Orders Just Issued by the Adjutant-General.

Changes in the Several Regiments—Leaves of Absence—Resignations Accepted, Etc.

WAGNER AND MELROY.

They Will Enjoy Sheriff O'Neil's Chicken Dinners Awhile. Judge Buckley yesterday listened to the plea of guilty from Albert Wagner and Frank Melroy for stealing chickens from Maria Fountain and T. G. Filers.

C. P. Jones, counsel for the defense, asked the leniency of the court for Wagner, and he had promised to avoid such trouble in the future. The court said the offense was one that differed from ordinary petty larceny cases, as it involved the liberty that the owner might have taken a shot at the thief and kill him, as had been done during the past winter, or might go out to investigate, with the result of harm to both parties.

Juanita Klebs and Sagaridas Whitlock, heirs of Maria Guadalupe Romero de Ruiz, deceased, have petitioned the Superior Court, through their attorney, Harry Soule, for an order directing all persons interested in the estate to appear and show cause why so much of the property of the estate should not be sold as may be necessary to pay certain outstanding demands.

Trout for El Dorado Streams. The Placerville Republican states that W. D. Sisson and Mr. Sullivan arrived there recently with 15,000 Eastern and Dolly Varden trout to be planted in the streams of El Dorado County. Deputy Fish Commissioner Smith made arrangements to distribute them, and he extends thanks to the business men and others of Placerville who contributed a fund of \$21 to pay the expense of transportation to the streams.

Moyning's Failure. H. Fisher & Co., the A. S. Hopkins Company, Mobius & Drescher, Louis Saroni and John Meister have applied to the Superior Court to have J. A. Moyning, the well-known confectioner, declared an involuntary insolvent debtor. The petitioners allege that Moyning has made a transfer of his assets to William Larkin with intent to delay, defraud and hinder his creditors. The amount of their claims is \$705.50.

Eden Wadsworth's Estate. D. D. Whitbeck, M. J. Curtis and Sam Nathan, appraisers of the estate of Eden Wadsworth, deceased, have filed their report in the Superior Court, showing the value of the estate to be estimated at \$3,000. Caroline Wadsworth, administratrix of the estate, also petitioned the court for an order setting apart the estate to her, the widow of deceased.

STEINMAN'S PLATFORM.

He Outlines His Policy in a Letter of Acceptance.

There is No Love Between Him and the Machine Politicians, and He Has No Boss.

B. U. Steinman has addressed the following letter to the committee of the Reorganized Democracy who informed him of his nomination for Mayor: SACRAMENTO, Oct. 12, 1893. Messrs. Sol, Nathan, Lee, P. Bell and W. J. Hardy—GENTLEMEN: You have waited upon me as a committee of the Reorganized Democracy of Sacramento, and have asked me to accept the nomination for Mayor of this city made by your recent municipal convention.

I recognize no political boss, or set of bosses. It seems to me that the citizens of Sacramento are sufficiently intelligent to manage their own affairs without the kind assistance of those who do not work, but who grow fat on political jobs. It is probably unnecessary for me to say that the machine politicians have no liking for me, and I can assure them that the feeling is reciprocated. I have no love for them, and laugh at their threats.


