A STATE SENATOR IN TROUBLE.

We regret to hear that the saintly Senator Seymour of San Bernardino is in trouble. This gentleman, for whom Sacramento was not clean enough or good enough, has been indicted by the Grand Jury of his county, and charged with uncleanliness in collecting fees while he was Sheriff, without warrant of law.

The Grand Jury charges that the practice underlying the indictments was, and still is with other Sheriffs (each of whom are allowed \$5 a day for actual time consumed in transporting prisoners and the insane and actual necessary expenses) to charge in a manner that San Bernardino to San Quentin raises a bill of \$2 to \$10, and these bills are sworn to by the Sheriff presenting them.

The jury say that the practice has been to send two or more prisoners with one deputy to the State prison; to deliver one on one day and get an accomplice to take another from San Francisco on a different day and deliver him, thus securing two receipts. On this basis the overcharge would be made.

It is for such alleged practices that five indictments have been found against Senator Seymour.

The Grand Jury of San Bernardino recommends, since it is advised that Sheriffs of not a few of the counties have been cheating in this way, that the attention of the Attorney-General be officially called to the fact, that the necessary steps may be taken to recover back the money alleged to have thus been filched from the treasury.

Of course, that others are offenders, and that many have been, cannot excuse the San Bernardino Sheriffs. Their cases will become tests, and develop whether or not the law justifies the method adopted to get money out of the State in excess of the necessary expense incurred in transporting prisoners. Thus good will be done, either in breaking up a grave abuse or demonstrating that it is no abuse to collect excessive fees for official services.

But whatever the result, Senator Seymour is entitled to pity, since the mere fact that five indictments have been found against him in his own county will clip the wings of his ambition to become Governor of the commonwealth, and will tend to destroy his influence in promoting the illegitimate schemes of which he is the father, to remove the Capital, and that is assuredly enough to quicken pity for the Senator.

CARING FOR OUR EXHIBIT.

In the Sacramento section of the Citrus Fair of Northern and Central California, now open, nearly all the inclosed goods on view belong to the county—only a few to individual exhibitors. All that is cased, in jars and in glassed boxes, is county property, and has cost the people a considerable sum of money. The goods are handsomely put up, labeled in gold letters, and are in very superior permanent cases, and ought at the close of the fair to be looked after by the county, or by some permanent association to which they may be committed.

They should either be stored with great care, or put on view in some proper place. For several reasons storage suggests itself as the better plan; for several others, an exhibition of them is desirable. Several counties keep on view at depots or in public places such exhibits, to be seen by strangers at all times; Los Angeles and Fresno do, for instance. If the county could secure a good room in a building where other business is conducted, so that the cost of supervision would be light, it would be a good idea to display these exhibits there, that visiting strangers might be taken to see them at any season of the year.

If it were possible to have a room at the depot for the display it would be a very attractive feature and would advertise this county largely among the thousands who pass through the city monthly by rail, all of whom pause at the depot.

No very large space is required for exhibition or storage; an ordinary room in the business section or at the depot would serve well for the safe keeping and display of the articles, which are not numerous, but fully exemplify the fruit-growing capacity of the county.

But, at any rate, the goods should be very carefully looked after, and whenever there is a failure to keep the package should be renewed at the earliest opportunity, so that Sacramento will be ready

with a nucleus for an exhibit at any time when called upon in the next three or four years. The exhibits we have prepared have been very generously and considerably taken care of in the past by private effort, inspired by local pride, but with the close of this fair the county ought to provide the keeping in a manner to reduce the risk of loss to the minimum and to make the exhibits serve the best purpose.

HE MUST PAY.

Cattle Lord Howell Will Have to Pay His Wife's Alimony. The Supreme Court has rendered its decision in the divorce case of Howell vs. Howell. The wife sued for a divorce and got it, the husband having deserted her and being absent from the State, the judgment giving her the custody of the minor children and setting apart for her use all the community property in the State.

More than a year after the judgment was entered, defendant having come into the State, she filed an supplemental complaint, stating that the defendant was possessed of a large amount of property in Idaho, the proceeds and increase of community property, which he took with him when he deserted her, and praying for alimony, counsel fees, etc.

The court ordered the defendant to give security for any judgment that might be found against him, and also to make deposition before a Notary. For disobedience to the latter order his answer was stricken out and his attorneys debarred from cross-examining plaintiff's witnesses, and after an ex parte hearing he was required to pay plaintiff \$10 a month permanent alimony.

He appealed from the judgment and orders, and she moved to dismiss his motion. After recapitulating the reason for the conclusion arrived at, the order is denied by Chief Justice Beatty, Judges McFarland, De Haven, Paterson and Harrison concurring.

A FARMER'S EXPERIENCE.

Robbed of His Watch in the Corridor of the Police Court. Farmer Osborn went to his bucolic home near Elk Grove yesterday with the opinion uppermost in his mind that honest grangers have no business fooling around the city in places where hard characters are likely to congregate.

He had read of the "circuit" that has been going on in our double-ring Police Court of late, and being in the city on other business concluded he would like to take in the show. So he got his friend Tom Johnson, the Deputy Sheriff, to go with him as a guaranty of safety from harm.

After the performance was over, including the farcical afterpiece, they crowded their way through the throng of foul-smelling spectators, who had occupied the rear seats, and felt relieved when they reached the open air once more.

Farmer Osborn discovered later on that he had been relieved beyond his expectations, for when he felt for his watch he found that he had been wined off in great shape—his watch had gone to enrich some bold pickpocket, finally to adorn a pawnbroker's window in some town.

POLICE COURT JOTTINGS.

Mary Miller Goes to Jail—Chinese Cases Continued. Mary Miller, charged with being a common drunk, was given sixty days in the County Jail to straighten up in.

She pleaded hard to be allowed to go to her daughter in San Francisco, and promised to leave this city and not come back, but as she has made that promise several times before, Justice Devoe had no confidence in her and sentenced her to sixty days in jail.

A SACRAMENTO COMPANY.

It Will Go Into Raising Hops and Farming. A company has been formed by Sacramentans (who have no ideas on them) for the purpose of engaging in business generally, but specially designated as the Fremont Hop Company.

Articles of incorporation have been filed in the office of the Secretary of State by J. W. Boyd, M. T. Coppersmith, David Farr, Duncan Grant and John A. Kelly, of Sacramento as Directors and stockholders. The amount of capital stock is \$40,000, all subscribed.

Gas Company's Election.

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Capital Gas Company the following were elected directors for the ensuing year: B. U. Steinman, C. H. Cummings, Frank Miller and Benjamin Welch of Sacramento, and Oliver E. H. Wood and John Demster McKee of San Francisco.

Suit on a Note.

Isaac B. Coolidge has begun suit, by his attorney, C. H. Oatman, against W. H. Talbot, executor of the estate of John Talbot, deceased, to foreclose a mortgage on forty acres of land on the American River. The mortgage was given to secure the payment of a note for \$3,000 executed in 1889, and on which there is one year's interest unpaid at 8 per cent.

CALLINAN MURDER CASE.

It Will Not be Tried Again Until the 30th instant. In Judge Johnson's court yesterday the case of Thomas Callinan, charged with the murder of Patrick Lynch, was called, but was continued till the 30th, as the Palmer case will come up for its third trial next Monday.

Callinan, it will be remembered, has already been tried once, but the jury disagreed. He and Lynch were in the employ of the Street Department on the 22d of May, 1892, and got into an altercation at Twelfth and O streets, during which Lynch received a blow on the head from Callinan's shovel, which caused his death.

The plea of the defense has been that the blow was not intentional.
