

THE SALOONS AGAIN.

Two More Licenses Revoked by the Board of Trustees.

Snarr's Sewer Contract Thrown Up and Dalton Gets It—Low Lots and Sewer Matters.

A large crowd of bidders and others assembled at the room of the City Trustees yesterday morning, and listened to the decisions of the board on various questions. Mrs. S. W. Kay addressed the board depicting the condition of the sewer on S street, between Fourteenth and Fifteenth, which was broken, she stated, last winter, and whenever the brewery lets off water "it was enough to knock a person down," and rendered it almost impossible for people to reside in the vicinity. The matter was reported, she said, once last winter and once last spring. Street Commissioner Green said that this place had not been reported to him. It was fixed last winter, and he had supposed it was all right. The pipe joints were disconnected, but the pipe was not broken—it was simply pulled apart. It would take \$1,000 to fill up the low ground there and put it in proper shape, and the expense would be too great. He would look after the matter, however. The matter was referred to him, with power to act.

The applications of Gray and Ferguson to keep a saloon at 1017 Eighth street, where the notorious Anderson place was, and that of Baker and Estabrook, as successors to Trapp, were both referred to the Police Commissioners. The former place has two contestants for its possession, D. E. Hite holding a receipt for the rent.

Chief of Police Rodgers requested the board to revoke the licenses of the International Saloon at 84 K street and the Steamboat Saloon at Front and K streets. He stated that the first had been in trouble twice lately, a man having been robbed of his watch and \$50 there last week. It is the headquarters of all the sure-things men who come to this city. The Steamboat Saloon is the resort of hobos, who gather there to the annoyance of citizens.

Mayor Steinman said he was not opposed to saloons, but he was opposed to the closing of such places for the public good. Trustee Green agreed with him, and the licenses were revoked on his motion.

THE R-STREET SEWER CONTRACT. William Snarr asked for an extension of time on his contract to construct the sewer between Front and K streets, from V to Y, for forty-five days. Owing to a misunderstanding with the pipe-maker he could not get the pipe in time, as it will take three weeks to make it. "We can't get it in time for any such time," said the Mayor. "The people down there must be protected. It is late in the season now and I don't want to see them kept in dirty water again, as they were last winter. They are in a bad way down there. They pay taxes as well as the rest of our citizens and are entitled to relief. I do not want to make Mr. Snarr lose his \$15 deposit for what is no fault of his own, but he must get it better refunded and let him throw his contract."

"If you do that," said G. A. Dainton, "I am the next lowest bidder, and I will go on right away and finish it." "But there is considerable difference between your bid and Mr. Snarr's," said Mr. Steinman. "How much will be the difference in the cost?" It was ascertained that it would be about \$75. "Well," said the Mayor, "if that is all, the season being so late, I think we can better afford to give it than to delay. The pipe Dainton uses will be made here and the money for the labor will be spent here and give laborers here employment."

The bid of Dainton was ordered accepted and the \$15 deposit of Snarr returned to him. MUST COME DOWN. A communication from N. Zemansky was received asking that he might have an extension of time for pulling down his awning until spring, in order that he might put up a new awning, put down a new sidewalk and put a new front in his building at Third and J streets all at the same time. The Mayor put a decided veto on it. "If we grant him till spring," said he, "several other things will be done. The awnings are all coming down. This man wants the sidewalk. He rents a shoemaker's stall now which is on the sidewalk, which belongs to the city. The ordinance must be enforced."

The other Trustees acquiesced. BIDS FOR SEWERS AND PIPE. The bids for 2,000 feet of iron pipe for the R-street sewer were opened. Holbrook, Merrill & Stetson's bid for immediate delivery was \$1,027.50, for delivery in two weeks, \$1,237. Baked & Hamilton, \$1,120 for delivery in three days, and \$900 in twenty days; the Sacramento Pipe Works, \$860, and Crane & Co., \$28.50 per foot for 30-pound pipe, or \$285. The contract was awarded to Baked & Hamilton.

Rosa & Silva and the City Street Improvement Company were the bidders on the sewer in the alley between I and J, Eighth and Ninth streets, and the latter secured the contract. G. A. Dainton was the only bidder on the sewer in the alley between Seventh and Eighth, P and Q streets, and as his bid was a reasonable one, the contract was awarded to him.

LOW LOTS. A communication was received stating that the low lots between D and E, Tenth and Eleventh streets, ought to be filled before winter sets in again, and asking the board to order it done. The matter was referred to the Street Commissioner, with power to act. The residents in the block on R, between Sixth and Seventh streets, were opposed to the improvement of that street, and as Trustee Green said that the only way to do was to fill it, it was decided to drop the matter.

MISCELLANEOUS. The petition of Jacob Olsen to have the board declare closed the streets between Twentieth and Twenty-third, A and B south, and Twentieth and Twenty-second, A and B north, was granted, there being no opposition, as Mr. Olsen has leased in his land and it is a protection to the city levees at that point. A communication was received from R. T. Devlin stating that Judge Prewitt had decided that voters could not vote on certificates, but that they must be on the printed card register. On motion of the Mayor, the clerk will notify all the inspectors not to allow certificates to be voted on. Resolutions of intention to improve the alley between P and Q, Third and Fourth streets, and U street from Twelfth to Thirteenth, were passed. A citizen stated that since the board had filled the city's lots between P and Q,

Fourth and Fifth streets, the children had to walk through the dust up to their ankles, and asked if it could not be remedied. On motion of the Mayor, a sidewalk will be laid there. The board ordered that the street be graded and sidewalks be constructed on Tenth street, from Q to Y. Mayor Steinman moved that when the board adjourn it do so out of respect to the memory of Carter Harrison, Chicago's murdered Mayor, and the motion was carried.

The usual bills were allowed.

CITY BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Miss Flynn is Elected to Fill Miss Heany's Place.

Miss Kaerth Elected Substitute—High School Drawing Recommended But Action Deferred.

The City Board of Education held a meeting last night, all the directors being present except Dr. Gardner. The Furniture and Supply Committee reported that they had put in some desks at the Orphan Asylum, and put in a platform around the schoolroom of the first and second grades. They were authorized to purchase an oil stove for Sixteenth and N, and to purchase new desks for the Capital Primary School, a dozen chairs for different schools, and a piano for the Seventh and G school. The Building and Repair Committee reported that they had performed the work laid out for them at the last meeting, and recommended that the drainage pipes of the roofs at Sixteenth and N, and Seventh and G-street schools be looked after and repaired, and they were authorized so to do.

The Committee on Course of Study to whom was referred the matter of drawing in connection with the course of study at the High School, reported that their opinion mechanical drawing would be profitable to the course of study and acceptable to the school, and submitted the offer of the Crocker Art Association to give one lesson a week at the rooms of the association at a cost of \$800, to the consideration of the board. The report was received and placed on file. James Sadler reported to the board that he had inspected the sidewalk laid down by the City Improvement Company around the block at Tenth and Eleventh, P and Q streets, and found it satisfactory done except the walk on Tenth street, which was not laid down, not having been sufficiently settled or tamped and may need repairing within six months. He recommends that the contract price of \$1,000 be paid, less 10 per cent, and that amount be withheld for six months at least. The Superintendent was instructed to equalize over crowded classes, irrespective of districts.

Superintendent Hart announced the death of Miss Alice Heany, teacher of the third grade in the Jefferson Primary School. A vacancy having been caused by the death of Miss Heany, the board proceeded to elect a teacher in her place. Mr. Crouch nominated Miss Ada Flynn. Mr. Chipman nominated Miss Eda Heany. ANOTHER PLAZA.

The Fifteenth and P Streets Square is Being Improved. People who have not visited the southeastern part of the city for some weeks would scarcely recognize the public square between Fifteenth and Sixteenth, P and Q streets, where during the summer just past the farmers had their hay-market. Some months since Felix Tracy, C. A. Luhrs and a few other property-owners in that part of the city appeared before the Trustees and asked the city to have the market removed and the square improved. The board acted promptly on the suggestion, and now the main portion of the work has been completed. The block has been graded several feet, to bring it to the high grade, and a cement walk has been constructed all around the block. The park will be seeded to grass and planted with shade trees. The hand-saw fountain in the Improvement Association building, near the depot, will be placed in the center of the square, and walks will be laid out similar to those in the plaza at Tenth and J streets. The improvement of the square will be a great addition to that part of the city, and will enhance the value of property in the neighborhood, as well as provide the people with a delightful spot for recreation.

STATE BOARD OF HORTICULTURE. A Consultation with the Governor in Regard to Certain Charges. The members of the State Board of Horticulture met Governor Markham at his office yesterday, by his invitation, to consider certain charges made by the Fruit-Growers' Association as to their conduct in regard to the introduction of insects destructive to the fruit pests, which, it is said, brought about the withdrawal of the Government officials and the difficulty between Secretary Morton and Elwood Cooper, the great olive-grower of the coast.
