A VERY REMOTE CONTINGENCY.

It is interesting to watch the imbecility of the anti-railroad sentiment on this coast. If railroad abuses exist, their reform is not only postponed but the effort in the direction of reform is absolutely smothered by the introduction of impossible and impractical suggestions.

The railroads of the United States will not be owned by the Government. The whole proposition is preposterous. It is evidently one of the means by which the railroad companies attract attention away from themselves.

The Government ownership of these roads by purchase of their capital stock or by condemnation would make good to the investor both of the stock and bonds all this extravagance. It would be a Governmental confirmation of excessive capitalization.

The Government ownership of existing railroads would be a godsend to all the railroads in the country. If they are prosperous they are valuable, and the Government must pay in proportion to their value.

We suggest to the candidates for Governor and for Members of Congress from this State in the current campaign the Governmental construction of railroads and the improvement of the water ways.

THE WILSON BILL FOR FIFTY YEARS.

In the retreat of the House from the position it had taken and voicing the surrender of the popular branch of the legislature to the Senate, Mr. Wilson declared that the sugar trust, anticipating the passage of the Senate bill, had purchased \$12,000,000 of sugar, the enhancement upon which by virtue of the passage of the bill would be \$40,000,000, but subsequently reduced his figures to \$25,000,000.

The whole war between the Senate and House of Representatives arose out of the fact that changes and modifications in the tariff schedules of the country influence the values of property.

The Wilson bill, with Senate modifications, has passed the House, and the Republican leader, Thomas B. Reed of Maine, defiantly declared that the Republicans would upset all this legislation; that the next Congress would be Republican; and that therefore within two or three years the Republicans would repeal the Wilson bill and would enact a new tariff schedule.

It is and has been the curse of America that both tariff and free trade measures have been afforded no test of their efficiency or value. It will be a thousand times better for this country that the Republicans shall fail of election than that the country shall stand in a state of uncertainty for two years to see whether Reed and his compatriots are going to get possession of Congress and make a new tariff bill.

The manufacturing interests of this country are suffering more from the perpetual menace of change than from any other cause. The politician class have tried to make the people believe that a change in the tariff would make them rich; and so the Republicans raise the cry that high protection is what the country wants, and securing control of the National Legislature, such protective measures are enacted.

It would be far better for this country that the Democrats obtain a majority in Congress for fifty years than that any radical and sudden change shall take place in the tariff schedules of the country. No investment of capital need be expected when such investment is made under the menace of radical changes in tariff rates.


