

WHAT BECOMES OF THE CHILDREN?

The Steady Decrease in the Number of School Pupils.

President Davis of the Board of Education Makes an Interesting Report on the Subject.

At last night's session of the City Board of Education President W. J. Davis presented the following report as the result of his inquiries into the subject of the decrease in the school census returns for the last year:

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT. The matter of the taking of the annual census I deem of such importance as to justify the calling of attention to some facts and conditions that have been ascertained and founded upon my investigations, so that they may be considered by the members of the board.

The County School Superintendent is to calculate at the rate of one teacher for every seventy school census children or fraction thereof, not less than twenty, as shown by the latest census, and \$500 is apportioned for the salary of each teacher named upon. The balance is distributed per capita on the average attendance.

COUNTY MATTERS

What the Supervisors Did at Yesterday's Session.

The Supervisors were in session again yesterday, and after transacting some business took a recess until the 12th.

County Surveyor Wm J. Mahon and A. Woodward were appointed viewers to lay out the road in District No. 15, petitioned for by Charles V. Graham and others.

The road is to run from the Elk Grove road to what is known as the Sheldon gray line road.

Henry K. Miller, County License Collector, submitted his report for the month of March, showing collections to the amount of \$8,398.50.

County Treasurer Lyon submitted his report for March, showing receipts for the month of \$14,406.21; total in treasury during the month, \$127,135.39; disbursements, \$82,225.37; balance on hand April 1st, \$44,899.88.

The vacancy in the office of Pound-keeper in San Joaquin Township, caused by the failure of James H. Gibson to qualify, was filled by his re-election to the place. Gibson's failure to qualify was the result of an oversight.

Weather Notes. The Weather Bureau reports show the highest and lowest temperatures yesterday to have been 78° and 56°, with light to gentle northerly winds and clear weather prevailing.

The highest and lowest temperatures one day ago yesterday were 68° and 47°, with no precipitation, and one year ago, to-day 66° and 32°, with .40 of an inch of rain.

Soon Disposed Of. In the Police Court yesterday Wong Chung was fined \$20 for selling a lottery ticket, and the case of Sing Koon Ling, for keeping a lottery office, was continued till the 9th inst.

The jury in Judge Catlin's court yesterday returned a verdict of acquittal in the case of the boy Emil Gale, tried for burglary. The opinion seems to be that the lad is hardly responsible for his conduct, but if so he should not be allowed to go at large.

Travel still increasing. Travel continues very heavy, both east and west. The East-bound overland train yesterday contained thirteen cars, and the Los Angeles train was so heavily loaded that it was two hours late.

Thirty Days for Larceny. James Reynolds, charged with grand larceny, was yesterday allowed to plead guilty to petit larceny, and Judge Catlin sentenced him to thirty days in the County Jail.


