

SIGHTSEERS FROM NEW ENGLAND.

An Excursion Train of Tourists Spends the Morning Here.

Cordial Expressions of Appreciation of the City's Attractions and the Courtesy Shown Them.

A few public-spirited gentlemen of this city did a wise thing in heeding the suggestion made by this paper some time ago, that someone should be employed regularly to welcome strangers arriving in our midst and help them to intelligently and pleasantly spend their time while in this city, as well as give them information about the city and county which might induce them to think of remaining here permanently.

They were taken completely by surprise. "Why," said several of them, "we have not found anything like this since we left Galveston, Texas. We have been to Los Angeles, San Diego, San Francisco and a number of other places in the State, but were left to our own resources."

"It is not a pleasant feeling to be set down in a strange city with some letters in your hands, not knowing one, and knowing nothing of what is worth seeing or where to look for it. By the time you begin to find out these things your time is up, and you must leave without seeing things you would have much enjoyed."

The visitors took hold of the project gladly, and their expressions showed how much they appreciated the attention. It is good for us, however, who, knowing we have a pretty city and conscious of its advantages, think the world looks at us with admiration, to see ourselves occasionally as others see us.

This party was a very intelligent one, coming principally from Boston and vicinity. New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. Among its members were a prominent Boston architect, a large iron founder in Massachusetts, and a gentleman from Constantinople, who speaks seven languages and is taking notes of everything, intending to write a book, and solicitor for accurate information. The remainder of the party was composed of shrewd, wide-awake business men and their families, who had come to see the country.

It was a little mortifying to hear a gentleman say, "Ah, yes, um, I have heard Sacramento spoken of. Let me see, what did I hear said of it? Oh, I believe it is Capital, is it not?"

"Yes," said another, "it is at present, but I think the coming of the new Capital somewhere else, I read something about it."

Mr. Herrick hastened to assure them that the Supreme Court had decided that the Capital would remain here, and that they would see a handsome building and grounds in the morning.

Yesterday morning, accompanied by E. Avery, he escorted them to Old Park on the electric cars, thence to the Capitol, where they praised enthusiastically the building and grounds, and finally to the Crocker Art Gallery. At the latter place they remained, showing that many of them were intelligent critics of art, and they expressed their surprise at Mrs. Crocker's magnificent gift to the city.

"Why," said one of them, "a large number of these paintings are very valuable and among the finest I have seen anywhere. It must have taken much time and discrimination, as well as money, to get together such a valuable collection. Your citizens must be very proud of their good fortune."

"Yes," said another, "and I admire the way in which your rich Californians dispose of their money, and how they show there is the Stanford University, a gift to the people. The other day we went to Mount Hamilton to take a look through the telescope at the Lick Observatory, and here we see such a splendid gift to the people of your city."

After their return to the depot they expressed themselves in warm terms of praise of what they had seen and the courtesy extended to them. They spoke of the pleasant weather, although as a matter of fact the north wind does not strike Sacramento in that light, but they said it was much pleasanter than in San Francisco.

It is safe to say that at least one party of tourists will carry back to their Eastern homes pleasant memories of our city, and a warm plan to return to the city who welcomed them so cordially.

Several of them asked the question, "Well, have you no pamphlet or book which gives information of your city and county?"

There is nothing of the sort, as Mr. Herrick was obliged to tell them, but it is a matter that can be easily remedied if a few more public-spirited citizens will aid in the good work. Why can it not be done?

THE BANK OBJECTS.

Demurrer Filed in the Case of Orth vs. the D. O. Mills Bank.

The National Gold Bank of D. O. Mills & Co., by its attorney, L. T. Hatfield, has filed the bank's demurrer to the complaint of W. I. Orth in the latter's suit for \$40,000 damages alleged to have been suffered by him in consequence of having been improperly attached by the bank.

One of the grounds on which the demurrer is based is that "the complaint shows upon its face that during the pendency of the suit by attachment the plaintiff voluntarily adjudged insolvent and his estate assigned to a referee for the benefit of his creditors; that the assignee being the only person authorized by law to maintain the recovery of money on any account whatever, it does not appear that the plaintiff has any beneficial interest in the premises, and it does not appear that the assignee, after demand to do so, refused to institute appropriate proceedings in their behalf."

POLICE PICKINGS.

Some Unimportant Cases Disposed of in a Court.

Justice Devine had a fair-sized calendar yesterday, but it was soon disposed of, none of the cases being of much importance.

Dan Higgins, charged with vagrancy, was convicted and given thirty days in jail, with a chance to leave town.

James Appleton, a healthy beggar, got ten days in jail.

Harry Hamsel, who was charged with battery on Mrs. Carroll, was dismissed, the complaining witness refusing to prosecute.

H. Sims, accused of carrying a concealed weapon, was discharged, it being shown that he was in the employ of the Sheriff.

Two Chinese lottery cases were continued till to-day.

An Tong, who was arrested for peddling clothes without a license, was working for another Chinaman, who had one, and supposed that covered the case. When he found differently he procured a license and the case was dismissed.

GEORGIANA SCHOOL DISTRICT.

The Boundary Question Settled to the Satisfaction of All.

At yesterday's session of the Schools, County Superintendent of the Superior Howard appeared before the board and stated that a communication from him attached to the petition and remonstrance in the matter of the change asked for in the boundary line of Georgiana School District had been overlooked. He had so arranged the boundaries of said district as to be satisfactory to all concerned.

Thereupon the board, on motion of Supervisor Jenkins, reconsidered its action of the preceding day, and the petition was then taken up and granted.

SCALED TO DEATH.

P. N. Corson's Little Son Meets with a Fatal Accident.

Yesterday Willie Corson, the 8-year-old son of P. N. Corson, who lives at Sixth and G streets, died from the effects of a terrible scalding he received on Monday afternoon.

The child's father is a butcher, and uses a big vat of boiling water for scalding the carcasses of hogs. The little boy, while playing about the vat, fell into it. He was taken out immediately, but his injury was so terrible that he could not survive, and after lingering in agony until yesterday he died.

Weather Notes.

The Weather Bureau reports show the highest and lowest temperatures yesterday to have been 74° and 61°, with fresh to gentle northerly winds and clear weather prevailing.

The barometrical readings at 5 A. M. and 5 P. M. were 30.13 and 30.01 inches, respectively.

The highest and lowest temperatures one year ago yesterday were 66° and 49°, and one year ago to-day 68° and 49°.

On the 4th of April last year there was a storm set in, lasting over the 6th, during which time .89 of an inch of rain was measured. As the barometer is now falling there might be a prospect of a little moisture in a short time, but nothing definite is known. Frost was observed in Oregon yesterday.

Suit to Foreclose.

Henry Wittenbrock, by his attorney, R. Platner, has begun an action against J. O. Sherwood to recover the payment of a promissory note executed by Sherwood November 1, 1889, for \$3,500, secured by a mortgage on a tract of land in the Leidsdorf Grant, or Rancho Los Americanos. There is credited on the note the sum \$253.85.

H. D. Millard, who claims some interest in the mortgaged land, has been made a party defendant. Plaintiff asks judgment for the principal and interest due, also \$350 attorney's fees and other costs.

A Guardian's Account.

John G. Hite, guardian of the person and estate of Herman L. Huber, a minor, has filed in the Superior Court his final account. The estate is valued at \$10,000, of which \$2,500 has been received in cash, and the remainder is real estate. After paying the debts and expenses of the estate there remains in the guardian's hands, besides the real estate, the sum of \$87.50.

The account and petition for distribution will be heard on Friday, the 13th instant.

Suit to Quiet Title.

J. F. Hill, by his attorneys, Holl & Dunn, has commenced a suit in the Superior Court to quiet the title to the west three-fourths of the north half of lot 4, in the block between J. K. Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets. The defendants mentioned in the complaint are Maria Fash, Harriet A. Knox, Harriet G. Knox, estate of Robert A. Knox, deceased, and others.

El Dorado Fruit-Growers.

The Placerville Democrat states that at a recent meeting of the Fruit-Growers' Association of El Dorado the plan or organization presented by the committee previously appointed was accepted and considered. After some discussion of alternative plans, the plan presented to the East was adopted by an almost unanimous vote.
