How the Fourth Brigade Officers Would Improve It

A meeting of the officers of the Fourth Brigade, N. G. C., was held in this city on Saturday evening to consider certain proposed amendments to the military laws, to be submitted to the Officers' Association, which meets in San Francisco next month.

Brigadier-General T. W. Sheehan presided and Major W. W. Douglass acted as Secretary. Those present were: Colonel J. W. Guthrie, Lieutenant-Colonel H. Weinstein, Lieutenant-Colonel C. Hubbard (retired), Major W. H. Curson of Woodland, Major F. L. Atkinson, Major W. A. Gett, Jr., Major W. H. Sherburn, Major W. C. Schell, Major F. L. Quinn, Captain H. I. Seymour, Captain A. L. Lloyd, Captain F. P. Tuttle of Auburn, Captain Frank O'Grady of Yuba, Captain W. W. Green, Captain W. J. Hanna, Lieutenant A. E. Stearns, Lieutenant J. Zittinger, Lieutenant H. U. Prindle of Woodland, Lieutenant H. D. Lassalle of Yuba, Lieutenant L. A. Robie, Lieutenant Fred Martin, Lieutenant W. R. Ormsby and Lieutenant W. B. Mayfield.

The following proposed amendments were adopted: Reduce the Governor's staff to an Adjutant-General and an Assistant Adjutant-General, to retain their present rank.

Abolish Major-General and staff, and reduce the number of brigades from six to three, with a General for each brigade, and the staff to consist of an Assistant Adjutant-General (as Chief of Staff), with the rank of Major; Brigade Surgeon, with the same rank, and a Quartermaster, who performs the duties of Commissary; an officer to perform the duties of Ordnance Officer, Inspector of Rifle Practice and a Judge Advocate, each with the rank of Captain; a Chaplain, with the rank of First Lieutenant.

It was also decided to recommend that there be sixty infantry companies, to be divided into five battalions of twelve companies each, one regiment to be located in the south, two in San Francisco and vicinity, and two in Sacramento and adjacent northern counties; each regiment to have a Colonel, Lieutenant Colonel, a Major for each battalion in the regiment; an Adjutant, with the rank of Captain; a Surgeon with the same rank; an officer to perform the duties of Ordnance Officer and Inspector of Rifle Practice, an officer to perform the duties of Quartermaster and Commissary, an Assistant Surgeon and a Paymaster, each with the rank of First Lieutenant, and a Chaplain, with the rank of Captain.

It was also recommended that every member, while in camp, be paid \$1 per day. The placing of a battalion of four batteries in San Francisco was recommended, as was also the placing of a troop of cavalry in each brigade and two Gatling guns with each infantry regiment.

Back pay for the ten new companies organized since the last Legislature was recommended. The appointment by the Governor of a regular army officer on the Governor's staff as a military instructor was also recommended.

The following officers were appointed a committee to attend the meeting of the Officers' Association and present the views of the officers of the Fourth Brigade: General T. W. Sheehan, Colonel W. Guthrie, Lieutenant-Colonel H. Weinstein, Major W. H. Curson, Captain Frank O'Grady, Captain H. I. Seymour and Captain F. P. Tuttle.

DEDICATION ANNIVERSARY.

Delightful Reunion of Foresters—Hand-somely Exposed Resolutions. A dedication anniversary entertainment and dance was given on Saturday night by the Courts, Circles and Conclave of the Ancient Order of Foresters of America at Foresters' Hall, and a very pleasant affair it proved to be the large number who were present.

C. B. Strong presided, and with a few remarks introduced H. Fisher, the President of the Hall Association, who read a report of the financial affairs, showing that the hall cost \$31,061. The receipts from rent and stock assessments for the year were \$7,843.94, and the association has been enabled to pay off \$5,884 of its debt this year.

The programme was as follows: Vocal solo, Miss Taggart; recitation, Miss Pearl Baldwin; club singing, A. Klein; vocal solo, V. Kennitzer; cornet solo, "The Foresters' Song," Miss Sophia Jones; vocal solo, William Kennitzer.

A very pleasant feature followed the entertainment, and the Foresters, which met here in May, 1893, not having forgotten the generous way in which they were cared for by the local courts, presented a resolution that at that time several sets of resolutions reciting its appreciation of such treatment, and afterwards ordered the resolutions presented to be read by the Foresters, and the presentation had been reserved until Saturday night, and O. M. Cronkite made it on behalf of the Grand Court.

The presentation was responded for by C. M. Shearer and Court Sacramento by J. H. Cone. Mayor Stetman was also the recipient of an exposed resolution, and responded fittingly.

The High Court had also, during its session, passed unanimously a vote of thanks to the press of the city for its splendid reports and a very handsome engraved resolution of thanks to the Record-Union was presented to a representative of the paper.

The work of engraving all of the resolutions is splendidly done and excited much admiration. The dance then commenced to the sprightly music furnished by Fisher's orchestra, and continued until midnight, the guests all departing with the feeling that it had been a red letter evening in their lives.

Among those present was A. E. Mayhew, who claims to be the oldest Forester in California, and on this coast, he having joined the order this five years ago.

IN HIS OLD PULPIT.
Rev. T. H. H. Anderson Preaches His First Sermon Yesterday. Rev. T. H. H. Anderson yesterday assumed the pastorate of the Seventh-street Methodist Church. His text was the third chapter of Paul's epistle to the Ephesians, eighth verse—"Unto me, who am less than the least of all saints, is this grace given, that I should preach among the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ."

He divided the subject into three heads—first, Paul's estimate of himself; second, his estimate of Christ; third, his commission. Paul, he said, stood second only to Christ, and was the only man that ever interpreted the life of our Lord, and for that was called into the College of the Apostles. His estimate of himself as the least of all is a lesson not only to the pastor, but to the members of the church, who, in some instances, is the greatest. Paul never forgot what he had been and what Christ had done for him, and to his last day never forgave himself for his early persecution of the church. He had seen Christ, and the vision of Christ will ever live and give us other views of ourselves.

The speaker dwelt upon the phrase, "the unsearchable riches of Christ," and what he meant by the word he believed. The sermon was eloquent, and was listened to with marked attention by the congregation, and it is very evident that the conference had made no mistake in sending Mr. Anderson back here, where he has so many warm friends, which was plainly evinced when the whole congregation, at the conclusion of the services, to have a hand-shake from the pastor. He urged them to co-operate with him to build up the church, as a united body, and the preacher's aim always goes to pieces when it leaves it.
