

A MURDEROUS OUTRAGE.

A Train Wrecked and Five Men Murdered.

Arrest of S. D. Worden, a Leading Railway Union Man.

The Community Shocked by the Dastardly Crime—Capture of Arms from the Strikers.

The railway strikers, or their allies, caused the climax of their illegal acts yesterday when they wrecked a train sent out from this city for San Francisco, causing the murder of five men and the injury of several others so severely that many of them will probably die.

It was an act so infamous as to warrant every decent citizen who may have sympathized with the strikers to desert them now.

It may be that the dastardly outrage was not committed by members of the American Railway Union, but it is certain that members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers have been threatened with death by members of the American Railway Union, who have told them that they would never live to haul a Pullman car ten miles.

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time to save his life. He is the one who had a narrow escape.

The following is a correct list of the killed and injured by the wreck:

KILLED. Samuel B. Clark, engineer of the train. Private Clark. Private Dugan. Private Lubberien. Private Dugan, right arm cut off, left arm crushed, and injured about the face.

INJURED. Private Wilson, leg injured. Private Danier, dangerously hurt about the head. Private Ellis, thought to be hurt internally.

HOW IT WAS DONE. The fiends who wrecked the train and sent so many brave and innocent men to an awful death had planned their job well.

SEARCHING FOR THE FIENDS. The soldiers on the train reported that several men were seen in the bushes between the Yolo side of the river and the depot where the wreck occurred.

REWARD FOR THE MURDERERS. As will be seen by reference to our advertising columns, the Southern Pacific Railroad Company has offered a reward of \$5,000 for information or evidence leading to the arrest and conviction of one or more of the criminals who perpetrated the dastardly outrage.

ARRIVAL OF THE TROOPS. Their Occupation of the Depot and Railroad Yards. It was announced in the Record-Union yesterday that Federal troops were en route from San Francisco by way of the river.

LANDING AND DISPOSITION. The boats landed at the foot of Y street, about 6 A. M. yesterday, the whole river frontage at the time being occupied by the National Guard of California.

FIXING GUARD LINES. The command entered the depot grounds unobstructed, took possession at once and threw out guard lines rapidly.

MAKING UP A TRAIN. The strikers were up all in the crowd, which was fairly strong, but probably half of them were strung along the sidewalk on Second street and gathered about their headquarters.

STORY OF THE WRECK. A Record-Union reporter had a talk with Conductor Reynolds concerning the wreck as soon as he reached the city.

THE FIREMAN'S STORY. J. S. Denekamp, the fireman on the locomotive, told the reporter that just as soon as he felt the engine toppling over the side of the trestle he jumped out of the cab door on the opposite side and landed safely on the trestle.

THE FIFTH BATTERY. The Fifth United States Artillery, was detached with twenty-one men of the same battery to go with the train to protect it from any assault that might be made upon it.

THE TROOPS. The troops in and about the depot were all drawn up ready for action in case any attempt should be made by the strikers to interfere with the train.

THE WRECK. The place where the train was wrecked and four brave men killed is about two miles from the city, where the track runs over quite a long trestle, beneath which the water is about six feet deep, being a portion of the great Yolo tule basin.
