

THE CITY'S FUTURE LAW-MAKERS.

They Don't Their Official Harness and Open For Business.

Mayor Steinman's Appointees—Lee for Chief of Police—New Quarters to Be Selected.

Yesterday morning at 10 o'clock not only the room itself of the Board of City Trustees was crowded, but it was next to impossible to get through the crowd at the head of the stairs and in the hall.

Mayor Steinman called the board to order, the minutes were read and approved and the board waited till 10:15, when the Trustees-elect pushed their way through the crowd and filed in behind the rail.

The members of the new board were all present, as follows: H. Wachhorst, First Ward; Robert E. Kent, Second Ward; James G. Davis, Third Ward; H. W. Bragg, Fourth Ward; L. Tozer, Fifth Ward; J. H. Devine, Sixth Ward; C. E. Leonard, Seventh Ward; W. D. Lawton, Eighth Ward, and T. J. Pennish, Ninth Ward.

On motion of Trustee Conklin the old board then adjourned, and the Mayor announced that the way was clear for the organization of the new board.

The first step being the selection of a temporary Chairman, H. W. Bragg was elected to that position. He took the chair and announced that the first order of business would be the election of a President of the board.

LAWTON ELECTED PRESIDENT.

Trustee Leonard arose and nominated W. D. Lawton for President, and the motion being seconded and the nominations declared closed, Mr. Bragg put the question and Lawton was elected unanimously.

He took his place and made a few remarks, as follows: "Gentlemen, in selecting me as President of the Board of Trustees of the City of Sacramento you have paid me a great compliment, and I trust that my actions will be such that you will have no cause to regret the course you have taken to-day, and I am in hope, and it is my desire, that I may be able to show my appreciation for the honor you have conferred upon me by fair and impartial rulings while acting as your presiding officer."

The charter taking effect to-day makes a complete change in the manner of conducting the affairs of our city. The people have selected us to take charge of their city government, believing that we are competent and honest, the proof of which will depend upon our actions.

"The financial condition of the city should, in my opinion, be taken up without delay and receive your earnest consideration."

"The sewerage system should be taken up within the next thirty days, and handled without gloves. It is a well-known fact that the disposition of the city's sewerage is extremely faulty, and I can see no reason why there should be any delay on seeing this important question. I have given this subject a great deal of consideration, and I am confident that by next December we should have a sewer of sufficient size built and completed leading to the river, with a receiving vault and pumping machinery with a capacity to handle the sewerage for the next 100 years, and this, too, without the issuance of a bond."

Mr. Devlin stated that there were some other appointments, which would probably be submitted in the evening.

City Collector Putnam presented his report for January 1st, stating that H. F. Dillman and F. G. Hartman were delinquent for \$400 each. These are the contested cases that are now before the Supreme Court and are covered by bonds.

J. A. Brown and B. Bailey are delinquent, but will pay taxes next week, and Nelson Peter will appear before the board to explain why he cannot pay.

N. L. Brown also says that he cannot pay license. L. J. Smith owes \$10 and the Sacramento Box Company refuses to pay.

He has received from October 1st to January 6th for city licenses \$15,570, and dog licenses \$28 50, making a total of \$15,598 50. He has licenses on hand amounting to \$5,501 50 and dog licenses \$914, a total of \$6,415 50.

From April 1, 1893, he has received for city licenses, \$4,315 50, dog licenses, \$74 74.

The board then adjourned till 7 p. m.

Evening session.

The board reconvened at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, all the members being present.

The Committee on Rules and Order of Business asked for and were granted further time in which to complete rules and regulations.

There was some discussion as to whether there should be four or eight standing committees, and it was finally decided to have the latter number, to be known as: Finance, Fire Department, Auditing, Water Works, Streets and Parks, Levees, Sewerage and Drainage and Public Buildings.

Chairman Lawton said he would report at least one day in which to select the committees.

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR.

W. H. Devlin, Clerk of the Mayor, appeared and presented the following communication from Mayor Steinman:

B. U. Steinman, Mayor—DEAR SIR: At 10 A. M. JANUARY 8, 1894, Hon. James E. Devine, City Justice of Sacramento City, appeared at Police Courtroom of this city, and stated to Hon. H. L. Buckley, Judge of this court, present and ready to perform the duties that have heretofore been performed by Hon. H. L. Buckley, as Police Judge of this city.

Hon. H. L. Buckley refused to surrender the office of Police Judge, claiming that neither the office of Police Judge nor Police Court have been abolished by the charter under which the affairs of this city are now being administered. Yours respectfully,

POLICE JUDGESHIP.

In regard to the matter of the refusal of Police Judge Buckley to surrender his office, Trustee Pennish moved that Justice Devine be authorized to call the court to-day in his present office at Sixth and I streets, and it was so ordered.

COLLECTOR'S CLERKS.

The matter of the application of Collector McKee to be allowed three clerks, exclusive of his deputy, was taken from the table without objection.

Mr. McKee explained the necessity for these clerks.

Chairman Lawton called attention to the fact that it was within the power of the board to fix the salaries of such clerks at any figure not to exceed \$1,200 per annum each.

The resolution offered at the morning session by Trustee Tozer, authorizing the Collector to employ three assistants at \$1,000 each per annum, was then adopted without dissent.

Collector McKee announced his appointments as follows: Homer H. Madigan (deputy), Wm. Johnson, J. J. Trarbach and Walter Lusk.

OFFICIAL QUARTERS.

The board then invited Auditor and Assessor Young and other officials to explain what their respective departments would require in the way of office-room, furniture, etc., and this subject was discussed for some time.

A communication was received from Edwin K. Alsip & Co., offering to sell, at \$14 K street, opposite the Federal building, for the uses of the board and city officials, at a rental of \$75 per month.

THE POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The proposed ordinance submitted at the morning session, authorizing the appointment by the Mayor of a police force consisting of 15 members, was called up for action.

City Attorney Brown said, in response to a question by the Chair, that he would be necessary to pass such an ordinance before the Mayor could appoint policemen.

Trustee Devine moved to make the number sixteen, which must include the Captain, and it was so ordered.

The ordinance was then adopted, and Clerk Flint was instructed to call upon the Mayor and explain the situation to him.

TO SELECT QUARTERS.

On motion, the President of the board appointed a committee of three to report on the matter of the selection of office-rooms, consisting of Trustees Tozer, Pennish and Kent. The committee is authorized to employ an architect to examine the present Water Works building and see if it can be made available.

CITY ADVERTISING.

Trustee Devine moved, and it was carried, that the city advertising be divided as nearly equally as possible between the Record-Union and the Bee.

There being no other business, the board adjourned until 7:30 o'clock this evening.

State Board of Equalization.

The State Board of Equalization held its monthly meeting yesterday and passed the session in the discussion of various matters.

The forms prescribed by them for the use of Assessors in making their returns to the board have been thought by some of the Assessors capable of being improved in some minor details, and the board has been asked to make some trifling changes in them, which will be done.

There were also some letters of inquiry on various points from the Assessors of new counties, which were attended to.

Estates in Probate.

George F. Ironer has filed a petition for letters of administration on the estate of Winnifred Mullen, deceased. The estimated value of the estate does not exceed \$1,000.

Teressa Maria Riley has filed a petition for letters of administration on the estate of Thomas P. Riley, deceased. The estate consists of 252 acres of the Chabolla Grant, valued at \$7,500, and personal property worth about \$1,300.

In the matter of the estate of Rufus Rosa, deceased, the court has ordered that the estate consist of real estate in El Dorado County valued at \$411.

The Weather.

The Weather Bureau reports show the highest and lowest temperatures yesterday to have been 50° and 34°, with brisk to fresh northerly winds and clear weather prevailing with a sprinkling of rain during the night of the 7th and 8th.

The barometrical readings at 5 A. M. and 5 P. M. were 30.32 and 30.30 inches, respectively.

The highest and lowest temperatures one year ago yesterday were 41° and 36°, and one year ago to-day 40° and 35°.
