Lawton offered a resolution (Kent in the chair) creating the office of special policeman for the repair shops, which was carried.

STREET CLEANING.

Lawton spoke in favor of the street cleaning ordinance proposed by Lindley and others, saying it was being well done, and costing less than half the amount it ordinarily does, and was doing an excellent work.

STREET CLEANING.

Kent thought the city had a Superintendent of Streets, and if Mr. Lindley would be authorized to employ ten men to keep the crossings clean, but with no second, and after much discussion, the \$50 was appropriated for Mr. Lindley.

STREET CLEANING.

A communication from L. Bourland, proposing to furnish a night and day patrol wagon the year round, furnishing good horses and a driver, at \$500 per month, was referred to the Mayor.

STREET CLEANING.

A resolution requesting the Mayor to cause the arrest of all members of the so-called "Cotton Seed Oil" assembly, which in this city, who can show no visible means of support, and that extra policemen be employed for the period of one week, if found necessary, was carried unanimously.

SEWERAGE.

A communication and ordinance looking to the bringing before the people for their consideration a system of sewerage, was read and laid over for next week.

STREET SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

The Street Superintendent's report was read, showing expenditures as follows: Street cleaning, \$17,000; sewerage, \$17,000; street sprinkling, \$17,000; miscellaneous, \$502.68.

STRIKING DECKHANDS.

The Steamer Jaclito Gets Away With Deckhands. The deckhands on the Sacramento Transportation Company's steamer Jaclito went on a strike yesterday morning on account of a reduction in their wages from \$10 a month to \$8.

CHIEF OF POLICE DREW WAS APPLIED FOR ASSISTANCE.

The Chief of Police drew was applied for assistance, but he replied that owing to the inadequate number of officers at his disposal he was unable to render any assistance.

SHRIMP O'NEIL AFTERWARD CAME ON THE SCENE.

Sheriff O'Neil afterward came on the scene, and his presence deterred the striking deckhands from committing any overt acts.

THE LOT WAS TO HAVE LEFT AT 9 O'CLOCK FOR RED BLIND.

The lot was to have left at 9 o'clock for Red Blind, but on account of being delayed by the strike it did not leave until about 1 o'clock in the afternoon.

THE TRANSPORTATION COMPANY'S OFFICIALS STATE THAT THE REDUCTION IS A USUAL THING IN WINTER.

The transportation company's officials state that the reduction is a usual thing in winter, and that the company is restored to the original figure in the summer.

A man named Jack English appeared to be the leader of the strikers, and as soon as the Sheriff arrived he immediately ordered English to get ashore, which the latter did after addressing a few sarcastic remarks to Captain Conroy.

ENGLISH UNDERTOOK TO ARGUE THE MATTER WITH SHERIFF O'NEIL.

English undertook to argue the matter with Sheriff O'Neil, but the latter told him he was there to see that no unlawful acts were committed, and that if any were attempted he would compel the strikers to leave the company's property.
