

COMMERCIAL. The Wheat Market Presents a Strong Tone at Advanced Prices. Barley Showing Increased Strength, Under Firm Holding - Better Feeling in the Oat Market.

SAN FRANCISCO, November 12th. The wheat market presents a strong tone at a further advance in price. Barley shows increasing strength, under firm holding. Trade is not particularly brisk, though the tendency of the market is against buyers.

The vegetable market is well supplied, with a light demand in all lines. Tomatoes are firm. Potatoes are in good supply. The fresh fruit market is dull. Grapes and Apples move off slowly. Limes are weak. The butter market holds firm. Eggs are weak at quotations. Cheese is steady.

HORTICULTURAL Quarantine Regulations. At a meeting of the State Board of Horticulture, held in San Francisco August 16, 1894, the following regulations were adopted in accordance with laws regulating such matters, and are therefore binding upon all persons.

REGULATIONS. Article I - All trees, plants, cuttings, grafts, buds or clous imported into this State from any foreign country, or from any of the United States Territories, are hereby prohibited from being introduced into this State unless they are accompanied by a duly commissioned Quarantine Guardian, who shall determine whether the said trees, plants, cuttings, grafts, buds or clous are free from all injurious insects, fungi, bacteria, or other diseases known to be injurious to fruit or to other trees or plants, and liable to spread contagion, or which are prohibited from being introduced into this State, and shall be so certified by the said Guardian.

Article II - All trees, plants, cuttings, grafts, buds or clous imported into this State from any foreign country, or from any of the United States Territories, and which are known to be infested with any insect, fungus, bacteria, or other disease known to be injurious to fruit or to other trees or plants, and liable to spread contagion, or which are prohibited from being introduced into this State, shall be immediately destroyed, or otherwise disposed of, at the expense of the importer, and shall not be allowed to remain in this State for more than ten days for subsequent inspection, and if deemed necessary by the Quarantine Officer of this State, or by a duly commissioned Quarantine Guardian, for further disinfection.

Article III - All trees, plants, cuttings, grafts, buds or clous imported into this State from any foreign country, or from any of the United States Territories, and which are known to be infested with any insect, fungus, bacteria, or other disease known to be injurious to fruit or to other trees or plants, and liable to spread contagion, or which are prohibited from being introduced into this State, shall be immediately destroyed, or otherwise disposed of, at the expense of the importer, and shall not be allowed to remain in this State for more than ten days for subsequent inspection, and if deemed necessary by the Quarantine Officer of this State, or by a duly commissioned Quarantine Guardian, for further disinfection.

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REWARD! San Francisco, Oct. 12, 1894. TO UNITED STATES MARSHALS, SHERIFFS, CONSTABLES, POLICE AND OTHER OFFICERS.

At or about 9:30 on the evening of October 11th the overland mail and express train No. 3 was stopped by robbers, about five miles west of Sacramento, in Yolo County, California. The express car was robbed of about \$50,000 (fifty thousand dollars) in gold coin. The train men and express messenger were shot at several times to accomplish the robbery. The following is a brief description of the robbers, as near as known at present: One about six feet high, weighing about 200 pounds, the other about five feet nine inches, weighing about 170 pounds. Each wore linen drawers and masks and had their faces whitened. The Southern Pacific Company and Wells, Fargo & Company will pay a reward of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for the arrest and conviction of each of the robbers, and five thousand (\$5,000) dollars for the recovery of the money stolen or a proportionate amount for any sum recovered.

REWARD! The Southern Pacific Company hereby offers to pay FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS As a reward for information or evidence leading to the arrest and conviction of one or more of the criminals who caused the derailment of west bound mail and passenger train, No. 4, at a point about three miles west of Sacramento about noon this date, JULY 11, 1894, in which wreck three or more persons were killed.
