

THE TWO STATE CONVENTIONS.

Money Subscribed Freely to Pay the Expenses Thereof.

Names of the One Hundred Citizens Selected to Work on the State Committees.

An adjourned meeting of the citizens' committee appointed to make arrangements for securing the holding of the Republican and Democratic State Conventions in this city the coming summer was held at the Courthouse last evening, A. C. Hinkson presiding.

Charles T. Jones presented the report of the Finance Committee. In doing so he said that but three persons had declined to subscribe to the fund for defraying the expenses of the two State Conventions. With the exceptions mentioned all citizens called upon subscribed freely, without urging, and were quite enthusiastic over the matter.

The committee, he said, had raised all the money required for the purpose. It had been decided by the joint Republican and Democratic Committee to increase the same to 100 members, and in accordance with the authority given them to do so they had secured the number of persons to labor with members of the Republican and Democratic Committees on behalf of Sacramento.

Chairman Hinkson reported that the Democratic portion of the "Invitation" Committee had addressed a communication to the Democratic State Central Committee urging the advantages offered by Sacramento as a place for holding the State Conventions.

Mr. Jones submitted the following copy of the communication addressed to the members of the Republican State Committee:

SACRAMENTO, March 12, 1894.

Dear Sir: A mass meeting of citizens of Sacramento, held on Monday evening, February 20th, the undersigned were appointed a committee to lay before you the advantages that Sacramento offers as a site for the session of the Republican State Convention of 1894, and to respectfully solicit your cooperation in behalf of this city as the place where the convention should be held. In support of our request we will cite the following facts:

First—Sacramento is the most centrally located point in the State. It is the center into which is focused the railroad travel from the tier of counties along the line of the Shasta and Oregon route, from the tier of counties along the Central Pacific overland route, from the tier of counties along the Sacramento Valley to Tehachapi and beyond and along the west and east sides of the Sacramento River to the bay of San Francisco.

Second—Sacramento offers better accommodations in the way of meeting rooms than any other city in the State. There is ample room not only for the meetings of the convention itself, but for district conventions and caucuses in the commodious, well furnished and elegantly furnished apartments of the State Capitol building. There are in the same building branch offices of the Western Union and the Postal Telegraph systems, which will be found to be a very great convenience to the members of the convention.

Third—Sacramento is the banner Republican county in the State. She has never been found wanting in the matter of enthusiasm, votes or financial aid when called upon to assist her. She therefore may, with good grace, ask your committee to select the State Capital as the site for the convention.

Fourth—The undersigned have collected the necessary funds for the payment of all the regular legitimate expenses of the convention, including a headquarters for the State Central Committee. Added to this, of course, will be the warm-hearted hospitality of Sacramento. Trusting that our application may receive your favorable consideration, we beg leave to remain, yours, respectfully, J. O. Coleman, Chairman of the Joint Invitation Committee.

A SLIGHT DIFFERENCE. Mr. Hinkson said the letter sent to the Democratic State Central Committee was very much like that read by Mr. Jones, except that, in referring to the fact that Sacramento had been the banner Republican county, they had added that the Democrats had on numerous occasions been able to do so again and again. Also, that the coming of the Democratic State Convention would materially help them out in future contests.

OTHER BUSINESS. Secretary Funston read a communication from Grove L. Johnson, stating that he would necessarily be absent for several weeks, and therefore tendered his resignation as Chairman of the Joint Invitation Committee.

The resignation was accepted, and on motion of C. N. Post it was decided that the committee should meet at his office this evening and choose someone to fill the vacancy.

J. O. Coleman was selected as an additional member of the original Republican Sub-Committee.

E. F. Smith, Chairman of the Democratic Sub-Committee, stated that he would call that committee together this evening at Chairman Hinkson's office.

Chairman Hinkson said he for one would cheerfully aid on the members of both State committees and do what he could to induce them to favor Sacramento.

All members of the committees present signified their willingness to attend either one or both State committee meetings in the interest of Sacramento.

AUBURN'S CITIZEN SOLDIERS.

They are Inspected by Brigade Inspector Ryan.

Company D Found to be Wonderfully Proficient for a New Organization.

Company D, Second Infantry, N. G. C., located at Auburn, was inspected by Major Frank D. Ryan on Monday evening.

The Major and one of the staff orderlies were met at the depot in Auburn by Captain Tuttle and Lieutenants F. S. Romungo and F. A. Tyler, Jr., and Battalion Adjutant Edwin F. Wright, and escorted to a hotel.

After supper the Inspector and officers repaired to the Auburn Opera-house, in which the company armory is located, and where the members assembled for the inspection of the muster.

The company was formed by First Sergeant Prewold, and the manner in which the men formed front and rear ranks occasioned favorable remarks by the Inspector and others who were present to witness the ceremonies.

Although Company D is a new organization in the National Guard, it will compare favorably with any company in the State.

The members have not had the opportunity to be drilled and instructed according to the tactics of the other companies, but their abilities, coupled with close attention to details, will no doubt bring them to a high standard in the N. G. C.

First Sergeant Prewold is to be congratulated for the efficient manner in which he handles the company, and for the interest he takes in its welfare.

It was not expected on the part of the Brigade Inspector that the company would go through the ceremony as an older company would, but it can be said for the benefit of Company D that never was a company, so short a term in service, so soon to make such a favorable impression as did the Auburn organization Monday night.

During the time Major Ryan was inspecting the individual members hardly a mistake was noticed, the men standing erect and in every way appearing as though having seen years of military service.

The men appeared to a good advantage in their new uniforms and leggings, and their demeanor and prompt obedience to orders were the subject of favorable criticism.

Company D is one of the most favored organizations in Auburn, its citizens working hand in hand with the company for the company's betterment and welfare.

The membership consists of some of the most prominent and influential residents of Auburn and vicinity. The non-commissioned officers are well up in tactical knowledge, which goes a long way in the efficiency of a military company.

The affairs of the company were found to be in first-class condition, as also were the uniforms, hats, caps, leggings and rifles.

Company D is fast rising to a high standard in target practice, and it will not be long before it will be in a position when a challenge will be sent to the other companies of the regiment to compete for supremacy at the butts.

The officers are possessed of a great deal of executive ability, and the men take a deep interest in the efforts of the officers to place the company on a footing with older ones of the State.

At roll-call fifty-seven men, out of a total membership of sixty-seven, responded as their names were called. A number of those absent were out of the county at the time of the muster, thereby decreasing the percentage of attendance slightly. The percentage of attendance was 87.

National Guardsmen visiting Auburn are assured of being hospitably entertained by the football boys, and they do it in a favor when visited by older members and the various details pointed out and some of the more complicated movements explained.


Walking Delegate Fry and His Army of Tramps.
