

SIX HUNDRED VAGRANT DOGS LESS.

Work of Poundmaster Cookley the Last Nine Months.

How the Public Pound is Managed—Visit of Inspection by Humane Society Officials.

A few days since the President of the Humane Society and City Trustee Lawton paid a visit of inspection to the public pound, and the result thereof has been embodied in the following report to the Mayor:

Hon. B. U. Steinman, Mayor—DEAR SIR: On the incoming of your honor into office you requested the Humane Society to manifest special concern in the keeping of the public pound. You also permitted this society to select the Poundkeeper, whom you nominated and the honorable Trustees confirmed. W. B. Cookley was thus chosen and duly qualified.

As the society year is closing and we are about to retire for our successors the Board of Directors deem it right and proper to submit to you a report relative to the pound. We have, so far as possible, kept watch over the pound administration during the year. They have freely advised the Poundkeeper, who is also an officer of our association under the State law.

On this day the President of the society, in behalf of the board, and accompanied by Hon. W. B. Lawton, Secretary of the society and President of the honorable Board of Trustees, made an investigation of the pound.

It was found to be roomy as to grounds, affording sufficient room for stock; to be scrupulously kept, and to have adequate provision and food for animals as good as can be expected.

The stables are small but warm, neat and excellently kept. They are probably ample for present demand.

The dog pens are numerous, warm, clean and could scarcely be bettered. There is a dry place and where the animals can have sunshine and exercise if long detained.

MR. BASLER'S ESTATE.

It is to be Divided Equally Among Her Sons and Daughters.

William H. Basler has petitioned the Superior Court for the probate of the will of Anna M. Basler, deceased, and for letters testamentary thereon.

The estate consists of the west half and the southeast quarter of section 36, township 10 north, range 4 east, section 6 east, township 9 north, range 4 east, and the southwest quarter of section 6, township 9 north, range 5 east, in this county, valued at \$6,000; also, personal property consisting of furniture and wearing apparel valued at \$1,500, and cash to the amount of \$237.

The petitioner is named in the will as executor, without bonds. The devisees are: to his children, Mary Jane Thomas, a resident of Grass Valley. The heirs are the petitioner and the other devisees and Mrs. Kate Kohl, Mrs. Mary Wolf, Mrs. Regina Stafford, Mrs. Emma E. Holt, Mrs. Kate Winkelman and Mrs. Celia Hess. The five last named are nieces of the deceased.

According to the provisions of the will the deceased bequeathed to her youngest son, Chas. M. Basler, a knitted bedspread, the handiwork of the deceased, and to her children—Mary Jane Thomas, Geo. A. Basler, Wm. H. Basler and Chas. M. Basler—the property, real, personal and mixed, share and share alike.

A GOOD APPOINTMENT. P. E. Platt selected to Represent Orange-growers in the East. Yesterday P. E. Platt, the well-known local fruit-grower and shipper, received the news of his appointment of General Eastern Agent of the Southern California Fruit Exchanges. The importance lies in the fact that the exchanges control four-fifths of the entire orange crop of the State, or say about 4,500 carloads.

About forty different associations are growing oranges in the county. There are eight exchanges, as follows: Riverside Fruit Exchange, Riverside; San Bernardino County Fruit Exchange, Colton; Imperial-Monterey Citrus Association, Duarte; San Antonio Fruit Exchange, Pomona; Semi-Tropic Fruit Exchange, Los Angeles; Orange County Fruit Exchange, Santa Ana; San Diego County Fruit Exchange, San Diego; Queen Colony Fruit Association, South Riverside.

Mr. Platt will in the near future visit the Eastern markets and perhaps locate in Chicago. This appointment, coming as it does to a Sacramento citizen, is perhaps to be considered as evidence of the fact that Sacramento educates men in the fruit business, and hence is a compliment to the county as well as the recipient of the honor.
