GOOD TO LAUGH AT. General Rosser railed at Yankees, and the Rev. R. C. Cave of St. Louis declared at the unveiling of a monument last month at Richmond, Va., that "The world shall yet decide in truth's clear, far-off light."

When these and further remarks of the reverend rebel were flashed over the country and sent to print, indignation, hot and impetuous, kindled in millions of breasts, and the thought of the hour was bitter and revengeful. But cooler judgment prevailed and no expression was made except that which is the only desert of the small-minded—the expression of piteous contempt, that a single American of average attainments should be so far behind the age, so far to the rear in the dust and gloom of the past.

Now, however, it appears that some of the Southern press is behind Mr. Cave; that there are public prints to commend his silly utterance and applaud the declarations of this lingering fire-eater. The Richmond (Va.) Times declares, for instance, that the deliverance was that of constitutional law and historic fact; the Richmond State says Cave spoke the belief of the Confederate soldiers, and that because the South is an inviting field for capital, and wants capital, its ex-Confederates are not for sale.

On the other hand the Atlanta Journal declares that Cave did not speak for the South, and did not represent the opinions of any section. The Chattanooga Times declares the speech an incident marring the observances of Memorial Day. The St. Louis Republic says: "Dr. Cave is mistaken," and the Louisville Courier-Journal speaks of Cave and Rosser as of a class of orators to be rid of, and who are in disrepute.

It is probably true that very many Southern men of the eldest generation believe that the cause of the South was just; to hold to the contrary would be to asperse the sincerity behind the valor of their fighting. But the great mass of these men realize that the cause of the war was by the war removed, and can never be restored. They entered into a contest of which battle was the arbiter and they lost, and they accept the judgment. The war is over, and they know that only ill can result from raking in its embers.

As for the younger generations the first had no part in the war; to them it is a tradition; they would not do battle to restore the conditions that created it; their interest lies in the fraternity of the whole American people. The youngest generation is not to be taken into consideration at all in the sentiment of the matter.

Here and there are some few, feeble, lingering malcontents at the South whose hatred survives all else, and whom the world will complacently see go down to the grave grumbling at fate. They speak for themselves only, precisely as do a few rare, strange radicals in the North, whose mean suspicion and narrow faith in men lead them to believe that the Caves and the Rossers stand for whole millions of the South aiming to precipitate the nation into another fratricidal war. The two kinds of men are off of the same cloth and are only useful to laugh at.

ASSASSINATION OF CARNOT. The assassination of President Carnot of France is news that shocks the civilized world. Carnot had made France his debtor. Few men have served their country better. He was a modest, devoted and courageous Republican, whose love for his country rose superior to all else. He was the friend of industry, agriculture, education and science. In the seven years of his Presidency France has made wonderful strides and become three powerful, coupled with her condition when, in 1877, Carnot was elected to the Chief Magistracy. There was no cause worthy a single breath to give his assassin even the shadow of an excuse for his infamous act.

The outrage upon General Tarsney at Colorado Springs shames humanity, makes men blush for their sex and puts a stigma upon the State of Colorado that it will be difficult to efface. The dispatches at hand are by no means definite as to who committed the assault upon the Adjutant-General. It is assumed that it was done by Sheriff's deputies, recently engaged in the suppression of riots and lawlessness by the miners. But if so, it is not to be charged upon the whole body of deputies, who were sworn officers of the law, and whose province it was to maintain order and enforce court decrees. The fifteen or twenty masked men who kidnaped the General, and tarred and feathered him, may have been members of the late posse of Deputy Sheriffs, but they were not officials when they seized the General. The acts of Governor Waite and his Adjutant-General in the late strike difficulties were not creditable to the State, not in promotion of peace and order, and not in aid of the law and the courts. But however unwise and foolish the policy of Waite, it cannot justify or in the slightest excuse the assault upon Tarsney. If the perpetrators of the outrage are not ferreted out and punished severely the shame of Colorado will be all the deeper.

Mrs. Richardson in the Humanitarian, complains that gambling among the women of England is increasing alarmingly. She attributes it to the inferior education of women for one thing. That is silly. Women in England, as in America, have as full opportunity in educational schemes as have men. Certainly they have, up to the point at least that ought to fortify them, so far as education can, against the gaming temptation. The true cause of the growth of the gaming spirit in England is to be found in the social system of the aristocracy and upper classes. Having too little to do of real value in life, their women naturally drift into such vices as gambling, examples of which are constantly set before them by men of the titled and the wealthy orders.

The plague increases in China though checked slightly at Hongkong. It has assailed not only the Chinese of the lower orders, but the foreign residents, and the mortality among them is reported as heavy. The authorities at Washington have taken steps to prevent the transmission of the disease to this country, so far as quarantine and inspection can do it. The plague, or disease in question, is born of filth and can be stamped out by sanitary regulation. This cannot be applied effectively among the Chinese, but at all our ports we can, if we act promptly, through rigid quarantine erect barriers against the pest, that it is not likely to pass.

The victory of Santa Anita in the American Derby, is another lift in public opinion for California horses. The world will have its attention drawn anew by this notable triumph to this State as a superior breeding ground for fine stock. It will be critical not merely passing interest that will be awakened concerning our blue grass sections and their capabilities.

NOTE AND COMMENT. Another pair of "Heavenly Twins" has developed. "Lizzy" Alexander and "Dick" Clarken have held their convention and the utmost harmony prevailed. The slate went through safely except in the case of a few persons who could not be induced to run on the ticket. There were nominations to give away, and no one particularly anxious to take them.

There is now no prospect of a settlement between the "Regular" and "Reorganized" wings of the Democratic party in this city. The war is likely to be waged this year as bitterly as in the past. The drummers expect to have a grand time at the Midwinter Fair next Saturday. As many as can do so will select partners from among the muscle dancers, Daboney, Hawaiian and Japanese women. It will be "a sight."

OPPING OF THE SEASON. The Festive Firecracker Gets in Its Deadly Work. An alarm of fire was turned in early yesterday afternoon, caused by the discovery of a fire in the upper part of C. Ehnman's stable, on the alley in the rear of Eleventh and J streets.

The fire department promptly responded and the conflagration was speedily extinguished, the damage to the roof being about \$50. The cause of the fire is stated to have been a combination of boy and firecracker. It is singular that for the two or three weeks previous to the Fourth of July property-holders are forced to be continually on their guard against this source of danger, and one would think that it is an easy matter to remedy by strictly enforcing the proper regulations.
