Nothing New in the Wheat Situation --Shipping at a Standstill.

Rain Causes a Break in Barley Prices --Buyers of Oats Notably Scarce.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 25th. There is nothing new in the wheat situation. Shipping business is at a standstill, but there is more or less trading for Call Board purposes on a basis of \$1.05@1.07 1/2 ct. The rain to-day had a depressing influence on the speculative market, causing a drop in December option of about two cents ct. Sales of spot wheat were made in the Call Board this morning at \$1.12 ct. The same barley market was 50c per ton lower to-day, on account of rain. In the speculative market the decline was greater, as shown by the Call Board sales, published elsewhere.

No change in asking rates was made in Oats to-day. Buyers, however, were scarce, probably to see whether more showers were near at hand or not.

The butter market is firmer again and Eggs are doing better. Hens is unchanged. Honey is firm.

The poultry market is heavily stocked with Eastern. The demand is quiet.

Vegetables were dull this morning. Some Onions came in from Nevada. Potatoes are steady.

The receipts of Strawberries were 155 chests to-day. Four boxes of Cherries arrived. A few Raspberries appeared, with sales at fifty cents a basket. Oranges are firm.
