OFFICE OF STATE ANALYST, BERKELEY, March 9, 1894. James G. Davis, 414 1/2 K Street, Sacramento-DEAR SIR: Yesterday I received a call from A. Abbott of your city, and during this interview I became much better acquainted with the problem which you are trying to solve.

There are many considerations which must be taken into account in forming an opinion of the suitability of any given water for city use. In many cases it will be a choice of bad waters; in others it will be a choice of good waters. First and foremost the water must satisfy the sanitary requirements; any failure in this respect is inadvisable.

Other than the purely sanitary part of the question, there are considerations of economy, adaptability to irrigation, manufacturing purposes and general utility must be considered.

In judging of the purely sanitary part of the question, the most important and the most difficult to determine are the bacteriological evidences which are worthy of consideration. I could speak with a good deal of confidence as to the general features of the district from which the water is collected.

As soon as I have completed the analysis I have begun I will send you the returns. I am very truly yours, W. B. RISING.
