A COMPANY ORDERED TO DISBAND.

The Result of Dissension in the Los Angeles Military.

San Francisco's First Regiment Used Its Own Ammunition and Must Shoot Over Again.

On account of dissensions that prevailed in Company G, Seventh Infantry Regiment, N. G. C., located in Los Angeles, that company has, by order of Governor Markham, been disbanded. The following extract from orders issued by Adjutant-General Allen, bearing on the matter, is published so the local guardsmen can observe the punishment meted out to a company whose members caused a condition of affairs that made the existence of the organization a detriment to the National Guard: "Upon the report of the Inspector, and the approval of the Commanding Officer First Brigade, and as provided in Section 2020, Political Code, Company G, Seventh Infantry, N. G. C., is hereby disbanded. At the annual muster of said command in March last, but twenty-eight men appeared and answered for their names, and for many months, owing to dissensions in the company, no elections have been held for First and Second Lieutenants, and those officers are now vacant. It is deemed for the best interests of the service that this company be disbanded. "Lieutenant-Colonel L. S. Butler is hereby directed to proceed to disband said Company G, Seventh Infantry, N. G. C. He will give to Captain Glowner of said company receipts for all property and moneys in his possession belonging to the State and to the company, and which he is responsible for, and to said Captain Glowner. He will hold such receipts and moneys subject to further orders. "The rolls containing the names of the men mustered out will be forwarded to these headquarters, and reference made to this order. Upon the muster out of this order, Russell, the Grand Guard of California." As provided by law, the National Guard is ordered to parade on the fourth of July. Paragraph 3, G. O. A. G. O., No. 5, c. s., is hereby modified to read as follows: "The service has been discontinued by the men of the N. G. C. are hereby ordered, to be worn in the field. Hats of the same color will be worn by all officers." The Signal Corps, Second Brigade, will encamp at such time and place during the month of June, 1894, as may be designated by the Commanding Officer of the Second Brigade. The Fifth Infantry has been ordered to hold its encampment at Santa Cruz. Leave of absence for six weeks has been granted to Edwin P. Wright, Battalion Adjutant, Second Infantry. Governor Markham has commissioned the following officers of the University Cadets: Harry M. W. Wright, Colonel; Edward A. Selfridge, Jr., Lieutenant-Colonel; McCoy Fitzgerald, Major; Frederick Denick, Captain; Russ Avery, Captain; William Bennett, Captain; S. H. Field, S. Sanborn, Captain; Henry C. Hyde, Captain; Herman H. Eddy, Captain; Davis A. Porter, First Lieutenant; Sanford Blunt, First Lieutenant; Joseph C. Meyerstein, First Lieutenant; Augustus V. Saph, First Lieutenant; Jabish Clement, First Lieutenant; Hugh Fitz R. York, Second Lieutenant. The First Infantry, located in San Francisco, recently held its semi-annual target practice and used ammunition other than that provided by the State. Adjutant-General Allen was informed of the matter and he has ordered the regiment to cancel the shoot and hold another practice.

CONVENTION MATTERS.

Committee Meetings—Executive Committee Meets To-Morrow.

The Reception Committee for the State Republican Convention met last evening in Justice Henry's office. J. O. Coleman distributed the badges and instructed those present regarding their duties. The word "Reception" is printed on white satin ribbon eight inches in length and two in breadth. All parties who have rooms to rent are invited to leave a memorandum of the same to-day with Secretary Coons, at the headquarters, 614 K street. The Reception Committee holds a tomorrow evening at 7:30 this evening at 614 K street, the Accommodations and Press Committee headquarters. Every member it is desired shall be present. The Press Committee and Accommodations Committee have established headquarters at 614 K street. These rooms are now open, and will remain so day and evening. Any information needed by guests will be there furnished. The Executive Committee meets at the Golden Eagle Hotel at 11 o'clock to-morrow to meet the State Central Committee, receive badges and do business to come before it. Members are requested to gain in the reading-room and go there to a committee-room to be provided. The Decorations Committee will commence operations at noon to-day, and it is desired that all citizens get to work early with their decorations, as delegates will begin arriving to-day.

THE COURTS CASE.

Judge Catlin is Hearing Arguments On the Demurrer.

In the matter of the accusation made by D. J. McGowan against Supervisor William Curtis, arguments were yesterday heard in Judge Catlin's court on the motion to strike out the demurrer. Petitioner McGowan was represented by S. S. Holl, and the defendant by Grove L. Johnson and Clinton L. White. The latter contended that the action was improperly brought; that the section of the code on which it was based referred to the neglect of a public officer to do his duty as such, while the complaint itself embraced charges that should be heard only under the provisions of the Penal Code providing for indictment by the Grand Jury for malfeasance in office. It was not claimed, said the defendant's counsel, that the Supervisor refused to act as such officer, or to perform the duties of his office, but that he did act and that his action was corrupt. This, it was held, required that the action should be brought under an indictment, if at all. The arguments were not concluded, and will be resumed this morning.

FUNERAL OF GEORGE L. FITZ.

There was a large attendance at the funeral services of the late George L. Fitz on Thursday, which were held at the residence of his parents at Fourth and L streets. Among those present were many Native Sons and others from the vicinity of Courtland. The services were conducted by Rev. C. W. Clark, and the prayer was rendered by W. H. Kinross, Horace Crocker, R. T. Cohn and Bert Kidder. Courtland Parlor, N. S. G. W., sent a large floral piece representing the insignia of the order. The pall-bearers were Howard Kirchival, Frank Howell, Charles Hollister, Will Smith and Howard Kimbrough and Joseph Green, Jr.

WEATHER NOTES.

The Weather Bureau reports show the highest and lowest temperatures yesterday in this city, with fresh to brisk southerly winds and clear weather prevailing. The barometrical readings at 5 A. M. and 5 P. M. were 29.87 and 29.85 inches, respectively. The highest and lowest temperatures one year ago yesterday were 88° and 60°, and one year ago to-day 88° and 58°.

One of the best pugilists was sent to San Francisco to see if Lyons was getting himself into proper shape. He found him in fine trim, and feeling confident of victory. McGraw is not wasting any time himself, being in constant training, and if he keeps up his work he will be in splendid condition on the 25th of this month, the date fixed for the match. Louis Payen, who is one of the steadiest workers in the club, has been in charge, and he keeps the boxer hustling. The outlook for the Athletic Club's field day on the 4th of July is very promising, and will undoubtedly be interesting to the public. Between 5 and 6 o'clock each morning a score of athletes can be seen at Agricultural Park, putting shot, hurdlings, jumping, running and bicycling. They know that if they want to keep the medals at home they will have to do some effective training. The club is trying to arrange a special wrestling match with the A. C. M. and R. Y. Cole of the home club. Should they succeed it will be the best wrestling bout ever witnessed in this city. THAT STATE PLAT.

The Lots Were Purchased From Individual Owners. There has been a story in circulation for some time to the effect that the city never received pay for the State plat in the City Cemetery. A RECORD-UNION reporter has been investigating the matter, and finds that most of the lots embraced in that inclosure, were originally sold to private parties. The State afterward bought them from those individuals, and consequently had no direct dealings with the city, and the records at the Recorder's office show no title. The State, however, owns nine 25x25 lots and has cared for them for the past thirty years. When the State purchased those lots the uniform price was \$50, which would make its plat worth \$450. William Turton, the well-known contractor, was one of those who sold to the State. He says that James McDonald, one of the first Cemetery Commissioners appointed by the State, bought his lot and paid him for his improvements. The owners of the other lots did likewise. W. C. Farnsworth, who has been employed at the City Cemetery for the past thirty years, laughs at the idea that the State is in debt to the city. He declares that all the lots were bought and paid for by private parties.


