LADIES' TOURNAMENT. The Number of Competitors Small, But They Are All Experts.

There was not a very large attendance at the Park yesterday forenoon to witness the first day of the ladies' riding tournament, but the decrease in the size of the audience was about proportionate to that in the number of lady contestants.

But four presented themselves to compete for the society's prizes, Miss Bard of Oakland and Miss Clara Berkeley, Edith Bradley and Glenn of this city.

The ladies were all well mounted and in the preliminary contest prizes were themselves to be graceful and skillful riders. Miss Bard rode a very high-strung horse, as a dashing rider, and evidently a very good one. She handled her charger very skillfully.

The other ladies had quieter mounts, but the horses were all well gaited. The quarter of mile race was in horse race—a "dead clinch" on so many of the society's prizes.

The ladies will conclude their tournament next Friday forenoon.

YESTERDAY'S RACES. Only Two Favorites Out of Five Were Winners.

Nobody would imagine from the way in which money poured into the pool-book on Thursday night and yesterday at the racetrack that there had ever been such a thing in California as a financial stringency, hard times or Coxey's armies.

It is said that the pool-bookies did a livelier business than ever before during the same space of time.

At 10 o'clock the first great stock parade will take place at the Park, and while the line will not be as long as in some years past, the quality of the livestock is said to be equal to the best ever seen at any State Fair.

Again starters showed and difficulty in getting the horses off, and the people became very weary of the delay. Again the runners broke away, only to return to the post and renew their dilatory tactics.

Gracie S. got the best of the send-off, while Happy Day and Gracie were left behind. Gracie's taver headed and won out in 1:14, with Conde close up and lapped by Abi P.

Those who had speculated heavily on Happy Day were very disconsolate, but there was no help for their misfortune.

The next was a handicap for all ages, one mile and fifty yards. The starters were Blizzard 120, Zohair 116, Carmel 100, Arno 85, and Lovdal 105.

This was another long wait, but the spectators were rewarded by a very pretty start and a most exciting race. Lovdal, the favorite, led off in the lead, but at the quarter had given way to Blizzard.

Up the backstretch they were well lunched, with Blizzard still in the lead, Zohair second and Lovdal third.

There was no daylight to be seen between them as they rounded the turn, but Lovdal was going to the front, and at Zohair, passing Blizzard, made a hard brush near the wire, but could do no better than land his nose at Lovdal's hip, Blizzard finishing third, Arno fourth and Carmel last. The mile was made in 1:32, and the race in 1:43.

The last pool sold was Cadmus \$90, Royal Flush \$20, Quirt \$20, and the field \$30.

After considerable delay a fair send-off was had. When the far turn was reached the favorite was next to the last, Emma D. leading the field around the turn and into the stretch.

There will undoubtedly be a very large attendance at the Park this afternoon to witness the three splendid trotting races on the card.

The chief event will be the 2:16 class, in which Martin Jr., Astor, Shylock, Adelaide, McGregor, She and Bruno are named to start.

There was the great post-selling last night on this race, the betting men falling over another and another to get their money on one horse or another.
