

PROPOSED FRUIT EXCHANGE.

Plan Suggested for Placer County Fruit-Growers.

Report Presented to the Committee of Seventeen at Newcastle Yesterday.

A meeting of Placer County fruit-growers was held at Newcastle yesterday, at which J. Parker Whitney submitted a report expressing his ideas of what kind of an organization should be formed to further the interests of the fruit men.

ROCKLIN, January 4, 1894.

To the Committee of Seventeen, appointed by the mass meeting of Placer County Fruit-Growers, to consider and report concerning a proposed Placer County Fruit-Growers' Association.

GENTLEMEN: Appointed at my meeting of December 21st, with P. K. Butler and Captain McCann, to attend the State Growers' Convention at San Francisco on December 29th, and to report to you at your Newcastle meeting on January 4th, I will present the following, which you will please consider as entirely independent of the committee report, which Mr. Butler has prepared, and will present in which your committee are fully agreed.

I may reasonably be supposed that the company can have a first-class credit, and that it can by its profits derived from selling a large quantity of boxes and packing material, and by packing fruit for growers, realize a considerable profit.

It is estimated that over 1,500,000 boxes were used by Placer County fruit-growers last year, which were supplied by local fruit-buying houses at a large profit, and it is apparent that from this source alone the proposed company would receive a substantial return, if it should receive a proper support.

It is a feature of the greatest importance, and one which is generally admitted, but not so generally realized in the public sense, is that in its valuable bearing upon the fruit interests of Placer County, and upon the future reputation of the company and the distinctive profits to be gained, is that of the care which should be exercised in the grading and packing of fruit.

I have heard so many times reiterated again and again by the fruit sellers in Eastern markets who have continually laid such stress upon this point, that I am sure this feature cannot be too seriously considered by the company.

I believe, however, that an organization can be made which will be successful, if, ordinarily well managed.

I will, therefore, without further delay present a plan I have in view and give independent suggestions for your consideration.

That Cold Theater. EDS. RECORD-UNION: As an old theater-goer permit me to thank you for the drubbing the RECORD-UNION gave the Metropolitan Theater proprietors for the disgraceful condition of the theater as to temperature.

Heat is such a matter that now in the Metropolitan, and placed as that is, will warm the dress circle and gallery. But twenty furnaces will not warm the parquet when no furnace pipes lead to it.

The stage space is over one-third of the whole theater proper. It never can be heated by registers discharging under the gallery. Tons of coal and wood in dozens of burners will not do the work.

The stage must be heated independently, and it should be so heated, which removes fire risks completely. Auxiliary pipes should lead from the stage pipes beneath the parquet floor in three lines, central and east and west, in closed boxes, with half a dozen floor-gratings to admit of the passage of the warm air and shut out the income of cold, damp air.

Furnace pipes cannot be led beneath the parquet for the reason that the floor is too low. Three lines of three steam pipes, two inches each, leading close to and beneath the stage floor, and under gratings, with trap closing device when not in use, and thence leading down into and beneath the parquet floor, through closed boxing and beneath half a dozen gratings or registers will with ten pounds pressure of steam warm the stage, under the stage chairs, the auditorium, and all the other devices.

It is this system which is employed at the East, and that on a different scale is used in railway cars. The cost of such a plan is less than any other, and its maintenance cost is very low, much lower than that of hot air.

With such heating fixtures related to the mill boilers to the theater, or a small boiler, the pressure will be maintained, the Metropolitan Theater can be made as comfortable as a parlor, even if the temperature outside is down to freezing.

The Board of Examiners decided after listening to their views that it would be proper for them to do so, as the law gives them very large discretion in expending their appropriation, stating that it must be expended in fostering the sale of products of the vine.

Therefore the source of revenue for the company would, without increasing the average prices now paid by the fruit-growers, be— First—The profits on boxing materials, which should equal 25 per cent on the value of the fruit.

Second—The profits on selling commissions of 2 per cent. Third—The interest profits, equal to 4 per cent, per annum upon advances made.

It would be desirable to have it fully and clearly understood by all those who would engage in the company as stockholders that they are to experience all the profits in case any should be realized in the management of the business over its necessitated expenses.

It is likely that in case of a surplus, the fruit-grower would receive such palatable advantages from doing his business through the company, that he would be well satisfied to see his extra capital administered for his further benefit, and give that hearty support which would continue the company's prosperity.

Lower Placer County, from its locality and fertile soil, with its present irrigating facilities and proximity to shipping stations, enjoys an enviable distinction which no other county in the state surpasses.

Its fruits, from their early ripening and firm character, lead the markets in price, and when one considers the yet inadequate supplies of the Eastern country with its rapid growth and the future demands, one should not hesitate in putting himself firmly in support of the organization which is proposed, which, if well supported and administered, will still further advance the merits of the county and enhance the profits of the fruit-grower.

There are many other details which will require careful attention in the proposed organization, but I will not at this time further encroach upon your time and patience.





ORDINANCE No. 328.

An Ordinance Approving and Accepting the Work of Grading, Paving and Curbing K Street from the West Line of Second Street to the East Line of Tenth Street.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE City of Sacramento, do hereby approve and accept the work of grading, paving and curbing, to be done by the contractor, under the terms of Resolution Ord. No. 108, passed May 15, 1893, and other orders and acts applicable thereto, and having severer pipes, water pipes and gas pipes laid, and the satisfaction of the Street Commissioner and the Board of Trustees, and being in good condition throughout. It is therefore hereby ordained: That all of said portion of K Street, between the west line of Second street and the east line of Tenth street, embraced within the roadway, including the curbing, be and the same is, hereby accepted by the Board of Trustees, and the same shall hereafter be kept in repair and improved by the municipality. Provided, however, that nothing herein contained, shall be construed to be understood to in any wise alter or affect the obligation and duty of any person, firm or corporation owning or having one or more street railway tracks on and along said portion of K Street, to maintain, improve and keep in repair the roadway, including the curbing, between the track and two feet outside the rails thereof as required by law.

This acceptance to the extent of the space hereby provided for, shall be kept in repair by any person, firm or corporation having street railway tracks on that portion of K Street in this Ordinance specified, is limited to the acceptance of the grading and paving provided for in Resolution Ord. No. 108, and other orders and acts applicable to said work. Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately. Passed December 26, 1893.
