounds, and such other poles, wires, and other conductors for the transmission or conducting of electricity as may be necessary for supplying the county and its inhabitants, and to any municipal or private corporation, electric energy for electric light, electric power, heat, and such other purposes, and for such other use of electricity as may now or hereafter be practicable.
 Section 2. That no poles, masts, or other appliances for supporting the wires or other means of conducting electricity above the surface of the roads, avenues, thoroughfares, and other public grounds of said county, shall be of sufficient height to cause no interference with public utility, and shall be placed in position under the supervision of the Board of Supervisors.
 Section 3. The rights and privileges herein granted shall continue and be in force for a period of fifty years from and after the date of approval of this ordinance.
 Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force fifteen days from and after its passage.
