PLAIN DUTY OF THE TRUSTEES. The RECORD-UNION immediately after the late election, and the announcement that certain incumbents of city offices would decline to vacate, took the position that it is the duty of the City Trustees to defend the new charter against all opponents.

This morning these officers to-be will appear before the Trustees and demand their certificates of election. The board should issue them without further demur. It is not a judicial board, and has the one duty to perform of obeying the directions of the law as expressed in the new charter. It has nothing whatever to do with consequences nor with the interpretation of the law as to whether the new charter is a valid document.

How is this! how is this! snow in the southern citrus belt on the 16th of November. Well, well; here is a matter that demands investigation. We had thought all along that only in the central and northern sections of the State was it necessary for the orange trees to wear overcoats, and the semi-tropical plants to grow with mittens and wraps.

The splendid run of the new cruiser of the navy, the Columbia, which is described in our telegraphic columns, puts her at the head of swift warships of the world and gives to the navy of the United States a most enviable position. It establishes our ability to turn out ships of war surpassing in speed any yet constructed, and in other respects it is not questioned that we are equal to the task of equipping as formidable a naval force as any nation of the world.

But we will not want to do so. England, with her four hundred vessels of war, can keep the number at that notch. The United States does not need to rival her or any other nation in that respect. The likelihood is that we will gradually increase our force until it touches the one hundred mark; but it is unlikely that we will ever go to the enormous expense of maintaining such a formidable number of warships as European nations think essential to their dignity and necessities.

The Cashier of the Bank of England advanced \$1,000,000 to certain parties on securities that the directory do not deem sufficient. That is all there is in the story of the insolvency of the bank as telegraphed. That institution is able to stand three or five times that strain, even if it should be considered a total loss.

The news from Hawaii does not warrant the sensational conjurings of the past week by those who have been swift to condemn the letter of the State Department. It is not shown that the Minister of the United States at Honolulu assumed any belligerent position towards the Provisional Government, or that he placed this Government in any humiliating or even embarrassing attitude.

The Oakland Times in commenting upon the remarks of the RECORD-UNION relative to the proposed repeal of the 10 per cent. tax on State banks of issue, insists that when that is done it will be within the powers of the States to make such issues perfectly secure by requiring surties to be put up ample to cover all possible losses. Of that there is no doubt. But it must be kept in mind that there is no power to compel the States to so provide. It may be admitted, however, that the disfavor with which notes would be received not backed by such State provisions would have a tendency to bring all the States into the desired policy.

THE Yosemite Theater, Stockton, a notably fine structure, one of the best, and one admirably appointed, has been closed. The reason given by the owners is that good attractions demand 80 per cent of the receipts, leaving too little to meet expenses, and nothing for the investment. The Stockton people are growling, but the management is right. Traveling theatrical combinations that insist in carting out of a place eighty cents of every dollar taken in, ought to be themselves carted out, and to stay. Nine out of ten of the Eastern companies that come to California make much money—a good deal more than they can make at home. They charge double prices here and demand the lion's share of the receipts, and the wolf's share besides, leaving interior managers the dry bones and debts. We can better do without these Eastern showmen than submit to such extortion as they have practiced in seven cases out of ten.

The story that Admiral Mello has proclaimed the young grandson of the late Emperor as rightful ruler in Brazil, and that he has the young man now on the flagship, is without any sufficient support. It does not stand in reason to be true. Under no circumstances could a valid claim be set up for the Prince so long as his mother lives and is competent. To give the yarn its quietus there is a direct dispatch from the father of the Prince that the youth is in France and not in Brazil.
