MAX SCHROEDER HELD HIS DEFENSE IS RESERVED FOR THE SUPERIOR COURT.

Max Schroeder, the eleven-year-old boy who is charged with burglary in breaking into the office of the Phoenix Mill, came up in the Police Court yesterday.

J. H. Arnold told how he found the boy in the office on Sunday morning and when he asked him what he was doing there Schroeder said, "The other boy got all the money and skipped out."

Witness looked around and found the cash drawer had been broken open. He had left the office about fifteen minutes before and closed the door. The other boy was some counterfeiter in the drawer, usually that accumulated in the course of business.

Chief of Police Drew arrested the boy, and the chain which was kept in a drawer in the office was found in his pocket.

Julius McManus stated that the boy told him so many different stories that he considered him the most accomplished liar he ever met. He confessed, however, that he broke the cash box open with a hatchet. Schroeder stated among other things that a man named Taylor gave him the hatchet and told him to do the work and showed him how to get in. He afterward stated that he had been lying and that he committed the burglary alone.

He was held to answer and bail fixed at \$500, his attorney reserving his defense for the Superior Court.

C. W. GURNEY'S ESTATE. It amounts to \$8,000, and is bequeathed to his relatives.

Wilbur F. George has petitioned the Superior Court for the probate of the will of Charles W. Gurney, deceased. The estate is valued at \$8,000, and consists of property in the block F and G, Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, promissory notes and personal property.

Loud of Mendota, Ill., his piano; to his daughter, Alice Thurlow of Newburyport, Mass., his piano and diamond ring, and to his friends, Harriet Dick and Frank C. Byrne of Sacramento, Cal., each \$50.

He bequeaths various articles and \$300 to Mrs. Hattie Kober of this city; to the Sixth-street Methodist and Presbyterian Churches, and \$100 to bequeaths the remainder of his estate, after the payment of debts, to his sisters, Harriet Gurney, Louisa Gurney of Portsmouth, N. H., and Alice Gurney of Mendota, Ill., and his brother, Albert A. Gurney of Portsmouth, N. H., and his nieces, Emma Andrews and Alice Thurlow of Newburyport, Mass., and his daughter, F. N. Gurney, son of his deceased brother, Robert, share and share alike.

ONE MORE SCALP. The Speedy Ziegler Captures Another Bicycle Record.

The weather yesterday was not suited to fast riding on bicycles, a strong southeast breeze blowing all day. The members of the Ramblers team were out at the Park, however, and a few dashes were made at short distances.

Otto Ziegler, the San Jose youth who on the preceding day lowered the world's one-mile record to 1:50, took a spin at the quarter-mile record, unpaired, with flying start. H. C. Tyler held the record of 0:23 3/4, made it 0:23 1/2, and Ziegler, August 27th, but Ziegler yesterday cut it down to 0:22 1/2.

Edwards went against the paced quarter-mile record of 0:24 1/2, flying start, and made it in the same notch. He tried again in the afternoon, but made the same figure.

Ziegler made two attempts to break the paced quarter-mile, standing start record of 0:28, but each time he made it in 0:29. The paced makers were not fast enough to carry him, and on one occasion they quit early in the race and let him go it alone. The unpaired standing start record for that distance is 0:29 3/4, and Ziegler made it in 0:29 flat. Although practically unpaired, it cannot of course stand as unpaired record.

If the weather permits the Ramblers will keep up their record-breaking efforts the rest of the week.

THE FRUIT-GROWERS Convention of Horticulturists to Meet Here Next Month.

The State Board of Horticulture recently issued a call for a State Fruit-Growers' Convention, to be held at Sacramento November 20th to 23rd, inclusive.

As the American Pomological Society will hold its biennial session in this State in January next, it was contemplated to merge the two meetings into one, but this plan was finally abandoned, as it would interfere with the proceedings of the convention.

The convention in this city will be of more than usual importance, and many questions of vital interest to the horticultural industry will be acted upon. The great number of letters received indicate a large attendance.

POPULATION INCREASING.

Registration and School Lists Show Hundreds Coming Into the City.

Some facts have come to light during the registration of voters, indicating that the population of our county is increasing fast.

It is evident that the city and county have received large accessions, as latterly nearly half those registering are new voters, and have never been on the register before. There are also hundreds of transfers from other counties. It has also been noted that the city school lists are fuller than ever before, the new pupils belonging to families that have recently moved into the city. These facts would indicate that Sacramento is considered by outsiders a desirable city to reside in, and also that employment here has not been so hard to procure as elsewhere in the State.
