"Last evening Grove L. Johnson had a splendid reception in this town. He was met about half a mile from the town by a band and a torchlight procession composed of footmen and men on horseback and escorted to the hotel, which had been very prettily decorated with flags and draperies. He addressed a very large meeting at Marshall's Hall, at least 750 being present. The meeting was very enthusiastic.

"Mr. Johnson defined his position on the Healy mining bill and the mining question satisfactorily to the people. "Harold T. Power was President of the meeting, assisted by a large number of Vice-Presidents."

Superior Court Notes.

Charles Heisen has brought suit in the Superior Court against L. A. Spurgeon and H. S. Carey for the recovery of \$300 alleged to be due on a promissory note executed by Spurgeon to Carey, and afterward assigned by the latter to Heisen.

The firm of Booth & Co., by its attorney, L. T. Hatfield, has brought suit in the Superior Court against A. H. Rose for \$1,242.25 alleged to be due on two promissory notes.

Carl Strobel, receiver in the case of Francis C. Myers vs. James D. Boyer et al., has filed his report of the sale of the real estate and asks for judgment against James D. Boyer and Willard B. Sanborn for \$2,000, as provided for in the decree.

W. L. Sullivan, guardian of the estate of Louis B. Mohr, a minor, has filed his inventory of the estate in the County Clerk's office. There is now in the hands of the guardian the sum of \$2,500.

The attorneys for the plaintiff in the suit of Eli Mayo vs. George O. Hayford and L. C. Chandler have given notice that the Superior Court will be asked to set aside the judgment in favor of the defendant, and grant Mayo a new trial.
