THAT BOILER-PLATE MATTER. A contemporary says that the RECORD-UNION was hasty in condemning the action of the Republican State Central Committee.

Take the instance under consideration. The Republican State Central Committee sent out a circular addressed to Republican newspapers, offering to furnish the Republican State platform—about two columns—and Este's speech—eight columns—for immediate use, and proposing to furnish other campaign literature from time to time in plate form to such papers as would accept it.

The first offer is for ten columns of matter in plate form. The plates would be produced from one setting of the type. There is no gain-saying this. It was not a matter of very great moment. It borrows all its significance from the pretense of friendship on the part of all parties for all kinds of labor.

This is the simple truth of this situation: Every column of boiler-plate matter which the Republican State Central Committee will send out will displace a column of composition in the paper using it.

IN A BAD BOX

Alexander Wheatley Must Answer to a Serious Charge. A short time ago a dozen of L street, known as Mabel Clifton, who had been arrested for vagrancy, were charged against Officer Bagley, which, if she could have proved, would have resulted in his dismissal from the police.

Wheatley is now in the toils, and it looks as though he will have a chance to wear stripes at the prison. On Monday night, as the officers were making a grand round-up of vags, Wheatley was gathered among the rest. Ex-Deputy Sheriff Ruppert of Colusa happened to be with Officer Lutherford when Wheatley was taken in and recognized him.

He told Lutherford, who used to live in Colusa, that he chased all over the state after Wheatley, who ran away with a 15-year-old girl named Rhoda Cox. When he was finally caught, he married the girl to escape prosecution. Wheatley warned to leave the town, came to Sacramento and hid her in his house.

As the officers had supposed that Wheatley was simply one of those apologies for men who live off the earnings of fallen women, this was news to Lutherford, who had known the girl when she was young. At the trial it was testified that Wheatley would sit on the opposite side of her crib, and when her visitors had departed would go over and take the money she had received.

As Ruppert says they were married by a Justice of the Peace, and the marriage is a matter of record, it puts Wheatley in a very serious position, as it is a Penitentiary offense for a man to place his wife in a house of prostitution. A Justice of the Peace drew has in his possession a copy of the marriage certificate, which shows that Wheatley and the Clifton woman were married in Williams, Colusa County, by Justice of the Peace W. H. Alvord, on October 11, 1892.
