

THE BAD RESULTS OF STRIKES.

Immorality and Unreasonableness of the Method Used.

Sixty Million Dollars in Wages Secured in This Country in the Last Six Years.

[Rev. T. J. Horner, pastor of the Unitarian Society, was born and brought up near Pittsburg, Pa., the greatest storm center of strikes in America outside of Chicago. His convictions are the result of the observations of the principles and methods of many strikes, including the great Homestead strike of two years ago, during which he was in Pittsburg.]

Mr. Horner said that both observation and study had thoroughly convinced him that the strike, as a method of bringing about justice among men, was morally wrong. "I am convinced," he said, "that the principle back of the strike, though justly denied, inevitably leads to injustice, lawlessness, treason and finally anarchy."

"As much was acknowledged to me the other evening, by one who stands high in this community among intellectual people, that the strike, as a method of bringing about justice among men, was morally wrong. I am convinced, he said, that the principle back of the strike, though justly denied, inevitably leads to injustice, lawlessness, treason and finally anarchy."

"He did not agree with me that the wrecking of the coal mine on Wednesday was a dastardly deed. He might as well have said that the end justified the deed, which is the argument of anarchy."

"Now, while I believe in the strike, and many of their sympathizers were horrified at the idea of being looked upon as sympathizers with anarchy, that is the inevitable result of the strike method of obtaining justice, and the fact that no great strike ever occurs without such a result goes far toward proving that many people do see it that way, and justify themselves in carrying the thing itself to such an end. The leaders of the strike, who claim responsibility for all lawlessness and human responsibility amounts to zero."

"Do not understand, friends, that I am joining cordial and hearty methods because I denounce the method of the strike; not at all, that is another question. Now to get to the main question: If the kingdom of God is to come among men; if justice is to be done, it has got to come through faith in the inherent integrity and goodness of human nature, and the realization of the spirit of the Golden Rule. The kingdom of Heaven is not to be taken by force."

"On the other hand, is the spirit of compulsion acting negatively. Instead of doing as one would be done by, it is doing just what one would not have done by him when his interest is not at stake. Instead of suffering injustice for a time until it can be exposed and adjusted by the ballot, the object of the strike is to inflict a penalty on the lawbreaker by his own hands, and return evil for evil. From the standpoint of a Unitarian, believing that character is the chief thing in life, if a man injures me, I can afford to bear the injury if he can afford to do that sort of thing. His injury may hurt me financially or in the estimation of the world, but it cannot affect my character unless I stoop to return evil for evil. Like the boomerang his act returns upon himself and his character is so injured that he really injures himself, and the world to long time to learn and apply the law of love."

"Again the strike is based on the idea that a man has right to quit work when not satisfied with the conditions under which he works. "This principle is loudly proclaimed at the present time for the laboring man. Labor being the capital of the laboring man, as he said, shall not the owner do as he will with his own? Certainly, as long as he is not satisfied with another exercising the same privilege, but, interdependent as we are, that is almost an impossibility. "If the railroad of this country should suddenly suspend operations owing to the hard times (and it is a fact that many of them are not making the interest necessary to keep their bonds above par) how long do you suppose it would take the people to annul their charters, and in the name of the people confiscate and operate them for the public use?"

"Now, suppose a switch tender (whose ability to tend a switch is his capital) located at a desert point grows tired of his job and decides to quit. He is not to be well as might, suddenly quits work and telegraphs the company to that effect. Suppose a man who could do his work cannot do his work, or who cannot reach his station for a week, how many people are there in the world who would justify his working or not, as it pleased his own fancy, or his own notion of his duty to himself?"
