A VERY TAKING SCHEME.

In this matter of the indebtedness of the Pacific Railways we have already shown, and it is now conceded on all sides, that the Government has its choice between permitting the first mortgage owners to take the properties, and thereby defeat the re-payment of the second or Government mortgage, or to discharge the first mortgage with the funds of the United States and take possession of the roads.

The Government will then, at this point, be in position to desire either to lease the roads or to sell them. In the matter of either lease or sale, the Central Pacific and Union Pacific Companies will stand as good a chance as any other companies to be successful competitors for the purchase or the lease.

The Central Pacific Company is related to the California railway system closely; the Southern Pacific Company could, therefore, pay as much, or more, for lease or purchase as any other possible bidder. But it is clear to any intelligence that a sale for cash could never be had; therefore terms of payment would have to be established. It would be folly for the Government to fix terms or establish schedules of payment for either purchase or lease in excess of the earning capacity of the roads.

It would follow then that terms of practical extension of the debt would be adjusted. By this road, therefore, a method of the extension of the time for discharging the debts resting on the Pacific railroads could be achieved, without any legislation providing for extension of the time of payment.

Suppose, however, that the Government declined to sell or to lease; then it would have to operate the roads itself. Now, in California a strong party has arisen favoring discharge of the first mortgage by the Government, then the foreclosure of the second mortgage, and the taking possession of the properties by the Government and their operation in the interest of California.

Conceal the real underlying motive of this desire as we may, and it still remains that the people of California are actually asking the people of the United States to forego all hope of recovering any part of the money paid on account of the credit extended to the railroads, as well as the hope of interest thereon for the future. That is to say, these people want these Pacific roads operated by the Government at the mere cost of maintaining them in good order, and of operating them.

This scheme would amount to precisely this, the presentation to the people of California and of the territory west of the Rocky Mountains, by the people of the United States, of all the money paid out in extension of aid to the Union Pacific and Central Pacific Railroads. A very short pause for thought will reveal to the most ordinary mind precisely that situation of the proposition.

The Stockton Mail has outlined this policy with more or less clearness. Of course it is not admitted, as none of the advocates of that theory will do, that the real purpose is to have the subsidies granted to the Pacific roads presented to the people of California. But the people of all the United States have a common interest in the return of the money, and California has no more right to expect that Maine or Florida, or any Eastern State, will forego its interest in that claim on behalf of the people of California than that the people of this State would be willing to forego their interest in any money due the nation from the people of any Eastern State.

It is a very taking scheme, as are all propositions to get something valuable at a great bargain. It can be set forth in very catchy terms, and be backed by plausible excuses; but, divested of all its ornamentation, it means that the people of the Pacific Coast shall be presented out of hand with, approximately, \$200,000,000 from the United States Treasury.

On the other hand an extension of the time for the payment of the debt for at least one hundred years, at not to exceed 2 per cent, is about the only proposition that has been made having any practical value, or promising any return to the treasury of the United States of the money loaned to aid in the construction of the Pacific railroads.

TO VOTERS OF THE TWENTY-FIRST ASSEMBLY DISTRICT.

The Republicans of the Twenty-first Assembly District should make their activity very pronounced this week. Sacramento cannot afford to go up to the Legislature with weak representation in the House. It is of highest importance to every material interest that we should have in the Legislature a delegation that will command respect and that has had experience in law-making and in public life.

The Republican nominee, Mr. Hatfield in the Twenty-first District, is a man who does not feel that it is seemly to go about in his district and beg for votes and wrestle after the manner of too many to secure election. He has addressed the people of his district, made his candidacy widely known, responded to all inquiries made as to his position and sought in all reputable ways to present himself to the voters.

In his case the nomination essentially sought him. His successful services in the defeat of the Capital removal inquiry entitles him to the gratitude of the people, and to refuse to elect him will be the height of ingratitude. The party puts him forward as a representative man, able, dignified, commanding personal respect, versed in the law, fully informed as to our needs and devoted to the best interests of the city. Those opposed to

him are men without experience, parliamentary training, legal study or capacity in debate, such as our representative should have.

Sacramento, because it is the Capital, is peculiarly the object of assault, and this coming session will be more so than ever before. Can the voters of the Twenty-first district in the premises to vote for Mr. Hatfield? Will they put the interests of this city at the mercy of untutored men, incompetent and unskilled men—indeed, almost unknown men? Irrespective of party, the people of the Twenty-first district vote for Mr. Hatfield for self-interest.

TO READ the Democratic press of the State just now, the person not familiar with California history would be led to think that the Democratic party in this neck of the woods never had any boss leadership or control. Such a holding up of hands in assumed holy horror we never did see.

GROVE L. JOHNSON is advocated for Congressman because it is in the first interest of this county to elect him. Sacramento has never had a Congressman, and now that opportunity presents, she should seize upon it.

THE Japs have achieved another victory—taken a walled city; by default, it is true, but none the less a victory. Really this thing is getting monotonous.

AMERICAN RIVER GRANGE.

FRANK JONES HELD.

He Wished to Take His Dose and Have Done With It. Frank Jones was arraigned in the Police Court yesterday on the charge of burglarizing the Witherbee mansion, and also of attempting to rob E. L. Hawk in his office.

Mr. Witherbee identified a shirt that Jones had on when he was captured, a watch, pistol and valise and other articles which were taken from his house on the night of the burglary and sold by Jones. Mrs. Witherbee corroborated her husband's testimony and identified the things.

An L-street woman identified Jones as the man who had given her a number of the articles. Officers Talbot and Higgins testified to recovering the various articles. Jones was held to answer for burglary, and his bail was fixed at \$1,000.

He was then examined on the charge of attempting to rob E. L. Hawk. Mr. Hawk testified to the fact that Jones attempted to take the safe and enforced his demand with a pistol, as related in this paper at the time. Officer Higgins testified to the facts of the arrest.

Jones was asked if he wished to be sworn, and said: "No; I want to take my dose right now and have it over with." He was held to answer on the second charge also, with bail fixed at the same amount.

At or about 9:30 on the evening of October 11th, the overland mail and express train No. 3 was stopped by robbers, about five miles west of Sacramento, in Yolo County, California. The express car was robbed of about \$50,000 (fifty thousand dollars) in gold coin. The train men and express messenger were shot at several times to accomplish the robbery. The following is a brief description of the robbers, as far as known at present: One about six feet high, weighing about 200 pounds, the other about five feet nine inches, weighing about 170 pounds. Each wore linen dusters and masks on their faces. The Southern Pacific Company and Wells, Fargo & Company will pay a reward of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for the arrest and conviction of each of the robbers, and a five thousand (\$5,000) dollars for the recovery of the money stolen or a proportionate amount for any sum recovered.
