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divine ceremonial by sharp reference to the clergyman and his assault. If the attack of the preacher was coarse and vulgar, the attention given to him in the cornerstone ceremonies was in bad taste and pettish.

The preacher feels gratified that his shot took effect and drew fire, while the Pioneers gained simply surprised attention for manifestation of the irritation of old men. Of course to denounce the Native Sons as of unworthy sires was to insult the fathers by wholesale and in detail; and their retaliation may be said to have been natural, and therefore justifiable. But dignity preserved by refusal to return fire would better have comported with the ceremonies of laying the cornerstone, and with the character of the Pioneer associations.

LOOSE THINKING. President Adams of the University of Wisconsin, in his recent address to the senior class, said:

I cannot resist the conviction that there is in the country at large a vast amount of loose thinking in regard to the rights and wrongs of the laboring classes. A natural and commendable sympathy, and a part of it is the result of an indiscriminate sentimentality.

This is sound sense from a sensible, cool-headed reasoner. The truths of his expression ought to sink deep into the public thought of the day. There certainly is a vast amount of loose thinking about rights and wrongs. There is altogether too large a class of people who permit others to do their thinking for them, and this class is, as a rule, apt to take the dogmatic assertions and blatant and untruthful charges of the demagogue and sensationalists as gospel verity.

A EUROPEAN Hygienic Congress is discussing this week the question how to stop the outbreaks and spread of cholera. The answer is simple; cleanse Eastern Europe, enforce common cleanliness upon the religious fanatics of the Oriental East, whose filthy pilgrimage habits originate the pest. It surely cannot be said to be infringement upon the rights of conscience to require these cotton-clad worshippers and pilgrims to keep clean— to cease drinking water from "sacred" wells in which multitudes of dirty, bronzed and diseased pilgrims bathe.

This professor of a department of a San Francisco medical college is to lecture to the boys of a rural school next week upon "The Tongue." There would be some force and possible good results if the doctor were to lecture upon the tongue as a moral factor. It is in a young man's life his worst enemy as a rule. It matters little what he knows or is ignorant of concerning its physical features, if he but knows how to curb it and make it serve him by rest.

A LARGE CALENDAR. Numbers of Vagrants Ordered Out of the City. Justice Devine was confronted by a formidable calendar yesterday morning, the accumulation of jags and other offenses from Saturday till yesterday. Comprised in the list were thirteen cases of drunk and thirty-three of vagrancy.

The court announced that he would grant Harry McCloud a new trial on the charge of obtaining money by fraud. The City Attorney then asked that the case be dismissed, the testimony being insufficient, and it was so ordered. McCloud will serve his forty days on the rock pile, however, for vagrancy.

John Johnson, charged with petit larceny in stealing a gold necklace and locket from Flossie Hill, an L street denizen, pleaded guilty and was fined \$10.

Harry Hayes was convicted of having stolen an opium pipe from Ah Jim, and was given fifteen days.

John O'Neil, Ed. Wallace, R. Wheeler, Tom Brooks, Tom Doyle and Tom Lyons, convicted of vagrancy, will endeavor to diminish the county's granite pile for the next thirty days.

Alec Smith was discharged on a charge of resisting Officer Douglas, no complaint being filed. The similar charge against James Wilkerson was also dismissed.

MARSHALL CONVICTED. His Efforts to Help Wheatley React Upon Himself. Jeff Marshall was charged with vagrancy and Special Officer Alter told how Marshall lived with a fallen woman and also how he had tried to induce him (Alter) to quit the prosecution of Walter Wheatley, who was an intimate of Marshall.

Officer Rutherford gave a very bad account of Marshall's habits, as did other officers. Marshall claimed that he was a bartender, having been so employed about three years ago. The court pronounced him guilty and sentenced him to sixty days in jail, and when he comes out he will be able to say that he has been at work.

LATE SUPREME COURT DECISIONS.

A Fresno Right of Way Decision Confirmed.

After a Couple Have Been Divorced a Court Cannot Order Alimony Paid.

The Supreme Court has decided the case of J. C. Humphreys, respondent, vs. A. A. Blasingame, appellant, a Fresno County case.

Humphreys claimed a right of way between two parcels of his land across the land of Blasingame. He had owned the land for years before Blasingame bought his land and claimed the right of way by his land and not by sufferance and that his right had not till lately been brought into question. The lower court gave him judgment and findings and the Supreme Court confirmed it.

TEHAMA DECISION REVERSED. It has also considered a decision in the case of Elizabeth Howell, plaintiff and respondent, vs. T. N. Howell, defendant and appellant, a Tehama County case.

This was an appeal by defendant from an order of the Superior Court requiring him to pay to plaintiff \$100 per month alimony from January, 1883, till the further order of the court. In 1880 the parties were divorced and \$7,100 worth of community property in this State and the custody of two minor children were awarded to plaintiff, defendant at the time living and owning property in Colorado. The Supreme Court holds that the Superior Court was barred from such a decree, as the parties were no longer man and wife, and the former judgment said nothing of alimony. The judgment is therefore reversed.

FRESNO DECISION AFFIRMED. An opinion has also been rendered in the case of T. A. Bell, respondent, vs. P. F. Peck et al., appellants, a Fresno County case.

The action was brought against defendant Peck as principal and Victor and Noble as sureties on Peck's official bond as Constable, to recover damages for breach of contract to perform his official duties properly, he having by virtue of an attachment against and sale of his property seized and converted property of plaintiff.

The case, after having laid in Department 2 of the Superior Court for more than two years, was transferred to department 3, and the fact duly advertised in the papers. Defendants, however, claim to have done nothing about it, their attorney having moved out of the county. Judgment was given for plaintiff.
