the work of naval shipbuilding shall not, at least, be entirely discontinued. With the stoppage of this work many large plants now at work for the navy will be shut down either completely or in part, and their corps of skilled workmen employed in the various plants of naval construction and development be discharged and scattered, while the plant and machinery for the production of vessels of war must of necessity become idle and be allowed to deteriorate.

We apprehend that the calm judgment of the people will fortify the advice of the Secretary, which is that the United States should go on with the construction of battle ships and torpedo boats; because while cruisers are useful as commerce destroyers and to look out for American interests abroad, they rarely, if ever, decide a naval war.

But cruisers are effective when backed by line-of-battle ships in sufficient number. These seek out ships of war and engage them in battle; they assail and protect ports, and with the cruisers as pioneers and aids, they strike blows that are decisive of war; they afford protection that insures the maintenance of peace and commands respect for our rights in all ports.

SHAMEFUL LICENSE. Doubtless the Lexow Investigation Committee was conceived in good purpose; doubtless it has exposed a great deal of corruption and mal-administration in the New York Police Department.

But the subcommittee that would not be tolerated in a cross-roads Justice's Court; it sat silent and allowed Goff, the cross-examiner, to badger witnesses in a manner disgraceful to civilization.

This man Goff was not content with asking questions related to facts before the committee or within the scope of its authority, but he made a practice of assailing witnesses by innuendo, conveying the impression that he is in the possession of facts, which, disclosed, will make the witnesses out fiends, robbers and perjurers, pimps and procurers; and to this men who have lived long lives of upright and good repute. When they have claimed the right to refute his insinuations, they have been choked out and told that the matter brought out by Goff has been stricken from the record.

But the tar has been applied and these men, denied the decent opportunity to disprove vain charges, must go through life with this smirch attaching to their characters simply because this man Goff was permitted under legislative cover to assail in the most violent and indecent manner without a solitary reason to justify him.

We forecast now that the usefulness of the committee will turn out to be greatly reduced and negated by reason of the extreme license that it has permitted the prosecution and the injustice of which it has been guilty in refusing those assailed opportunity to reply. Thus, twice-condemned criminals, thieves and confessed rascals have been permitted to libel and slander citizens, charging them with all manner of delinquencies, and when the assailed have asked leave to be heard they have been denied the opportunity. It is simply shameful.

An inoffensive man and his wife, good citizens and respected by all who knew them, were butchered in their home, their bodies mutilated and their home pillaged. A more horrible and atrocious murder is not known in the annals of crime. Let neither money nor exertion be spared to capture the fiends guilty of this butchery.

A MUD COMPLAINT. The Approaches to the Art Gallery Almost Impossible. Officers of the Museum Association, who labor to induce visitations to the City Art Gallery, complain bitterly of the condition of Third street. They say that the street is much traveled, and consequently there is more mud on the street from L to P than any other street in town. From 200 to 300 strangers visit the Art Gallery weekly, even at this season of the year, and they are compelled to wade the worst street crossings in the city. Especially are those from the east to the west covered with an ankle-deep slush. The crossings north and south on the west side of the street are not so bad as those from the east to the west. Strangers are just as eager to go down on the east side of the street as on the west, however, and the criticisms they make are from complicity with the mud. On Saturday one entire group of Eastern people turned back and returned to their hotels, rather than wade the M, N or O street crossings of Third street. The gallery officials are praying for the Lindley-Fairman scraper machine to be headed that way. They claim that the crossings to the city's gallery, to which the city hires strangers, ought to be kept fairly clean, and they would be if the mud on the street was once well cleaned off.

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Guilt of Something. Late last night as one of the railroad switchmen was passing through the yard on the river front he encountered a man skulking among the freight cars. The fellow was making frantic efforts to get away, and in his haste he dropped something which the switchman picked up. TAGS AND DOGS

Poundkeeper Cooksey Rises to Deny and Assert. Relative to the charge that Poundkeeper Cooksey starved Mr. Rivett's puppy dog while it was kept at the public pound, Mr. Cooksey enters an emphatic denial. He says he had the animal from about November 9th, and to keep a growing dog tied up that length of time naturally injures it. The puppy, he says, has been sick three weeks with a distemper, but he fed it freely and did all he could for it and the animal is now as fit as his care of animals is known to be. He adds proof that he starves any of them. His claim is that Mr. Rivett is prejudicially against him, because he, Cooksey, insists that one tag will not do for three dogs. He seized two of Rivett's (three dogs), and he finds but one tag credited to the owner, who confessed as much by redeeming one dog and suing for the other. Cooksey says he is advised that if a man has several dogs and but one dog tag, all the dogs are impounded, the tag can count for but one dog, besides the tag should be on the animal. He insists that he is bound to take impounded dogs, and will do again, as he did in Rivett's case, because that is the law as given to him by the ordinance. As to Rivett's dog, he says he always stood ready to surrender it on presentation of a tag for it.
