Fair Trade Doing on Export Account in Wheat.

No Business of Magnitude in Progress in Barley-Oat Dealers Report a Very Dull Market.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 16th. There is fair trade doing on export account in wheat, but values are against sellers.

Dealers report a very dull market in oats. Prices easy, with a tendency to make concessions in order to do business.

The receipts of vegetables are heavy. Potatoes are weak under heavy supplies. Onions are firm. Prices elsewhere are weak.

The demand for fresh fruits is light. In comparison with arrivals, and prices are weak in all lines.

The butter market is steady and firm. Eggs are higher. An Eastern shipment is expected to-day.

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

AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN. Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 16. A resolution to propose to the people of the State of California an amendment to article thirteen of the Constitution, section one, in relation to revenue and taxation.

AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE. Assembly Constitutional Amendment No. 8. A resolution to propose to the people of the State of California an amendment to the Constitution of the State, amending section nine of article thirteen thereof, relative to the right of suffrage.

trust, contract or other obligation by which a debt is secured, money, or solvent credits, above its face value. The State Board of Equalization elected in eighteen hundred and ninety-four shall continue in office until their successors, as herein provided for shall be elected and shall qualify.

Section 1. All property in the State, not exempt under the laws of the United States, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, to be ascertained as provided by law. The word "property" as used in this article and section, is hereby declared to include moneys, credits, bonds, stocks, fees, franchises, and all other matters, rights, things, or persons at all times capable of private ownership; provided, that property used for free public libraries, free museums, growing crops, property used exclusively for public schools, and such as may belong to the United States, this State, or to any county or municipal corporation within this State, shall be exempt from taxation. The Legislature may provide, except in case of credits secured by mortgage or trust deed, for a deduction from credits of debts due to bona fide residents of this State.

Section 2. The Governor, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the President of the University of California, and the Professor of Pedagogy therein, and the President of the State Normal Schools, shall constitute the State Board of Education, and shall compile, or cause to be compiled, and adopt, a uniform series of text-books for use in the common schools throughout the State. The State Board may cause such text-books, when adopted, to be printed and published by the State Printing Office, and when so printed and published to be distributed and sold at the cost price of printing, and prohibiting any other publisher from publishing the same. The text-books so adopted shall continue in use not less than four years, and said State Board shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall provide for a Board of Education in each county in the State. The County Superintendents and the County Boards of Education shall have control of the examination of teachers and the granting of teachers' certificates within their respective jurisdictions.

Section 3. The members of the Legislature shall receive, in full payment for their services, the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars, and shall be allowed ten cents per mile, and for contingent expenses not to exceed twenty-five dollars, for each session, to be paid out of the public treasury. No increase in compensation or mileage shall take effect during the term for which the members of either house shall have been elected, and the salary of any member shall be increased after he is elected or appointed.

Section 12. Fruit and nut-bearing trees under the age of four years from the time of planting in orchard form, and grapes under the age of three years from the time of planting in vineyard form, shall be exempt from taxation, and no act or law passed during the term of this article shall be construed as subjecting such trees and grapevines to taxation.

Section 13. Section 14. Foreigners of the white race, or of African descent, eligible to become citizens of the United States under the naturalization laws thereof, while bona fide residents of this State, shall have the same rights in respect to the acquisition, possession, enjoyment, transmission, and inheritance of all property, other than real estate, as native citizens; provided, that such aliens owning real estate at the time of the adoption of this amendment may remain in the State; and provided further, that the Legislature may, by statute, provide for the disposition of real estate which shall hereafter be acquired by such aliens by descent or devise.

Section 15. City and county governments shall be merged and consolidated into one municipal government, with one set of officers, and may be incorporated under general laws providing for the incorporation and organization of incorporations for municipal purposes. The provisions of this Constitution applicable to cities, and also those applicable to counties, so far as not inconsistent or prohibited to cities, shall be applicable to such consolidated government.

Section 16. A State Board of Equalization, consisting of one member from each congressional district in this State, shall be elected by the qualified electors of their respective districts at the first general election to be held after the adoption of this amendment, and at each general election every four years, whose term of office shall be for four years, whose duty it shall be to equalize the taxes on taxable property in the several counties of the State for the purposes of taxation. The Controller of State shall be ex officio a member of the Board. The Boards of Supervisors of the several counties of the State shall constitute Boards of Equalization for their respective counties, whose duty it shall be to equalize the valuation of the taxable property in the county for the purpose of taxation; provided, such State and County Boards of Equalization are hereby authorized and empowered, under such rules of notice as the County Boards may prescribe as to the time of assessment, and under such rules of notice as the State Board may prescribe as to the action of the State Board, to increase or lower the entire assessment roll, or any assessment contained therein, so as to equalize the assessment of the property contained in said assessment roll, and make the assessment conform to the value in money of the property contained in said roll; provided, that no Board of Equalization shall raise any mortgage, deed of

Section 17. Whenever the Legislature shall propose any amendments to the Constitution of this State, which amendments or amendments shall have been passed in the manner and form required by section eight of article eight of the Constitution, and no other mode is provided by law for the submission of such amendments or amendments to the people for their approval, and in issuing a proclamation for an election at which any amendment or amendments to the Constitution are to be voted upon, he shall include such amendments or amendments therein, and he shall designate them by numbers, in the order in which they have been proposed.
