Business in All Lines Inactive at San Francisco.

Sales of Fruit Large, But Prices Are So Low They Are Unsatisfactory to Producers.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21st. Business in nearly all lines of both Produce and Merchandise continues very inactive, and values generally are almost devoid of stability.

The movement of freight by rail is gradually on the increase, and this fact has had a beneficial effect in permitting dealers to fill country orders and at the same time reduce the heavy accumulations. Receipts of produce yesterday were large, but the demand was rather light as compared with the preceding day. Sales of fresh fruit continue extensive, but the prices realized are so low that returns are unsatisfactory to growers. Strawberries are in good supply, and the best varieties are held quite steady; the common grades are plentiful, very low priced and in moderate demand. Blackberries and Raspberries are coming to hand freely, and although sales are large, values remain low and weak. Cherries are becoming less plentiful, but supplies are more than ample for the demand. Peaches are selling well, but the ruling prices are very low, and even fancy stocks do not readily bring 1800 stock. Apples are quiet and cheap. Bartlett Pears are selling very slowly, but present stocks are not excessive. Plums are in good supply and selling fairly well. There is no demand for Raisins and Prunes, and these articles will continue to arrive freely and selling well. Sales of Dried Fruits are light, and the present outlook is not of an encouraging nature. Prices remain unchanged. Creamery Butter is firmer and dealers are holding fancy stock for higher prices, but a slight advance advanced yesterday, and a further upward movement is expected in a few days. Other varieties of Dairy Produce are in moderate supply and low priced. Poultry continues inactive, with the prices weak. Wheat remains very dull in the local market. Flour and other buyers are holding off. The export trade is at a standstill.
