

ALL TRAFFIC BLOCKED.

The Strikers at West Oakland Becoming Aggressive.

NOT A WHEEL ON THE SOUTHERN PACIFIC TURNING.

Even the Ferry Boats Not Running, the Men on Them Being Forced to Quit—The Fifth Regiment Under Arms—Two Trains With Armed Strikers Leave the North for Sacramento.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 4.—To-day the strikers at West Oakland became aggressive, and to-night not a wheel in the Southern Pacific, North or South, even ferry boats are running between this city and Oakland.

At Los Angeles the United States troops are to-day masters of the situation. Judge Ross concluded to defer action in the case of Conductor Hart, charged with contempt of court, until tomorrow, as the legal holiday, and everybody is awaiting his action.

WEST OAKLAND, July 4.—Five companies of the Fifth Infantry, N. G., were ordered out by Major-General Dimond this evening. The men are from Santa Rosa, San Rafael and Tiburon.

GUARD UNDER ARMS AT OAKLAND. The troops were not landed at the pier, but were disembarked by the steamer Alameda at the foot of Broadway, marching to the armory of Company A, corner Franklin and Twelfth streets, awaiting orders.

MARINEVILLE, July 4.—Company C, N. G., will leave for Sacramento tomorrow morning by boat.

LOS ANGELES, July 4.—Six men, comprising the strike committee of the A. R. U., were arrested this afternoon by Deputy Marshal Goodrich.

ARMED STRIKERS. Four Hundred on the Way From Northern Stations.

COTTONWOOD, July 4.—A train passed through here at 4 P. M. bound for Sacramento bearing 400 heavily armed strikers.

ARMING AT RED BLUFF. The train which carried Mrs. Stanton to the north started north for Dunsmuir this morning.

STATION AGENT, N. Jones was ordered by the strikers to close the railroad depot and the offices here, and he and his assistants are now on duty.

WILLING TO TAKE UP ARMS. Sisson, July 4.—Ever since word was received here of seventy-five armed strikers leaving Dunsmuir there has been considerable excitement, and a call for volunteers is hourly looked for from Dunsmuir.

THE GREAT RAILWAY STRIKE.

No Truth in the Report That a Settlement Has Been Reached.

STRIKE LEADERS ARRESTED FOR MAKING THREATS.

An Active Warfare to Be Inaugurated Against the American Railway Union Strikers in Colorado by the Denver and Gulf System—Through Trains on the Union Pacific Abandoned.

CHICAGO, July 4.—There is no truth in the report that the Pullman Company had effected a settlement with the strikers.

After the troops disembarked at the stock yards the strikers vented their spleen by ditching the two rear coaches of the troop train and disabled the engine by shoving coupling pins into the cross head guides, being careful, however, to wait until the regulars had got a safe distance away.

REPORTS TO-NIGHT FROM FIFTY-SEVENTH STREET are that fast train No. 7, Lake Shore and Michigan Southern, from New York, is held up at the depot.
