

DOYLE'S NEW FRIEND FROM ERIN.

He Came Right From Wicklow, and His Name Was Ryan.

It Cost Mr. Doyle, \$250 to Indorse a Check for the Very Slick Bunco Sharp.

An exceedingly smooth young man, who gave the name of Thomas Ryan, recently played an old game with new variations on William Doyle, the well-known citizen and capitalist.

He looked up Mr. Doyle's cousin in San Francisco and asked how he could find the former on his arrival here. Receiving directions, he hunted up Mr. Doyle and introduced himself.

He was thoroughly acquainted with the country and spoke of the different families there by name. He claimed to be a grandson of the former landlord of Mr. Doyle's father.

He only wanted \$250 and wished to deposit the remaining \$500, asking questions about the rate of interest on term deposits. Mr. Doyle stood outside, near the door, talking to a friend, when the young man came out and asked him to come in and see him.

After they left the bank Mr. Doyle told him that he could have much better interest by lending his money, but Ryan said he had plenty of money and did not care for the interest on such a small amount.

Ryan left the city the next day, and Doyle thought no more of the matter till the check came back from San Jose protested and with \$9 costs to pay. He paid the \$250, and has concluded that if any more friends from Ireland come to see him they had better bring bank notes or gold, as he is through indorsing checks.

Doyle did not report the matter to the police, and says he does not intend to.

THEOSOPHY.

Abstract of Last Evening's Address at the Headquarters.

"Is Theosophy Worth Living For?" was the theme chosen for the address at the Theosophical Headquarters last evening.

"The thirst for knowledge prevades all humanity. Old religious doctrines are proclaimed insufficient; old scientific pretenses are exploded. Men and women think, examine, experiment with untrammelled liberty. The unknown self within, the infinite unknown without, become daily more patient, and our reflection tells us that the realm of the un- known is as much greater than the realm of the known as the ocean is greater than a pebble lying on its shore; and not less surely that there is something more in reserve for us than the present sublimity of life.

"Resort to science and to religion fail to satisfy our questionings as to origin, purpose and destiny of life, as well as to justice and suffering. Baffled in the quest the earnest inquirer is introduced to a grand philosophy, and at the world, preserved in secret through the ages, and now newly divulged. He examines it to find it the basis of all the beliefs and creeds the world has ever known, and to realize that Theosophy is unveiling more of the truth than has ever been revealed before, and the result of his investigations proves to him that it is worth living for, and, if need come, dying for."

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TERRIBLY BURNED.

A Lamp Explosion May Yet Cost a Woman Her Life.

The alarm which was turned in shortly after 11 o'clock last night was caused by the explosion of a lamp in the bungalow at 329 L street. The burning oil fell upon a woman named Mollie Cooper, and in an instant she was shrouded in flame. She rushed shrieking out upon the sidewalk, where several men were standing, but none of them had presence of mind sufficient to render her any assistance.

Another woman, known as "Big Minnie," ran to her assistance with a quilt and smothered the flames, her own hands being badly burned while doing it.

The unfortunate woman was taken into a house across the street, the patrol wagon sent for, and on its arrival she was taken to the Receiving Hospital. It was there found that her lower limbs were one mass of burns, her arms and back terribly burned, as well as her throat and face.

The novel in which the fire started was consumed, as well as those on each side of it, and, as a fresh wind was blowing, it seemed likely that the conflagration might extend.

The burned houses were not of much value, and they were insured. It was stated that they belonged to R. Boden, one to a man named White and another to an estate that is being settled up. A fourth building was considerably damaged. The fire was splendidly handled, preventing any further spread of the flames.

Shortly after the first alarm was turned in a second alarm was sounded from Third and M streets for the same fire. The broken engines came down, but were ordered back by the Chief, as he was able to handle the fire with the force present and did not wish to leave the balance of the city unprotected.
