When Game May be Shot in the Several Counties.

The General State Law in Effect Where the Supervisors Have Taken No Action.

Following is a list of the dates within which game may be shot in the several counties. The State law, which is in force where there are no local ordinances, provides:

- Quail, partridge, grouse or any kind of wild duck, snipe or rail, September 1st to March 1st. Doves, August 1st to March 1st. Trout, April 1st to November 1st. Male deer, elk, antelope or mountain sheep, September 1st to October 15th. Alameda—Deer, July 20th to September 2d. Doves, July 1st to March 1st. Rail, shooting prohibited for two years. Alpine—No change. Amador—No change. Butte—Quail, October 1st to March 1st. Deer, August 1st to November 1st. Colusa—Doves, July 1st to March 1st. Deer, August 1st to October 1st. Contra Costa—Doves, June 15th to March 1st. Deer, July 20th to September 2d. The use of dogs in deer hunting prohibited. Calaveras—Doves, July 1st to March 1st. No other change. Del Norte—Doves, July 1st to March 1st. Deer, July 1st to September 15th. El Dorado—Doves, June 25th to January 1st. Quail, October 1st to March 15th. Deer, September 1st to October 15th. (Quail not allowed to be shot for market.) Fresno—No change. Glenn—Deer, August 15th to October 1st. No other change. Humboldt—Quail, bob-white, partridge, wild duck or rail, October 1st to March 1st. Grouse, Wilson or jacksnipe, September 1st to March 1st. Doves, August 1st to March 1st. Deer, July 1st to October 15th. Inyo—No change. Kings—No change. Kern—Quail, grouse, partridge and duck, November 1st to January 15th. Pheasant, shooting prohibited for three years. The use of net or seine in fishing prohibited. Lake—Doves, July 1st to March 1st. Deer, August 1st to October 1st. Lassen—No change. Los Angeles—Deer, July 15th to September 1st. Duck and snipe, September 15th to March 15th. The killing of sea lion, meadow lark, road-runners, pheasant and gray snipe, is prohibited. Madera—Any person hunting quail in the county of Madera for market shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Hunting for market, as used in this section, is the taking or killing of quail with intent to sell or ship the same. Mariposa—No change. Marin—Quail, October 1st to February 1st. Doves, August 1st to January 1st; deer, July 15th to September 1st. Mendocino—Deer, shooting prohibited until August, 1895. No other change. Merced—No change. Modoc—No change. Mono—Doves, June 1st to March 1st. Ducks, August 1st to March 1st; trout, June 1st to March 1st. Monterey—Quail, October 1st to March 1st; doves, July 1st to March 1st; deer, July 15th to September 1st. Napa—Quail, grouse, partridge, grouse or any kind of wild duck, September 1st to March 1st; snipe or rail, September 1st to May 1st; doves, August 1st to March 1st; deer, July 25th to September 30th. Nevada—Valley quail, October 1st to March 1st; mountain quail, September 1st to March 1st; doves, July 1st to March 1st; deer, September 1st to December 1st; trout, June 1st to December 1st. Orange—Duck, snipe and rail, September 15th to March 15th; doves, August 1st to February 1st. Placer—Quail, partridge, grouse or rail, September 15th to March 1st; doves, July 1st to March 1st; trout, June 1st to November 15th; deer, June 1st to November 1st. Plumas—Doves, July 1st to January 1st; duck, August 1st to March 1st; deer, September 1st to January 1st. Riverside—No change. Sacramento—Quail, October 1st to March 15th; quail, October 1st to March 1st; snipe or rail, October 1st to May 1st; doves, July 15th to March 1st. San Joaquin—Doves, July 20th to March 1st; striped bass, under three pounds when caught by hook and line only, sale prohibited. San Benito—Deer, August 1st to September 15th. No other change. San Bernardino—The sale of mountain trout is prohibited. Catches of trout limited to fifty per day. All trout under five inches in length must be returned to the river at once. San Diego—Doves, August 1st to May 1st; deer, July 1st to October 1st; duck, September 1st to May 15th. San Francisco—Quail, duck, snipe, lark and robin, October 1st to March 1st; doves, July 1st to March 1st. San Juan—Quail, October 1st to March 1st; deer, July 15th to September 1st. San Mateo—Quail, September 15th to March 1st; doves, August 1st to December 1st; deer, July 15th to September 1st. The use of dogs prohibited in deer hunting. Santa Barbara—Deer, August 1st to September 15th. No other change. Santa Cruz—Deer, August 1st to September 15th. No other change. Santa Clara—Deer, July 15th to September 1st. Shooting prohibited; doves, July 1st to February 1st. Shasta—Doves, June 25th to January 1st; deer, July 15th to September 1st. Sierra—No change, except trout fishing, July 1st to April 1st. Siskiyou—Quail, September 1st to February 1st; deer, September 1st to November 15th. Solano—Quail, October 1st to March 1st; doves, July 1st to February 1st; deer, July 1st to August 15th. Sonoma—Quail, bob-white, partridge or grouse, October 1st to March 1st; deer, July 25th to September 4th; doves, August 1st to January 1st; striped bass, under three pounds when caught by hook and line only, sale prohibited. Stanislaus—No change. Sutter—Doves, July 15th to January 1st. No other change. Tehama—Doves, July 1st to March 1st; deer, July 15th to October 15th. No other change. Trinity—No change. Tulare—Quail, snipe or rail, October 1st to March 1st; trout and bass, April 1st to October 1st. No other change. Tuolumne—Quail, October 1st to April 1st; doves, July 1st to February 1st; deer, October 1st to November 15th. Ventura—Quail, ducks, snipe and rail, October 1st to March 1st; deer, July 15th to September 1st. Shooting for market of quail, wild duck, doves or partridges prohibited. Private Flagler of Troop I, Fourth United States Cavalry, was riding out of Sixth street into K bearing messages, when his horse slipped at the edge of the bituminous pavement. The weight of the trooper was thus thrown suddenly upon one stirrup, the strap of which parted and the rider was precipitated to the ground, the horse falling and falling over the leg and ankle of the trooper. The trooper was hurt. The animal quickly regained its feet, and instead of running away turned and stood beside its master and put down its muzzle to him, as if to say, "Are you hurt?" Flagler was carried into Phelps' drug store and given every possible attention. He was rendered almost senseless for a time by the shock and one of his legs appeared to be badly injured. A physician was quickly at hand and pronounced no bones broken. In the meantime the army ambulance was telephoned for and came within a surprisingly short time, as also did the army officers, who manifested the utmost solicitude for the injured trooper and attended upon him as upon a brother. In due time he was placed in the ambulance and conveyed to the quarters hospital. The very large crowd that assembled at the scene of the accident was afforded an opportunity to see how a first-class ambulance, such a one as the city ought to have, worked. We were not allowed but a single motion, out there came a band, which by a turn of the wrist opened out and took the shape of a wheeled cot or litter.
